French Bitter, Cancel Proposed Moscow Talks

PARIS (AP)—Premier Edgar Faure and Foreign Minister Antoine Pinay Monday cancelled a scheduled "courtesy and friendship visit" to Moscow, with the explanation that the atmosphere is not favorable now for this type of trip. The French action reflected the bitterness in Paris at what was apparently considered a gratuitous blow to French prestige in the United Nations General Assembly's vote to discuss the Algerian situation.

In Moscow, Communist party boss Nikita S. Khrushchev announced that Russia supports the independence movement in North Africa. He called it the "national liberation" movement.

(The Soviet Union—and world communism—for years has sponsored "national liberation movements" in all areas of the colonial world, using such support as a potent "cold war" weapon among underdeveloped peoples.)

After the first wave of enthusiasm in support of Pinay's action in leading the French delegation out of the assembly, some mutterings of discontent were heard Monday. Some members of parliament said Pinay must have bungled the pre-vote negotiations and that in any case it would have been better to stay and fight an unjust charge.

At the foreign office, confusion still reigned as to France's future intentions for participating in the work of the United Nations. The announcement from Sunday night's cabinet meeting spoke of withdrawal from the work of the General Assembly. It was understood France would continue participation in the Security Council and disarmament talks.
