HAPPENINGS

The superintendent of the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, is gratefully acknowledging the receipt of several interesting pieces of old agricultural equipment. It is the intention of the Experimental Farm gradually to set up a museum of farm and home equipment of early days.

Interesting items have been received from Mrs. W.F. Alan Stewart, Strathgarny, namely, an ox yoke, hand made turnip seeder, a Reed horse collar, hand rake for hay, also one for forming sheaves of grain, a surveyor's chain, brass cow bell and an early type of spear fork.

All of the hand made items have been well and ingeniously made and served their purpose well. The late Hon. W.F. Alan Stewart was also interested in the history of agricultural development and believed in maintaining a connection with the past. He not only preserved the equipment of that time but also built up a most unusual library of old agricultural literature.

Among the early pieces of equipment which featured prominently in early agriculture in Prince Edward Island was the mussel-mud digger. Parts of a mud digger, in particular, in particular the head block, shovel and handle have been contributed by Mr. Almon Boswall of Dunstaffnage. While it is not possible to set up a complete digger, a photograph is sought. Among the pieces of equipment which are desired are - cradle for cutting grain, a flour, key parts of old grist mills, such as spar wheels

and stones, also any equipment used in the home manufacture of wool and flax, etc.

It is the intention eventually to set up this museum in a section of Birch Court. Every piece of equipment received will be properly labelled as to source and use. Mr. Robert Parent visited many museums in Great Britain and the Continent. His experience and knowledge are being generously used for the benefit of the Prince Edward Island Agricultural Museum.

ANGEL CAKE

1 cup cake flour
1 1/2 cups fine granulated sugar
1 cup egg whites
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cream of tartar
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. almond extract

Place egg whites in large bowl and add salt. Beat until frothy and add cream of tartar. Beat until very stiff but not dry. Add sugar a tablespoon at a time. Add flour and fold in a little at a time. Bake for 50 or 60 minutes in 325 oven.

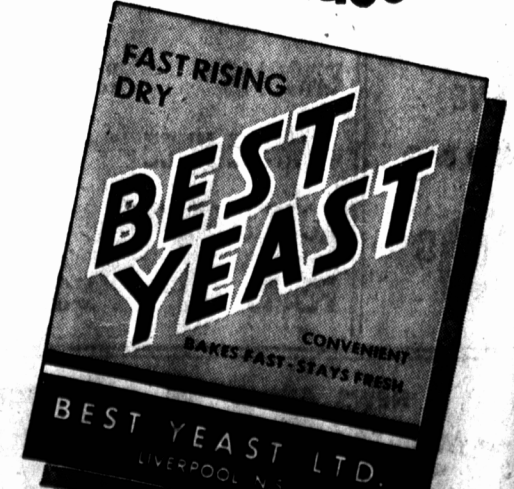
