Many are asking the question. To what extent does Hatchery reared trout improve the sport of angling? Experiments in the States tend to indicate that is "love's labour lost". A few years ago an experiment was tried out on a stream in the New England States. Two thousand nine inch trout or better than that length, were released in a three mile stretch of water that was screened off. It was impossible for any trout to escape or to have their stock augmented by native species. Those trout were fishable and of an average pan size and angling was allowed on the first day of liberation. Less than one thousand of the released trout, approximately 800, were harvested by anglers and this harvest was reaped in the first ten days. After this angling dropped to zero in respect to the Hatchery release although the odd native brookie was taken as was the case before the release.

**RESULTS NOT GOOD**  
It was conceded that approximately 98 per cent of fingerlings released never reached maturity and a policy instituted whereby trout were kept in a Hatchery until they were a nice pan size before they were transported to streams open to public fishing. For some as yet unexplained reason this policy has not achieved the results expected. One explanation offered that hatchery trout surfaced at a splash because their food thrown into the water created a disturbance on the surface and walked into either an angler or predator trap. I do not imagine will be taken too seriously by the angling fraternity. Me thinks the underlying cause goes deeper than that.

The conviction is growing that if more attention was paid to preserving the trout's natural spawning beds Nature would solve the trout problem in her own way. How can trout propagate their species when spawning beds are allowed to be buried under mud, gravel, sawdust, trout need clean gravel beds of a certain type to spawn in and not ridges of rotten refuse. True there is a law making it an offense to allow sawdust or other deleterious material to enter water frequented by trout but who writes any more over such common place things as regulations printed and then thrown into the waste paper basket.

**CASE IN POINT**  
Why spend thousands of dollars to build a dam, ostensibly as a tourist attraction, and then allow it to be used as a sawdust-catch basin? Here is a case in point: The Campbell dam at New Glasgow, an outstanding trout dam that went out some years ago, was rebuilt a year or so ago. A good job was done but the cost, in respect to dam building, reached a staggering total. It's a lovely stretch of water and definitely adds to the beauty of the surrounding countryside but what really useful purpose did it achieve? I understand that trout are practically non-existent in this masterpiece of engineering.

I have it on the highest authority that this summer a party of trout biologists conducted extensive trout studies on the dam and also on the stream at its head. They used a "shocker" an electric device for estimating the number of trout in any stream or trout pool, and their findings may be safely considered as accurate as it is possible to determine. It is alleged that they reported the spawning beds above the dam were almost completely obliterated by sawdust and that only a few fingerlings were found along a stretch of several miles of trout water second to none in the province if left in its natural state. No trout above the fingerling size were found either in the stream or in the dam proper. On the other hand evidence of sawdust accumulation in the dam proper had already reached alarming proportions.

**TROUT WERE THERE**  
In the stream below the dam hundreds of large trout were shocked out which goes to show that trout were there ready to move up if conditions were suitable above. They rushed out from under cutbanks like a flock of sheep when the electric current reached them. Anglers cooed this area the next day but never got a rise let alone a strike. One would think there wasn't a trout in the river. I wasn't one of them. I've seen this happen before.

**REMEMBER WHEN**  
Floyd (Arky) Vaughan, one-time National League star shortstop, was drowned at age 40 in a California lake six years ago today. During a 10-year career with Pittsburgh Pirates he was chosen the league's most valuable player in 1935, when he batted .385, and he went to Brooklyn Dodgers in 1942.

## Jim Ferree Takes Four-Stroke Lead To Make Plans For Series

VANCOUVER (CP)—Jim Ferree, a comparative unknown in big-time golf, clobbered the Point Grey course for an 11-under-par 61 Friday and a four-stroke lead over the field at the half point of the 72-hole \$42,000 British Columbia Centennial open championship. He scored nine birdies and one eagle on his tremendous round.

It was the lowest score on the golf trail this year and the 27-year-old bespectacled southerner from Winston-Salem, N.C., was almost speechless after his fantastic 18 which, together with an opening round 69, gave him 130 for the 36 holes.

One shot off the pace going into Thursday's second round, Ferree pumped into a four-stroke margin over Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla., and burly Mike Souchak of Grossinger, N.Y., who earlier in the day shot seven-under-par 65 and a 134-total. Finsterwald and Souchak also started the day with 69.

Ferree, followed by nearly 2,000 persons when word spread that he was seven under par after 14 holes, climaxed his tremendous effort with a 25-foot putt for an eagle three on the 460-yard 18th hole.

Tied for last money in the St. Paul Open and the Canadian open at Edmonton earlier this month, the jaunty sun-bronzed southerner wasn't even considered as a threat in the \$20,000, inked field here. He won 320 at St. Paul and \$103 at Edmonton.

"Man, that's the best I've ever done," he told reporters after Friday's round. "The best I've ever done previously was a 65."
