Things to Make a Note of

Meeting of Silby Hose Company at 7.30

Monday at 3.30 p.m., in the WCTU parlour, Mrs Anderson will read a paper on the work of the Woman's Council. All members of affiliated societies are cordially invited to be present.

In speaking, last night, on the subject of the Evangelical Alliance the rector of St. Paul's took occasion to say why he had been forced to withdraw from the union meetings. He had been given to understand that the Book of Common Prayer must not be used at the meetings. To shut out the worship of the Church of England is to shut out the church's ministers and people. He could not agree to discrimination against the worship of his church without indignity to himself and his congregation. Other ministers had a right to have the form of service they thought best at those meetings. Why should not he be accorded the same privilege? No one had any more right to forbid him the use of the prayer-book than he had to forbid others the use of their respective hymn books. He had just as much reason to object to their manner of service as they had to his. But the Evangelical Alliance did not allow the discussion of differences. The one idea of it was unity by prayer. Each one joined, not as a private individual, but as representing his church. He had a right to bring with him anything which could be used to further the aim of the meeting in deepening the spirit of prayer.

FIFTEEN POINT CHURCH.—His Lordship Bishop McDonald solemnly opened for Divine worship on New Year's Day the splendid new church dedicated to "Our Lady of Mount Carmel" at Fifteen Point. Pontifical Mass was celebrated with all the pomp of the Roman ritual. Two sermons were preached, one in French, by Rev. Father Boudreau, of Egmont Bay, which is spoken of as a masterly discourse replete with doctrine and feeling. The Rev. Father Gauthier preached the English sermon. There was a large local congregation, but the bad roads kept the many outsiders anxious to assist away.

ONE MORE RIVER CROSSED.—The Truro News says: The first persons to cross the Park Street Extension iron bridge, over the Salmon River, were I. Longworth, Esq., and Miss Moore, of Charlottetown. With the thermometer almost at zero yesterday afternoon, Mr Longworth and his guest started for a "constitutional" down the Park St. Extension. The workmen were busy putting girders, stringers and superstructure in position, but they soon arranged a temporary floor, and on the icy boards, the first two pedestrians safely passed over the new bridge from the Truro to the Onslow side of the Salmon River. This is recorded for the future historian—two "Islanders" were the first pedestrians to cross over a bridge that is yet to be such a thoroughfare for travel between Truro and suburban Onslow. The bridge will be open for traffic in about a week's time.

ART IN MONTREAL.—A Christmas exhibition of the works of artists in Montreal is referred to at some length by the Gazette. The Gazette says that "the exhibition is a small one consisting, altogether, of less than one hundred pictures, but it is distinctly creditable to the artists represented. It is, moreover, much above the average of its immediate predecessors and comprises a larger proportion of really good and progressive work, among the exhibits."

The Gazette continues: "Mr Robert, Harris, Montreal, president of the R C A., exhibits ten pictures all of which show a stimulating advance in the artist's work. It was with expectations of something new artistically that Mr Harris's many admirers looked to the result of his trip to the art centres of Europe, and they will by no means be disappointed. Even those who have failed to find appreciation for his previous work, unless with a qualification, can have nothing but praise for what he has brought home. His exhibit consists chiefly of portrait studies, all excellent. One study particularly, that of a girl's head (No. 1), is especially noteworthy. Mr Harris has handled his subject with brilliancy and skill, and the picture is a clever and complete artistic success. Mr Harris also exhibits a very delicately sketched pastel of a grey, misty day near Riviere du Loup (No. 10), which is very pleasing."
