

Grain Traffic Is Valuable, Vancouver Sources Estimate

VANCOUVER (CP) — This crop year some 5,700,000 tons (500,000 bushels) of grain

will move from the Prairies to British Columbia ports for export.

By the time the last kernel has passed Canada's three-mile limit some \$7,000,000 will have been returned to the Canadian community for the cost of transportation.

Capl. B. D. L. Johnson, head of the National Harbours Board here, says it is figured conservatively that each ton of cargo moved through the port returns \$10 to the west.

The money comes from a large variety of expenditures, many difficult to estimate.

Capl. Johnson says a ship coming to Vancouver to load is met with: \$200-\$250 for pilotage from Victoria; \$50-\$200 for a tug in the harbor; \$30-\$100 for men to tie the ship up; \$150 a day while tied up for up to 10 days.

On top of that there is the cost of stores and fuel which is as high as \$200 a ton.

ship chandler says can range between \$100 and \$120.

COSTS LOWER IN EUROPE

If the ship is bound for Europe it would take less stores because prices are cheaper there. But if it was going to China, where it is impossible to acquire many items, it may take on many stores. Because there are no suction unloaders in the Orient or Russia, a ship would have to take on extra gear here for the discharge of the grain.

If the ship is elderly it could spend tens of thousands of dollars on repairs. If it is new it could spend practically nothing.

Meanwhile, the grain has been moved from farm to country elevator to railway car and to the coast.

In Vancouver it is unloaded, cleaned and put in elevators.

The holds of the ship are generally lined with wood and the grain is transferred from ship to dock.

Stevedoring companies say there are too many variables involved to give an average cost of loading a ship.

Capl. Johnson says the bulk of the \$10 per ton is spent on the coast. Perhaps \$1 reaches as far east as Saskatchewan.

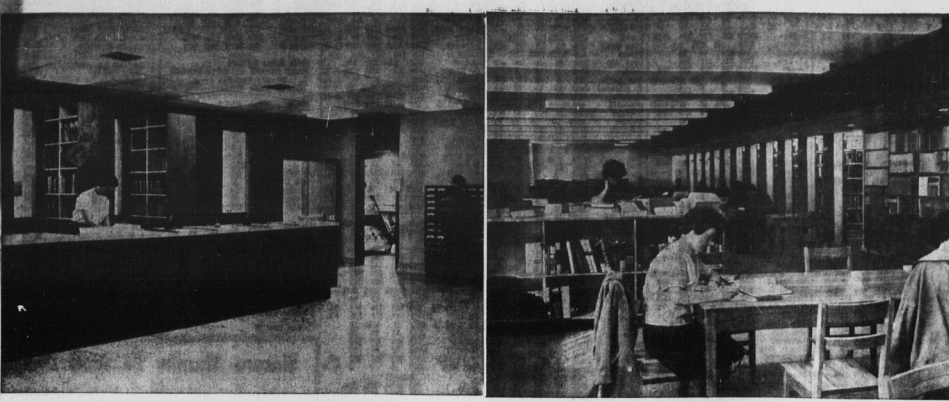

SDU Library Has 120,000 Books

The newly-built \$450,000 Kelly Memorial Library on the Saint Dunstan's University campus provides ideal study conditions for students.

Individual desks are provided in reading rooms around the "stacks", or bookshelves and the sound of chairs being pushed back from tables is nonexistent because the floor is covered with some 900 square yards of beige wall-to-wall carpeting.

The individual desks eliminate many of the distractions found in reading rooms where he sits at a table with six or eight of his contemporaries.

Distractions are further cut down by the placement of the stacks in the middle of the room. The dividing of the reading room makes for fewer people in each study area.

Silence is maintained by means of acoustic-tiled ceilings, a sign indicating to female students that wearing spikes in the library is not the done thing, and, of course, the carpeting.

ECONOMICAL

The wall-to-wall carpeting in the reading rooms, periodical and reference book areas, while seemingly a touch of luxury, is economically justified in the long run," says the librarian Rev. Allan MacDonald, who adds that maintenance costs for a carpeted floor are much less than the cost of polishing a stone floor.

This carpeted area is located on the main floor of the building which this Saturday afternoon will be officially opened.

This floor also houses a cataloguing room, a bindery, staff lounge, circulation area.

This floor will contain a record collection, turntables, and earphones, and various offices of the college administration.

The third floor of the building contains additional stacks, an additional stack and reading room area on the ground floor, not in use at the present time, brings the capacity of the library to 120,000 volumes, in anticipation of the future needs of the growing student body.

The library at present provides individual study spaces for 150 students. Eventually it will be able to accommodate 300.

In the ground floor of the building, there are two reading rooms now used as classrooms. Two rooms now empty will in future be furnished as a typing room and a language lab.

IDEAL FOR QUIET PERIODS OF STUDYING

Also located on this floor are college offices, seminar rooms, a book store, and a common room, or "smoker".

The lobbies contain several benches of wood and iron, designed to be too heavy for any enterprising students to carry off, floor-to-ceiling doors in different colors, terrazo floors, and globular lights.

Architect for the building was J. Housens.

General contractors were Williams and Murphy of Charlottetown and Summerside.

The library will be open to the public Sunday afternoon from 3 to 5 o'clock.

The official opening of the new library will take place this afternoon at 3 o'clock. A former SDU graduate, Dr. Alphonse Campbell, will be guest speaker. Dedication of the new building will be made by Rev. James Murphy, pastor at South and former president of St. Dunstan's. The program for the opening will begin in the gymnasium where the ribbon will be cut by the rector, Very Rev. George MacDonald, presiding. Besides providing space for 120,000 books (present volume total 30,000), the library houses the administration offices, three classrooms, two seminar rooms, a 30 unit language laboratory to be equipped in the near future, a student lounge, the book store, and a periodical and reference section with adjoining reading rooms. There are also individual study spaces for 150 students. It is planned to expand these ultimately to provide room for 300.
