Greendal Chain Stores Expanding In Montreal Area

Max Dalien, president and owner of the Greendal chain, has announced he is opening a large new department store in the Rosemount section of Montreal where he will carry complete stocks of men's, boys' and women's clothing and accessories.

This will be the sixth store in the chain. The original one is still operating in New Glasgow. It is his intention to open two or three more in the greater Montreal area within a short time, he said.

The new store will have, as well as a large floor space, a big basement which will be used as a warehouse to all units to permit large scale buying with resulting economies to customers. Buying power of the new units to come will add to this.

Mr. Dalien's sixth store will open June 2 and will be his second in the Montreal area. Four years ago he opened one of the smartest ladies ready-to-wear stores on St. Catherine Street directly opposite one of the city's largest department stores.

CRIMINAL APPEALS—The Court of Criminal Appeal will sit today, the full bench being expected to hear the appeals of three Georgetown youths against sentences pronounced on April 12. All three had pleaded guilty to the offences on which they were sentenced. John Charles Martell, 21, is appealing sentences of 3 years, 2 years and 2 years consecutive and four 2 year sentences concurrent. Leroy Archibald Hatch, 17, is appealing a sentence of 3 years and six concurrent 2-year sentences. Louis Clarence David, 16, is appealing a sentence of 3 years and two concurrent 2-year sentences.

O'Donnell was counsel for the appellants in the two cases. Mr. J. P. Nicholson was counsel for the Crown in each case.

Little Theatre Guild Presents Play Sudden Death Of At Second Night Of Drama Festival Mr. F. T. Mallett

Following the performance of "Summer Day's Dream," presented by the Charlottetown Little Theatre last evening, the Adjudicator, Professor A. J. Shaw of the University of New Brunswick said: "Taking all factors into consideration, this company has done a good job. While the mixture of reality and lack of reality was not quite achieved, it is a question of doubt if a professional company could do so." Professor Shaw pointed out the tendency of the author, J. B. Priestly to "Preach and Moralize" and his fondness for "talking," which became annoying and even boring at times. The roles were of a static type leaving very little to be developed. "There was practically no action," he said, "it was just not there." The play had, however, the saving grace of atmosphere, in

a blend of the real and unreal." A difficult play, and definitely a difficult one for amateurs," Professor Shaw said. Professor Shaw was well pleased with the first set in act 1, which he described as "well done and very convincing, being more than adequate." The second was not so good. He had no criticism to offer regarding the properties or lighting and described the costumes as "very good." "The three Foreigners were very good indeed," he said.
