Platform Compared In British Election

LONDON (AP)—A comparison of the major parties' platforms in Thursday's British election.

DEFENCE
Conservative: Wants to keep a British nuclear deterrent.
Labor: Wants to give up independent British deterrent.
TAXATION
Conservative: Proposes to continue reform tax system both for companies and individuals.
Labor: Wants major overhaul of whole tax system with higher unearned incomes carrying greater share of tax.

Industry and Prosperity
Conservative: Proposes a maintained annual growth rate of four per cent. Economic planning by partnership of government, management and unions. Aim to double 1954 standard of living by 1975.
Labor: Proposes to reach at least four-per-cent growth rate. Proposes a minister of economic affairs to draw up a national plan to increase investments, expand exports and reduce non-essential imports.

EDUCATION
Conservative: Proposes suitable education for all.
Labor: Proposes to provide a minimum of 12 years of schooling for every boy or girl up to 18.

PENSIONS
Conservative: Proposes full review of old-age pension program, would concentrate on neediest cases, with extra help for over 75s.
Labor: Raise pensions and then link the benefits to the national growth.

HEALTH
Conservative: Would fulfill present health plan, review it annually.
Labor: Proposes an entirely free national health service abolishing charges on teeth, eyeglasses, medical prescriptions and surgical appliances.

FOOT MIGHT GET IN
It is suggested the first job would go to Sir Hugh Foot, 56, Britain's former governor in Cyprus, and the second to Philip Noel Baker, 74, Nobel Prize winner and former Commonwealth relations secretary.
Education and science might go to Richard Crossman, 57, former Oxford Don, and a possibility for the transport ministry could be Anthony Wedgwood Benn, 39, the "relicious peer" who fought his way to rid himself of a title so he could be a member of the House of Commons.

Wilson has also just pledged a woman member in his cabinet and intellectual, also is considered a possibility for the foreign office.
James Callaghan, 52, general member for Cardiff since 1945, appears the most likely bet for chancellor of the exchequer. He was parliamentary secretary to the transport ministry from 1947 to 1950.

JAY HAS EXPERIENCE
The Board of Trade, Wilson's old portfolio, could go to Douglas Jay, 56, who has four years' ministerial experience.
For Commonwealth relations secretary, two names are mentioned: Arthur Bottomley, once Wilson's No. 2 at the Board of Trade, and Christopher Mayhew, 49, parliamentary undersecretary in foreign affairs in the old Labor government.

It is widely expected Wilson would go outside the last House of Commons team to appoint a lord chancellor—the chairman of the House of Lords and chief ministerial law officer.
Politicians think the choice would fall on Lord Gardiner, recently created life peer and one of Britain's greatest jurists.
Wilson has pledged a new minister with responsibility for United Nations affairs and an



WARBLE FLY CONTROL DEMONSTRATED

Dr. H. H. Kelly, director of veterinary services for the province, is seen demonstrating the new method for warble fly control which will be used in a campaign that is being launched this fall in a selected area of the province. The effort will be concentrated in the country west of Portage. The chemical, rucelox, will be distributed on a school district basis, with information and the proper dilutions to use. The application is poured on the back of the animal in a strip about 18 to 24 inches long. One application is all that is required to obtain the desired control, it is explained by the provincial department of agriculture. BOUND FOR BANGKOK
LONDON, Ont. (CP)—Paul M. OTTAWA AMENDS Legislation On Crop Insurance
Nova Scotia has passed enabling legislation, indicating interest in joining the experimental federal-provincial scheme before long.
At present, only 5,600 farmers in three provinces—Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island—are covered by crop insurance.
