

Petitioners Object To Site Of Proposed Super Market

SUMMERSIDE—A petition has been presented Mayor W.A. Currie asking reconsideration by the town council of a special building permit granted to a firm planning construction of a super market here.

Nine residents of the area where the market is to be built, led by George Meikel, signed the petition. The approved site for the \$75,000 building is a vacant lot bounded by Granville, Carvell and Arona Streets. The firm Mark Gaudet and Sons - also plan a parking lot accommodating 75-100 cars.

The petitioners object to the site because it is now a residential area and they fear the construction of the new building might open the area to other commercial interests.

The petition's supporters feel that opinion of residents of the area should be obtained before the building permit is granted.
