NOT SURPRISED

In his election announcement, failed to refer to his government's medicare proposal which will cover only about 12 per cent of our population.

"As far as the premier's references to the departments of agriculture and fisheries, we do not deny that these departments and every other department of government are receiving more money today than was allocated 10, 20 or 30 years ago. The unfortunate fact is that the departments of agriculture and fisheries are receiving a lower percentage of the provincial income than before."
"The people of the province

will also have to face the decision of whether it will be in our best interests to bring our provincial government in line with the federal government which will provide our province with over \$20,000,000 this year." The Liberal leader said, "Premier Shaw and his government argued in 1959, and again in 1962, that the province needed a provincial government in line with Ottawa."

"There is no doubt that liaison between our provincial government and Ottawa has dropped to an all time low. The assurance we have of a better deal from the federal purse is to elect a government that can work with Ottawa, rather than sustain our present government in office whose chief aim appears to be to criticize and embarrass Ottawa for local political gain."

Mr. Campbell cited the government's handling of the recent Causeway crisis "as an illustration of the point just mentioned."

"While the local government was getting headlines criticizing the federal decision we were able, through friendly negotiations, to have a meeting convened in Ottawa which resulted in the readjustment of construction plans, thus providing for the commencement of work on the P.E.I. said this year."

"The premier," he said, "devoted much of his television time to the industrial development policies of his government and suggested he was calling the election to defend these policies." "Is this a defence or a camouflage?"
"The government's dealings at

Georgetown will have a full airing during the campaign," Mr. Campbell said.

With just short of 50 days left until election day the parties will begin earnest campaigning almost immediately. The Liberals have scheduled meetings for the Members of the Legislative Assembly and the P.E.I. Liberal Federation for the latter part of this week.

Brudenell Plant Opens Saturday

MONTAGUE — Approximately 250 farm people, officials and business people of Montague attended the open house of Prima Fertilizer Limited at Brudenell on Saturday afternoon.

The new fertilizer plant recently completed at Brudenell, a few miles from Montague is considered to be another boon to the industrial development of the Southern Kings Area.

The three guest speakers representing Cyanamid of Canada Limited and Prima Fertilizer Limited were Dr. Lloyd MacLeod, Dr. Don MacKay, Dr. George Cooper.

Dr. MacLeod speaking on pasture and forage stated, forage is a valuable crop and one that has a high potential for production on P.E.I. and other Maritime areas. We hope to make farmers more aware of the value of fertilizer with forage crops, just as they are with potatoes, for example. The two things that do most to increase our forage yields are: applying adequate fertilizer and using a two cut hay system and good pasture management. He concluded by saying: fertilizer does not cost it pays.

Dr. MacLeod in his address taking potato fertilizer, said soil testing must be the basis for intelligent fertilizer use. Each field and each crop is a specific problem and should be treated as such. A fertilizer plant like this one has the necessary flexibility to provide the proper combination of plant food which soil tests show are necessary. Chemical analysis of the potato plants themselves is a newer method of finding whether the crop has been properly fertilized. Experimental work is underway at the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown to apply this method to island farms. Growers will be contacted this summer to co-operate with the farm on this project.

Dr. George Cooper, director of technical services, Cyanamid of Canada Ltd. from Toronto, also spoke briefly and answered many questions from an enthusiastic group of visitors. Also present from Cyanamid of Canada Limited was C.J. Dumbrell, manager of advertising and sales promotion.

Blair Wood, manager of the Brudenell plant welcomed the large group and directed tours

by groups throughout the new plant which was in full operation.

His brother Don also spoke to the group and helped with the program. Don is manager of Prima Fertilizer Ltd. in P.E.I. and operates a plant at Kensington.

Coffee and doughnuts were served. The door prizes were won by Elmer Hynes, one half ton of fertilizer; Murdoch Hume, two bags of garden fertilizer and Pat Campbell one bag of garden fertilizer. Yard sticks were available to all.

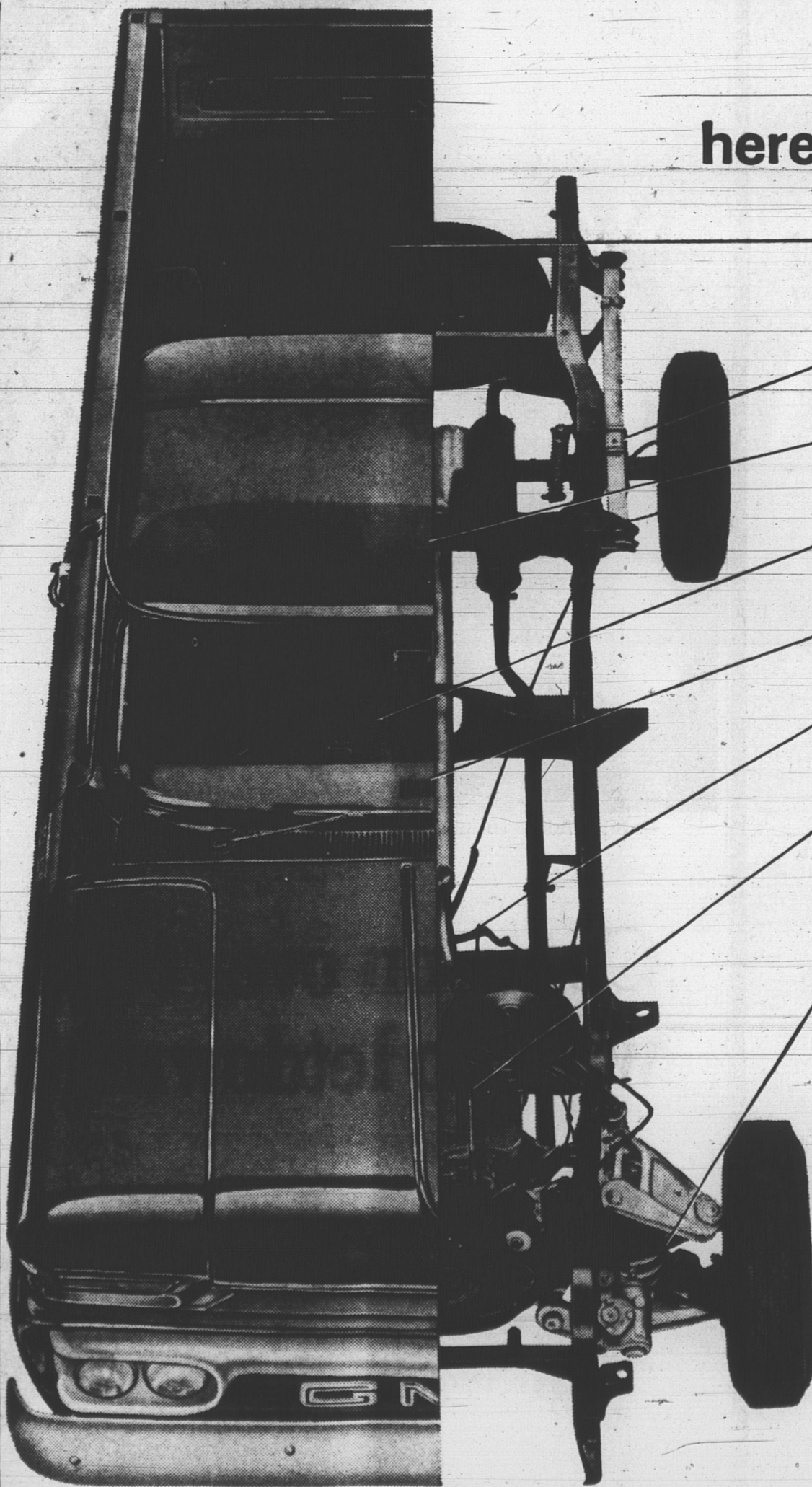
