Lay Apostolate Is Subject Of Talks To Basilica Group

Speaking on the Lay Apostolate, Monsignor Patrick MacMahon delivered an interesting and informative address before a well attended meeting of St. Dunstan's Basilica Laymen's Association, held at Notre Dame Auditorium Monday night.

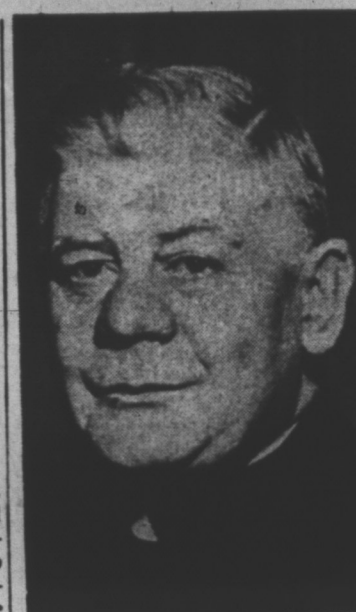
The meeting was presided over by President M. F. Hagan. In his remarks Monsignor MacMahon spoke of the Mystical Body of Christ and its application in the daily lives of laymen.

"Through membership in the Mystical Body of Christ we participate in the true life of Christ through sanctifying Grace" he said.

He stressed that all the actions and work of the laymen should be directed through the Hierarchy of the Church, so that each layman becomes a co-operator in the work of the Church.

Father MacMahon pointed out that a Layman's role in the work of the church was fundamentally that of leading a good christian life every moment of the day, which thereby gives a layman a special vocation in the church.

In conclusion Monsignor MacMahon emphasized that the Motivation for laymen in the work of the church should be one of thanksgiving to Christ for the privileges which He has bestowed on the members of His Mystical Body.

Fish And Game Discussion Topic

A panel discussion on "Fish and Game on Prince Edward Island" provided a highly interesting and informative period following luncheon at Rotary in the Charlottetown Hotel yesterday.

Dr. Wendell MacDonald opened the discussion by referring to one of the main objects of the Fish and Game Association "to improve public relations between rural and urban dwellers, which is becoming increasingly difficult."

"Years ago when travel was limited, when we went to the country our rural friends or relatives came to town, we stayed for a meal and were much more friendly with our neighbours," he said.

"While the farmers continue to work long hours, the urban dwellers are getting closer and closer to a 35-hour week, leaving more time for recreation. No longer are we content to sit and watch sports—we want to participate in it. This means a large influx of our population to fields and streams."

ONLY RELAXATION
We in the Fish and Game Association feel that hunting and fishing is about the only relaxation we have to offer many on these long weekends and holidays," Dr. MacDonald said.

Touching on daylight saving time "that has become a monster for very little reason," he described the difficulty of just going on duty an hour earlier than the rest of the world and being on duty at six a.m. and in bed by 10.30. "How are you going to get a girl of 18 or 20 in at 9.30 p.m.?"

"Fifty percent of tourists ask about fishing and hunting. Anything done for them puts money into our pockets. Last year \$17,500 was collected for licenses—the farmer is exempt. This was collected because urban sportsmen wanted to improve hunting and fishing on the island."

DECLINE OF FARMS
"It must be realized that with a decline of 5,000 farms since 1911 there are many more larger farms which make their operation more difficult. There is a difference of opinion regarding hunting, fishing but I believe that by-and-large our farmers would be easier to get along with if a proper approach was in evidence. Farmers who fail to realize that office men and others are up against a limited existence can be expected to go a long way when properly approached and given the assurance that their rights are respected, their livestock and equipment not interfered with and that they are not under the necessity of working overtime to correct the shortcomings of careless visitors."

DIFFICULTIES
Mr. Dewar described the difficulties of working a farm with a short morning period and a long afternoon and evening. Sgt. Major Doug George of the R.C.M.P. described the work of the R.C.M.P. since assuming full responsibility for the enforcement of the Game Act in April 1958.

Full time game wardens are located at Charlottetown, Summerside and Montague. This year two landrovers, capable of traveling roads impassable to ordinary vehicles have been added to the equipment. Three 15' boats with five H.P. outboard motors and trailers have also been added, making a highly mobile enforcement unit. It is hoped that these vehicles will be radio equipped in the near future.

This force also enforces the federal fisheries regulations in conjunction with the department of fisheries.

Although only three members are employed full time as game wardens, all members take an active part in enforcement whilst on patrol. "Better sportsmanship and an understanding of the reasons behind the Game Act can tend towards a decrease in the number of prosecutions."

EXCELLENT WORK
This can be brought about by excellent work being done by the Fish and Game Associations in their efforts to educate the general public on the preservation of our natural resources.

"Those who take young friends on sporting trips have an excellent opportunity to ensure that the next generation of sportsmen have a solid foundation of knowledge, not only on how to fish but on the reasons behind our laws."

As bad driving habits are passed from teacher to pupil, so are bad sporting habits and practices passed from father to son," he said.

"A successful prosecution is not in itself the end to be sought, but it is one of the means of securing the real purpose of the police service—the prevention of crime."

"I believe good will would be created between farmer and hunter if before hunting over a farmer's land, permission would be asked. I am sure that if this was done in a friendly manner, permission would be granted and possibly a friend made," he concluded.

The speakers were introduced by chairman B. Graham Rogers and thanked by co-chairman Willie Rodd.

Several members took advantage of the question period which was curtailed by lack of time, but most interesting.

Guests of Rotary were Roy Crawford and Douglas Munro of the Experimental Farm, J.F. Gaudet, Southport, Thos. Coley, Halifax, Ward Stewart of Moncton was a visiting Rotarian.

All government buildings will be gaily decorated and welcoming signs will be in abundance along the route of the Queen's tour through the city. Efforts are also being made to provide decorations on the two highways on which the Royal Couple will travel to and from the provinces North Shore area.

VICTORIA (CP) — Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip will spend three relaxing days at Pennask Lake, 40 miles south of Kamloops, to break up a varied tour of British Columbia.

The details of the tour, beginning July 10 and ending July 18, were announced Saturday.

The royal couple will fly to the lake retreat by float plane, returning the same way three days later.

The lake is well stocked with trout, and at least 30 miles from any large centre.

The royal couple will attend the Theatre Under the Stars and the International Festival during their one-day visit to Vancouver.

Lyell Gustin will conduct current examinations for the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto in Charlottetown, June 9th, 1959.

Lyell Gustin was born in Quebec, attended Stanstead College, and teaches in Saskatchewan. He is well known in all parts of Canada as an experienced and prominent music educator. Mr. Gustin is also a director of the Canadian Music Council, and was for five years, President of the Canadian Federation of Music Teachers' Association.

After early music training in Canada, Mr. Gustin spent several years of specialized study with eminent teachers in Chicago, New York, and in Europe. His studios in Saskatoon have developed many outstanding young pianists, and Mr. Gustin has for some years been a busy member of the Conservatory's Board of Examiners, and is in constant demand as a music festival adjudicator.

In 1955 he was the recipient of the 1955 University of Alberta National Music Award for "contribution to the arts in Canada."

Tito Celebrates His 67th Birthday

BELGRADE (Reuters) — President Josip Tito celebrates his 67th birthday today with the question of the future succession still as much a mystery as ever.

The Yugoslav chief of state, recently back from an arduous three month Asian tour, is said to be in robust health.

Talk about an eventual successor for the president is discouraged by Yugoslav Communists. But it is a favorite topic of speculation here.

The problem is complicated because no one in Yugoslavia can point to a single outstanding personality in the Communist party leadership as an obvious heir to Tito.

Most Communists say that the question is by no means urgent and there is no need for concern. Some, however, believe that thoughtful study of the future should not be delayed indefinitely, arguing that if the president should die suddenly, the party might be faced with a vacuum which could conceivably cause political complications.

One danger cited by some is that the Soviet Union might try to take advantage of a vacuum by using pressure in an attempt to regain Moscow's pre-1948 hold over Yugoslavia.

Observers here think that if the party suddenly were faced with the need for a decision, the solution probably would be found in the formation of some kind of "collective" leadership.

The president looks younger than his 67 years. He works hard, his interests are world-wide and his capacity for detail is undimmed. Though they are not worried, his doctors keep careful watch over him, particularly over a lingering rheumatic condition.

He still devotes many hours to government business and constant discussions with his associates. He receives scores of visitors. But increasingly there is a tendency to divert more paper work from the presidential desk, leaving Tito time to study the most immediate key problem.
