Detroit Red Wings Ready To Make It Three Straight In Stanley Cup Series

TORONTO, April 8.—Starring a cast of 14, most of whom are ordinary players under ordinary circumstances, Detroit Red Wings were declared ready and "plenty willing" tonight to win the Stanley Cup in three straight games. They can do it by defeating Toronto Maple Leafs here tomorrow night.

A sell-out crowd of more than 14,000 will watch the staggering Leafs, beaten 3-1 and 9-4 in the first two games of the best-of-five series at Detroit, attempt to steady themselves and prolong the series. The Leafs, always favorites at home, are underdogs this time.

President James Norris and Manager Jack Adams, surprised at their own good fortune, led the Wings into town today and Adams stressed the fact he was handling 14 stars.

"Golly," he gurgled, "every player on the team has taken a turn at bringing the house down in these playoffs. I never saw anything like it."

Adams said he would not be disappointed if the Wings were beaten tomorrow night, though he fully expected to win.

"We will win this series anyway, because we are a better team," he asserted. "We have more all-around strength than Toronto and we are younger, so that if the series goes to four or five games we can call on superior reserves."

Red Wings started to establish themselves as stars in the first round game against Montreal. Normie Smith, goalminder who was on the auction block most of the season, set the pace and the Wings quickly followed suit.

"Two years ago in the N. H. L. finals," Adams ruminated, "we won the first two from Toronto, but they came back and took the next two. We had a hard time winning that series. Don't forget two things this time—first, the Wings are a much stronger team than in 1934, and second, the Leafs aren't nearly as strong."

But Adams believes the Leafs will be a difficult proposition tomorrow night before a home crowd. He expects the last stand of Conny Smythe's machine to be a good one. "Our motto," he said, "is remember Boston." We came back in that series a couple of weeks ago for an 8-3 win at home after losing 3-0 in Boston. The boys think they can do it again."

Smythe and Coach Dick Irvin may have been as confident, but they said little.

Olympics Turn Back Bulldogs 8-1

DETROIT, April 8.—Detroit Olympics, moving with the same power of the big-league Red Wings, scored a smashing 8-1 triumph over Windsor Bulldogs in the first game of the International Hockey League championship series here tonight.

The brilliant display made Olympics strong favorites to win the best-of-five series, to be resumed in Windsor Friday night.

Olympics opened their drive midway through the first period and left no doubt as to their superiority. Bulldogs started the scoring but Detroit wiped out a one-goal deficit and had a 2-1 lead at the end of the first. They shot four goals past goaler Earl Robertson in the second and another two in the third.

For a time in the second period, Olympics played two men short but a brilliant defence in front of Walter Broda did not weaken. Three major penalties enlivened the period with Johnny Siefert drawing one for slashing Dave Downie, and Don Deacon and Don Smillie for fighting.

Orville Roulston led the Detroit snipers with two goals with Carl Liscombe, Art Giroux, Johnny Gallagher, Fred Hergert, Ron Hudson and Siefert getting on the score. Jim Arnott sank the lone Windsor goal six minutes after the start of the game.

(NEW YORK, April 8.—A tour of 11 European countries is promised Joe Louis if he hurdles Max Schmeling in June and then goes on to win the world's heavyweight championship from James J. Braddock.

Jeff Dickson, former Jackson, Miss., boy who went to Paris and became Europe's no. one sports promoter, came to New York today and outlined a proposition which Mike Jacobs O.K.'d immediately on the condition that Joe's summer and fall campaign carries him to the heavyweight throne.

Starting in October, Dickson wants Louis to appear in exhibitions in England, France, Portugal, Spain, Denmark, Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Australia and F. O. and F. O. and F. O.

The tour already is booked. Jacobs has the consent of Louis and his managers. All that remains to be done is for the "Brown Bomber" to add Schmeling and Braddock to his rapidly mounting list of ring victims.

Another reason for Dickson's visit to this country is to try to lure Max Baer out of retirement.

"If Max really is serious about a comeback, I'll accommodate him," said the promoter. "I can book him for fights in London, Paris and Madrid."
