

Local K. Of C. Council Has Fine Achievement Record

Charlottetown Council No. 824 Knights of Columbus was instituted Dec. 13th 1903. It was the first Council to be established in the Maritime Provinces and so far as is known, only eleven of the original sixty five Charter members are still living. On January 24th, 1906, new Councils having been established in the meantime in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Newfoundland, Charlottetown became associated with these in the formation of a jurisdiction known as the State Council of Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland. The Charlottetown Council continued to make good progress and increase its membership, and during World War I, twenty one members donated the Kings uniform to do their share in the defence of freedom.

October 3rd, 1916 was a memorable day in the history of the Council, for it was on that date that James A. Flaherty, the first Supreme Knight to come to Charlottetown, made his official visit. In those days, transportation to the Island was by steamer from Pt. du Chene N.B. to Summerside. A committee went to Summerside to meet Bro. Flaherty on a special train manned entirely by Knights of Columbus. On his arrival at Charlottetown he met with a rousing reception that evening he delivered an inspiring address in the Council Chamber which was crowded.

The following day he was driven about, and shown points of interest in and around the city. An interesting coincidence of the Supreme Knight's visit was the arrival in Charlottetown at that time of a replica of the ship in which Columbus sailed on his voyage of discovery to America. Credit for bringing the Supreme Knight to the Maritime Provinces is due to Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, who extended the invitation while a delegate to the Supreme convention in Vancouver.

During World War I a drive was conducted by Knights all over Canada, to raise funds for K. of C. Army Huts. This drive was an outstanding success. In this Province the drive was under the chairmanship of Louis B. MacMillan and exceeded its quota by a substantial amount.

In 1920 two new Councils were established in this province, one in Summerside and one in Souris. With three Councils, the State Council of Prince Edward Island was established with annual meetings held in the chambers of each Council in turn.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of Charlottetown was celebrated by banquet at the Victoria Hotel on January 13th, 1928. There was a large attendance including a goodly number of Charter members. Grand Knight, E.J.H. Morrissey presided, and the guest speaker was Bro. J.J. Johnston, first Grand Knight of the Council.

Responding to the toast, "The Day We Celebrate", Bro. Johnston gave a highly interesting description of the early days of the Council and the events leading up to its organization.

On April 26th, 1928 Supreme Director, Dr. Claude Brown gave an interesting address, dealing with the founding of the Knights of Columbus, their ideals and work done for general welfare. He cited many instances, such as the California earthquake, the Halifax Disaster and others in which Knights played a prominent roll in rendering assistance.

In the summer of 1931 the first eraphans' picnic was organized in which members of the Council put on a picnic at the shore for the children and sisters of St. Vincent's Orphanage. This picnic, which proved most enjoyable has continued to be one of the Council's regular annual activities.

On June 22nd, 1931 the Council was favored with a visit from Supreme Knight Martin H. Carmody, who arrived in this city accompanied by his wife and

The fortieth anniversary of Charlottetown Council was celebrated on Oct 31st and Nov. 1st, 1943. The members were happy to have with them on that occasion Supreme Knight Francis P. Maithe who was specially invited to be present for the occasion. A feature of the celebration was the official opening of the K. of C. Hut by the Supreme Knight. This Hut had recently been transferred to the council rooms from another building in the city. On the second evening of his visit he was guest speaker at a banquet at the Charlottetown Hotel. Here he gave a gripping account of his visit to the British Isles by bomber, and described his interviews with Protestant and Roman Catholic Chaplains, seeing these chaplains at work convinced him more than ever of the supreme importance of religious influence.

The K. of C. Hut located in the Council Rooms closed Nov. 30th, 1945. Many complimentary remarks were heard by members of the Armed Services on the excellence of this Hut. In October 1945, Mr. F.G. O'Neill, a K. of C. Hut Supervisor at Hong Kong who was a prisoner of war of the Japanese for almost four years received an enthusiastic welcome home by his brother members.

A K. of C. Boys Camp operated jointly by the three Island Councils was in operation for the first time in the summer of 1947. Some 160 boys each enjoyed 10 days outing where, under proper supervision they are taught to swim, play and live together. Grateful thanks are due to Dr. J.A. MacMillan and the committee who worked with him in this worthy undertaking.

Some fifty-two members of this Council served in the armed services in World War II.

In May, 1951 our new home on Water St. was officially opened by Dr. W. MacMillan. There was a large attendance and at the conclusion of the opening ceremonies a pleasant social evening was enjoyed by those present.

The Fiftieth Anniversary of the Council was celebrated by a banquet at the Charlottetown Hotel Nov. 5th, 1953. Supreme Director Gregory Feeney, Campbellton, N. B., was guest speaker. A highlight of the occasion was the reply to the toast to Charter members by Rt. Rev. G.J. McLellan, Brother L.B. MacMillan, also a charter member cut the birthday cake. D.G.K. George Cheverie was toastmaster.

The above are just a few of the many activities of Council 824. Space does not permit of a recital of the many worth while activities which were part of the work done down through the years.

This year the local Council commemorated Columbus Day with an address by Dr. F.A. MacMillan and by holding their annual Columbus Day Ball.
