Large Docket Faces Kings Co. Magistrate

GEORGETOWN — A large number and variety of cases were before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston at Georgetown yesterday. J. Arthur McQuinn represented the Crown in all cases.

Ameas Hubert Butler of Gasperaux pleaded guilty to having possession of 123 under sized lobsters. The undersized lobsters were clear of his catch in a truck when seized by the fishery officers, it was stated. The accused was fined \$75 and costs and was warned by the court that if he was before the court again for possession of undersized lobsters apart from his catch in a truck or other vehicle that he could expect to have the vehicle confiscated.

Edgar H. Vanderlinde, Peters Road was fined \$20 and costs for having 31 undersized lobsters in his possession and Daniel John Condon, lower Montague pleaded not guilty to having 71 undersized lobsters in his catch. His case was adjourned to June 20.

Adjoined to the same date was the case of Carl James Cronin charged with impaired driving and who was represented by J. P. Nicholson.

Everett Owen Roche, Georgetown charged with causing a disturbance in a public place and Raymond George MacQuinn, Georgetown charged with assaulting a peace officer, both of whom are represented by J. P. Nicholson, had their cases adjourned to June 20.

Charles Marchion, Glen William who is represented by G.R. Foster, QC, pleaded guilty to assaulting a peace officer and his case adjourned for sentence to Charlottetown on June 11.

OFFENSIVE WEAPON — Ronald Joseph Macdonald, Cardigan represented by Mr. Foster who is charged with possession of an offensive weapon for a purpose dangerous to the public was fined \$100 and a journeyman by consent to July 4.

Howard John McDonald, Alton Cross charged with impaired driving and represented by G.R. Foster, QC, pleaded not guilty and the court heard the evidence of one Crown witness, Const. Walter S. Pincus of Montague detachment of RCMP and the case was adjourned to June 20 to hear further evidence.

Floyd Frederick White, Murray Harbor, represented by Mr. Foster, pleaded not guilty to a charge of impaired driving and had his case adjourned to July 4.

Albert Joseph MacPhee, Georgetown pleaded guilty to having been fined \$100 and costs for having the care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired. Charged with causing a disturbance by being drunk in the town of Souris William Sullivan Carter, represented by Mr. Hestian, had his case adjourned to Souris on June 13.

Joseph East Murphy, Georgetown charged with assaulting a peace officer and also with driving a motor vehicle in a manner dangerous to the public had both charges against him adjourned by consent in July 4. He is represented by Mr. Foster.

Harry Daniel Murphy, Montague represented by Mr. Hestian, and who is charged with impaired driving pleaded not guilty and had his case adjourned to July 4. Also charged with the same offense and pleading not guilty was George Higginbotham who was not represented by counsel and his case was adjourned to June 20.

ARSON CHARGE — Peter John Stubbart, Souris was remanded in custody to June 13 when he will appear in Souris on a charge of arson in connection with the recent series of fires in Souris.

Three men were each fined \$20 and costs for being intoxicated in public place, and four others were each fined \$20 and costs for having liquor in their possession in a place other than their residence. Two men were each fined \$5 and costs for failing to stop at a stop sign in Georgetown.

Edward Reynolds, Beech Murray River was fined \$15 and costs for having defective equipment on his motor vehicle. On a similar charge William Russell Jardine, Murray River and Cameron Douglas Irving, Sturgeon were each fined \$10 and costs.

Wendell James Matheson, Iris was fined \$10 and costs for not being the holder of a license.
