# Canucks Grab Three Titles In Figure Skating Tourney

Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP)—Glittering performances in the free skating gave Canada three of the four titles at stake in the North American figure skating championships here Saturday night. It was the greatest one-tournament haul of medals Canadian skaters have won in international competition in nearly 30 years.

Following Miss Heiss, Americans took the next three places in the women's singles. Margaret Crossland, 19-year-old Canadian champion from Calgary ended in sixth place ahead of Sonia Snelling of Toronto.  
Lynn Finnegan, 16-year-old from Boston was second with 90.0 points. Nancy Heiss, sister of Carol, was third with 88.7 and Barbara Ann Roles of Temple City, Calif., fourth.

Jackson was awarded 94.7 points for the compulsory and free skating against 928.0 for runner-up Brown and 913.0 for Brewer, in third place.  
The Wagner-Paul pairs team had things much their own way. They finished with 57.7 points against 53.8 for the second-place Nancy and Ronald Ludington of Roxbury, Mass. It was a much tighter fit in the dance competition with Miss Fenton and McLachlan edging out Andree and Don Jacoby of Syracuse, N.Y., 180.4 to 179.3.

The youthful Canadians swept the pairs, dance and men's singles championships, allowing only Carol Heiss, a baker's daughter from Ozone Park, N.Y., to retain her women's singles crown. Miss Heiss, 19-year-old hazel-eyed blonde, far outclassed six other skaters from Canada and the United States.

Don Jackson, 18-year-old Canadian champion from Oshawa, Ont., dazzled the full-houseVarsity Arena crowd of 4,700 with footwork to win the men's singles. He was third after the opening-day compulsory figures Friday but passed the leaders in the free skating to give Canada its first title in this division since 1941 when Ralph McCreath of Toronto won.

LOU BOLDREAU former pilot of Cleveland Indians, Boston Red Sox and Kansas City Athletics, wants to give the pitchers a better break than they are getting.  
Lou insists the moundmen are deserving of more consideration than they are getting and he feels his plan would be welcome news to all of them.  
Boudreau wants home plate widened and he adds this would not only help the hurlers but speed up the game as well. Lou explained "it would certainly give the pitchers a much needed break, but more important, it would eliminate about 50 pitches a game. There'd be more swinging, outs would come faster and there'd be fewer wild pitches and balls."  
His plan is to widen the plate from its present 17 inches to 19 1/2 inches.

Boudreau, no longer a sports announcer for Chicago Cubs game, claims that since pitchers lost the right to throw the spitball, they have been further penalized by the narrowing of that strike zone through the use of the batter's crouch and by the livelier ball.  
Pitchers undoubtedly will rally behind Boudreau's idea but we bet it won't do them any good.  
SOME PLAYERS will not get any help from Casey Stengel when they go looking for fatter pay cheques for this coming season.  
Stengel held a press conference recently and when it was over it was obvious that Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle and some other Yankees would get no help from him when they start looking for more money.  
The double talking Casey mentioned no names but everyone agreed Mickey Mantle was one of his chief targets. Flagrant and repeated disregard of training rules—involving missed trains, missed planes, late hours, and tardy arrivals at the park—were mentioned as reasons why some of the Yankees have been asked to take less instead of more.  
"THERE ARE two players on this club who should be drawing from \$75,000 to \$125,000," Stengel said. "But the trouble with some of our players is they don't know the difference between midnight and noon. And that's gonna stop. I never fined players before but I'm going to from now on."  
Old Casey says several of his players are entitled to good raises and he has already spoken for them. As for the others he said, "I won't have any dissatisfied players on this ball club. If they don't have that 100 per cent feeling to win I'd say we are open for deals. Some individuals had better not think they are bigger than the club. If they do you'll see one of those big moving vans come up and hit them right in the rear."  
That's mighty plain talking for Mr. Stengel. He usually is hard to interpret but not this time. The mightiest of the Yankees should certainly understand what the man is trying to say.  
We think he said it in fine style.
