THE HATTIE LOUISE.—The brig, Hattie Louise, Captain Sanderson, arrived here last evening with a full cargo of sugar and molasses from Antigua and Trinidad, for Cayell Bros. The cargo was selected under the personal supervision of Captain W. H. Bernard, and the quality is the best obtainable. The Hattie Louise left Antigua on the 9th of April, and on the 16th and 17th experienced heavy gales between Bermuda and the Gulf Stream, but received no damage. She arrived at Canoe on Tuesday last. On coming through a sudden change of wind caught the mainmast slack and broke the main boom, which delayed her a day or two in the Straits.

NEWS FROM THE MAGDALEN ISLANDS.—Schooner William Albert, Capt. Aseneau, arrived at Souris after empty kerosene oil casks. Capt. Aseneau reports that the seal fishery in the Magdalen Islands this spring has been very successful. Nearly every vessel engaged in it coming in filled up with pelts. He says that the inhabitants have had a pleasant winter of it, the weather having been unusually mild with little or no sickness. Great preparations are going on in the lobster canning business. There are now all of sixty lobster factories on the Islands. Herrings have struck in and good catches are being made. Under the contract of Mr. James McLean, the Government is having a large ferry boat built at House Harbor to convey passengers and freight across the bay. Business between P. E. Island and the Magdalen is steadily increasing. The St. Olaf on her last trip carried a full cargo, taken in at Souris, consisting of goods, road carriages, cars and fishery supplies.

ERWORTH LEAGUE.—R. R. Fitzgerald, Esq., delivered an eloquent address last evening, before the Epworth League, on "Young Ireland." He referred particularly to the agitation carried on under the leadership of O'Connell and the Young Ireland party. Contrary to the rule of the League, an unanimous vote of thanks was voted, and complimentary remarks were made by the Rev. Mr. Webber, Mr. Newton, Mr. G. Frank Beer, Mr. W. L. Cotton and Mr. R. C. Goff. Miss Haslam played a beautiful piano solo, Miss Harris sang "The Meeting of the Waters," Miss Johnson sang "The Bells of Shandon," and Master Davison gave a recitation setting forth the circumstances under which Pat took the temperance pledge. Altogether a most enjoyable evening was spent. This being the last meeting of the literary branch for the season, the thanks of the large audience were unanimously voted to Mrs. Henry Smith, Miss Johnson, and all concerned in the preparation of the series of literary and musical entertainments held during the past winter under the auspices of the League.
