Full-time broadcast governors will be appointed for seven-year terms and part-time governors to five-year terms. The president and vice-president of the CBC would be appointed for seven years and directors for three years.

Initial appointments of some of the part-time governors and directors may be for periods less than the maximum to start a system of staggered appointments

Only One Change In CBC Planned Under New Act

OTTAWA (CP) — The government Tuesday proposed a new Broadcasting Act containing only one major change from the original legislation adopted 22 years ago.

The one big change involves establishment of a new regulatory body for broadcasting — called Board of Broadcast Governors — that would be separate from the CBC.

There are a number of other changes, but none that would alter the basic Canadian concept of a national broadcasting system made up of joint private and public enterprise.

The bill, introduced in the Commons by Revenue Minister Nowlan, provides that the CBC be retained, but under a new administrative set-up.

The new Board of Broadcast Governors would assume substantially the same regulatory powers now held by the CBC board of governors under the existing Broadcasting Act.

RADIO ACT STAYS

While the new act will repeal the old one, it does not touch the Radio Act which gives the government its licensing powers in the field of broadcasting.

1. The new regulatory board will be made up of three full-time members and 12 part-time members appointed by the cabinet.

2. The CBC would have a president — instead of a general manager as at present — as its chief executive officer, a vice-president, and nine part-time directors, also appointed by the cabinet.

3. The new board would be empowered to "grant permission to any person to operate a network of broadcasting stations or revoke any permission so granted."

4. A five-year capital financing program for the CBC, to be proposed to Parliament one year after the new act comes into force by cabinet proclamation.

5. The CBC would be permitted to spend any amount — subject to its financial resources — on programming, but still would have to obtain cabinet permission for capital expenditures in excess of \$100,000. At present the CBC needs cabinet approval of all spending items of more than \$25,000.

6. The present provision of a suspension of up to three months — subject to appeal to the Exchequer Court of Canada — of a broadcaster's licence for non-observance of broadcasting regulations or conditions of the licence, is retained.

BOTH SIDES SILENT Both the CBC management and the Canadian Association of Broadcasters declined comment on the bill.

However, T. J. Allard, executive vice-president of the CAB, said the organization's 19-member executive will meet here Thursday to study the legislation.

In many respects regarding the licensing, regulating and general supervision of a national broadcasting system, the bill follows the recommendations of the Fowler royal commission on broadcasting which recommended in

March, 1957, the establishment of a Board of Broadcast Governors separate from the CBC.

However, it differs on details. For example, the royal commission proposed that the new board comprise 15 part-time members only.

While the Fowler commission had suggested a president and vice-president to head the CBC, as a publicly-owned corporation, it had proposed that there be no part-time directors.

The Fowler commission also proposed a plan of long-term financing for the CBC, involving parliamentary grants totalling \$470,000,000 in the six years ending in 1963.

NO MENTION

But apart from the proposed five-year capital spending program mentioned in the bill, there is no suggestion as to whether the government plans to alter the present financing of the CBC.

The corporation now receives most of its revenue from parliamentary grants and a special 15-per-cent excise tax on radio and television sets and parts. The rest, about a third of its revenue,

comes from commercial and other revenues.

The bill provides for no change in the present government policy of licensing only one TV station in any one area.

Mr. Nowlan, v o reports to Parliament for the CBC, has said there will be no change in this policy until the new board is established and has drawn up broadcasting regulations.

Both the new Board of Broadcast Governors and the CBC will report to Parliament.

Members of the new board and the CBC directors must be Canadian citizens and have no financial or other interest in a broadcasting station or in the manufacture or distribution of broadcasting apparatus.

However, a person who disassociates himself from such a connection would be eligible for membership on the Board of Broadcast Governors or the CBC board of directors.

There was no debate on the bill which was introduced after the Commons discussed briefly and approved a resolution preliminary to the legislation. Debate on second reading — ap

Dragger Finds Odd Object

DIGBY, N. S. (CP)—The Digby dragger Loretta L. arrived Wednesday carrying a cone-shaped object apparently made in Los Angeles, Calif.

Capt. Clarence Greek said his crew pulled the object, made of a substance which appears similar to pressed paper, from the bay of Fundy while on a fishing trip. At its tip is a metal swivel, with a nylon cord attached.

The object is red, three feet high and coated inside with plastic foam. It is hollow and empty when found.

Capt. Greek said the only legible printing reads "Del-Engleering Laboratories, Los Angeles, Calif., Fran-Handle W." He said the cone appeared to have been attached to a lower section which was not found.
