He was taken back to Charlottetown. MR. CONNER, the contractor for the sewer leading from the new Post Office building along Great George Street to the channel, commenced work on Saturday. The sewer is about two feet wide, and in some places, fourteen feet deep. It is to be lined inside with vitrified Scotch drain pipe, and as a large number of workmen are employed, will probably be completed early next month. WE regret to learn that on Saturday afternoon, while the steamer St. Lawrence was being moved, one of the passengers—a Sister of the Congregation de Notre Dame—met with a serious accident. THE EARTHQUAKE!

Some of the Results. WHAT IT WILL COST! Still Another Shock.

CHARLESTON, S. C., Sept. 5. Charleston is quiet to-day. Hardly a church in Charleston is considered safe for occupation and the ministers of the different denominations have held their services in different public parks and in grounds adjoining the churches. The city appraiser who has gone over the whole city estimates that it will cost \$5,000,000 to put Charleston in a position as good as that which it occupied only a week ago. Government tents have been erected where full attention will be given to sanitary requirements, but it is calculated that at least 5,000 persons will need shelter for weeks to come, and it is proposed to erect huts on public grounds for the accommodation of those for whom tents will not suffice. At 9.30 last night another earthquake shock of about 50 seconds' duration, the first of the day, startled the people. It was not nearly so severe as the shock of Friday night. There was also a very light shock at 11.05 to-night.

Alexander to Abdicate. Some Consequent Excitement. THE PROSPECTIVE KING. The Cabinet to Resign.

PRINCE ALEXANDER has published his intention of abdicating. He says he cannot remain in Bulgaria on account of objections of the Czar. Before leaving he intends to establish a regency. At a reception given to his officers last night Prince Alexander bade them farewell, and informed them that he was compelled to abdicate by the Czar, who would not permit him to remain in Bulgaria. A grand council is being held to arrange for the regency. The army is excited but the city is tranquil. Thousands of copies of the Czar's reply to Prince Alexander have been presented by order of the Russian Consul and distributed among the people. ATHENS, Sept. 5. Ephemeris states that Prince Alexander has notified the Czar of his abdication of the throne of Bulgaria. BUCHAREST, Sept. 5. The Roumanian Cabinet threatens to resign if Prince Alexander abdicates. It is believed that Russia will give the throne to the Duke of Aldeburg, who is a commander of a cavalry division at St. Petersburg and a favorite of the Czar. The Bulgarian army officers are greatly excited, although it is stated that Russia will not occupy Bulgaria unless civil war should break out.

Russians Advancing. BOMBAY, Sept. 5. A unanimous proclamation, written in the vernacular of the country, has been thoroughly circulated in Punjab, calling upon the natives to combine and throw off the hated yoke of Feringhee. The circular declared that the Russians are advancing on India.

More Rioting in Belfast. DUBLIN, Sept. 5. At a suburban town of Belfast to-day, a mob attacked and severely handled four policemen and wrecked a house in which a man had taken refuge. Military aid had to be summoned to effect the rescue of the police. Two rioters were arrested.

The New Cruiser. HALIFAX, Sept. 5. The new cruiser Acadia has been overhauled and painted as a man-of-war, and will sail for Georgetown to-morrow.

A Funeral. OTTAWA, Sept. 5. The funeral of Sir Alexander Campbell's son took place this afternoon.

To Repair the Cable. HALIFAX, Sept. 5. The cable steamer Thenia sailed to-day to repair cables.

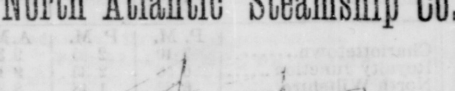
