IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ARTHUR WRIGHT

—There passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harold K. Howatt, Augustine Cove, on February 25th, Alice A. Black, widow of the late W. Arthur Wright, in her ninety-fifth year.

Born in Searlestown on March 8, 1863, she was the daughter of the late Stephen R. Black and Isabella Calbeck, the last surviving member of their family of six children. She spent her girlhood and young womanhood in Searlestown, attending Mt. Allison Ladies' College during the years 1878-79.

In 1890 she married W. Arthur Wright of Searlestown, great grand son of Nathaniel Wright, United Empire Loyalist of Bedouque. They lived on the Wright homestead in Searlestown until 1907, when they moved to Central Bedouque. In 1910 they moved to Hampton, and in 1913 moved back to Bedouque where they stayed until 1917 when they moved to Charlottetown. In 1923 they moved back to Bedouque staying there until 1930 when they moved to Augustine Cove to spend the remaining years of their lives with their daughter, and where Mr. Wright died in 1945.

Mrs. Wright joined the former Methodist Church in Searlestown when only a child; she was a charter member of the Women's Missionary Society, organized in the year 1888. She taught in the Sunday School and for twenty-five years she was organist of the Searlestown Church. In the different places where she lived, after leaving Searlestown, she was always a faithful attendant at church services, but never took the active part in church work that she did in the old home church.

Possessed of a pleasing personality and a beautiful Christian character, she will long be remembered by all who knew her. Conscious almost to the last, she passed away in the early hours of the morning of February 25th, like one "who wraps the drapery of her couch about her and lies down to pleasant dreams."

Interment took place beside her husband, in the family plot in the Searlestown Cemetery.

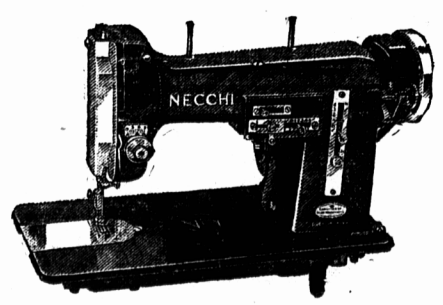

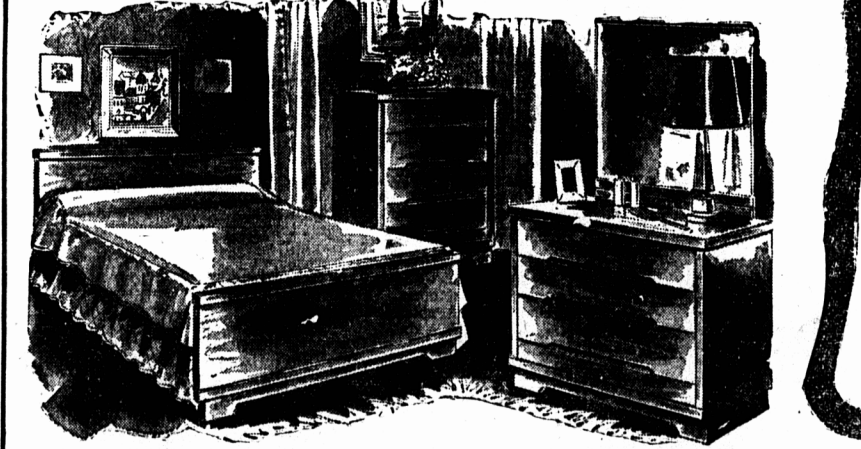
