Protestant Service Bureau Has New Executive Director

The appointment of Arthur G. Laws, M.S.W., as executive director of the Protestant Family Service Bureau in Charlottetown was announced by the president of the board, K.A. Parker yesterday. Mr. Laws will assume the duties of his new position on Nov. 1.

The new bureau director is a graduate of McGill School of

Social Work and has had experience in an adoption and foster home agency and a child guidance centre where he worked with the parents of children having behavior problems.

His latest assignment has been with the Montreal Children's Hospital where he worked in the cerebral palsy department. In this program he was part of a team approach in which the physical, mental and social problems of the handicapped child are dealt with.

A major portion of this work involved working with the parents of the child as well as with the child himself.

Mr. Laws is 31 years of age and married to a social worker. They have recently become parents for the first time. Their church affiliations are Anglican.

Guilty Is Plea To Theft Of Car

Entering a plea of guilty to the charge of the theft of an automobile, George Grant alias Russell Silver Rudolph of no fixed address, was remanded until Wednesday, Oct. 28 for sentencing by Magistrate James B. Johnston in Queens County Magistrate's Court Friday afternoon.

Transferred to the jurisdiction of Magistrate Johnston the case of Daniel Tweel, Charlottetown, charged with assaulting Archibald Murchison of Point Prim, was adjourned for two weeks.

Two residents of Charlottetown had their cases adjourned until Friday, Oct. 30 for sentence, after they had both pleaded guilty to unlawfully hunting game birds in the Stanhope area of the National Park.

A similar adjournment was given in the case of a North Rustico resident who was charged with driving while intoxicated.

Adjourned on several previous occasions a Charlottetown man who had pleaded not guilty to being intoxicated in a public place was allowed a further adjournment until next Wednesday.

Fines of \$20 and costs or 30 days in Queens County Jail were meted out to two residents of Charlottetown and one each from North Rustico and Clyde River following their conviction on charges of having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residence.

Repairs Being Considered

Complete re-planking of the deck of the old Hillsboro Bridge, now under consideration by the department of public works and highways, may possibly be done at night, Hon. Philip Matheson, minister, said yesterday.

This action may be taken, the minister said, because of the necessary interruption in the flow of traffic caused by the extensive repairs necessary to the deck.

Although no final decision has been reached on the matter as yet, there is a possibility the work may begin next week.

Fears have been expressed by many motorists as to the safety of the ancient structure which has been carrying heavy traffic across the Hillsborough River for 55 years since it was floated here in sections. It had formerly spanned the Mirimachi River in New Brunswick for many years before that.
