Find Many Mothers Work Outside Home

CALGARY, Sept. 28 — (CP) — About 20 per cent of the children attending elementary grades in Calgary public schools have mothers who are employed in full-time occupations outside the home.

The information was gathered in a survey of public schools involving 2,276 children in grades one to seven.

Hiram F. Coulter, assistant superintendent of the Children's Aid Department, said "I am opposed to mothers working, but the economic situation today is forcing them to do so."

The survey showed that in one section of the city nearly 60 per cent of the mothers were working.

The situation was similar in both new and old sections of the city.

Principals of schools in new sections expressed the opinion that mothers were working to aid in the payment for new homes and all the necessary articles to make a home complete.

In the older districts mothers felt the need to work to keep up with the present strain on their husband's pay-checks.

The consensus was that in most cases mothers were forced to work through economic circumstances and that little could be done about it.
