crisis which strikes fear into minds which face reality? Therefore, having had recourse once again to the goodness of God and the mercy of Mary, each one of the faithful and every man of good will must re-examine, with a courage worthy of the great moments of human history, what he can and must do personally as his own contribution to the saving power of God, in order to help a world which is started, as it is today, on the road to ruin.

In an indirect reference to the world's ills, including Godless communism, the Pope said a "general condition exists which 'may explode at any minute.'"

The origin of this condition he went on to say is sought in "the religious lukewarmness of so many, in the low moral tone of public and private life, in systematic efforts to poison simple minds, to which poison is given after their understanding of true liberty has, so to speak, been drugged."

Community Memorial Service Planned

Under the auspices of the Charlottetown Ministerial Association a public service of memorial tribute in honour of his late Majesty, King George VI, will be held in Trinity Church on Friday, the day of the royal funeral, at eight o'clock in the evening. Invitations have been extended to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, the Premier, and His Worship the Mayor. The service will be open to members of all churches and the citizens in general. The President of the Association, the Rev. Henry Barber, will conduct the worship and the following Ministers have been invited to assist: The Rev. H. E. D. Ashford, the Rev. J. D. Davison, the Rev. M. D. Dunbar, the Rev. E. C. Evans, the Rev. J. T. Abbott, the Rev. John Irwin, and Captain Leslie Titcombe. The memorial address will be given by the Rev. T. H. B. Somers. The music of the service will be under the direction of the organist of Trinity Church.

One Killed Four Injured In Crash

OTTAWA, Feb. 10—(CP)—Cpl. G. W. Healy, 31, of Hill End, Alta., was killed and four other persons seriously injured Friday when an R.C.A.F. Lancaster crashed on take-off at Goose Bay, Labrador. Air Force headquarters reported.

Cpl. Healy, an aero engine technician who joined the R. C. A. F. in 1941 and saw service overseas in the war, was attached to No. 408 Squadron. His wife lives in Ottawa.

Seriously injured were Squadron Leader James P. Coyne, 31, of Swan River, Man., captain of the aircraft and second-in-command of 408 Squadron; FO. W. N. Neilly, 21, of Gifford, Ont.; FO. Ivan K. Wilson, 21, of Ottawa, and FO. J. A. Mitchell, 21, of Caledon, Ont.

Extent of their injuries was not reported. Uninjured in the crash were the plane's radio officer, FO D. W. Doucet, 24, of Edmonton, and a photographer, Cpl. L. E. Kinley, 25, of Truro, N. S.

The Lancaster, which was at Goose Bay for reconnaissance duties in connection with exercise "Sundog III", was based at Rockcliffe.

The crash was attributed to failure of one of the engines.

Russia Objects

The treaty also provided that Italy pay Russia \$100,000,000 either in war industry equipment, current production or Italian assets left in the Soviet satellites of Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania.

When the Western Powers waived the treaty's arms limitations, Rome asked Moscow for a similar release. The Kremlin replied that she would give no waiver on the arms terms unless Italy pulled out of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Death Of King Mourned In City Church Services

In solemn tribute to his late Majesty King George VI churches throughout the Island held special commemorative services along with their regular Sunday services yesterday.

The sorrow of a nation was reflected in the deeply respectful attitude of congregations throughout the city as they listened to the simple words of praise for a monarch who had earned a place in the affections of all mankind regardless of race, creed or religion. The pulpit and lectern were draped in purple at St. Peter's Cathedral in Charlottetown, as Rev. Canon E. M. Malone chose for his sermon from the gospel of the day, "Call the Labourers and Give Them Their Hire." Prior to the sermon, prayers were asked for the late monarch and following the celebration of the sermon prayers were offered to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth I. Closing the service the national anthem was sung followed by the late King's favorite hymn: "The King of Love My Shepherd Is."

Rev. T. H. B. Somers of the Kirk of St. James, in a touching tribute to his late Majesty emphasized the "Service Above Self" which the life of the late King had always illustrated. The devotion to duty and efforts towards betterment of the Commonwealth, the minister said were factors which endeared King George VI to his millions of subjects.

Favorite Hymns

Appropriate hymns including the 32nd psalm, "The Lord Is My Shepherd" and "The Recessional" were sung. During the singing of the anthem "Blest are the Pure in Heart" the solo part was taken by Mr. Raoul Raymond during the morning service. In the evening the anthem was "Hail Gladden Light" with Mrs. N. D. MacLean singing as a solo "Lord In Adoration Kneeling."

The Browns, under leadership of Mrs. Jan Burnett, and the Cubs led by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Perry, attended the morning services in a body.

The prayers of the congregation were asked for the late monarch by celebrants of Masses at both St. Dunstan's Basilica and the Church of the Most Holy Redeemer.

Rev. J. T. Davison of the Baptist Church chose for his sermon "Alone Yet Not Alone", stressing that the King in his late days had the threat of death and God's love as his constant companion.

In St. Paul's Church, the altar was flag draped in purple, in respect to his late Majesty. A special sermon was delivered by the Reverend J. T. Abbott eulogizing his late Majesty.

The Rev. H. E. D. Ashford of Trinity United Church selected for his sermon: "Know Ye Not but a Prince and a Great Man Is Fallen This Day In Israel." During the service hymns appropriate for the occasion were sung.

It was announced by Bishop J.H. Waterman, that special services will be conducted in the various Churches of England Friday, February 15th, the day of the funeral of His Late Majesty, King George Sixth.

How Many Dead? Even Reds Must Guess At Score

HONG KONG, Feb. 10—(AP)—How many persons have the Communists killed in their 18-month purge of party enemies in Red China?

The question is asked frequently in the Far East. In the opinion of Hong Kong observers at least, even Peiping itself doesn't know the full score.

Estimates run from 250,000 to more than 5,000,000 purge victims. An inkling of the toll is contained in a recent report of Shen Chun-Ju, chief justice of the Communist Supreme People's Court.

Shen said during the first half of 1951 the Reds purged 820,285 cases to trial. At the end of that period "there still was an accumulation of untried cases."

There was no official hint how many were shot, how many were sent to labor camps or prisons, or how many were released.

If the 820,285 can be taken as an average number of Chinese brought to trial during each six months, about 2,500,000 to 3,200,000 have fasted purge courts in the last 18 months to two years.

Hong Kong observers do not think Peiping knows the full toll because there seems to be little doubt that many county and township commissars or courts did a lot of purging on their own, without reference to the Communist capital.

O'Dwyer's Friend J. J. Moran Guilty

NEW YORK, Feb. 9—James J. Moran recently was found guilty of conspiracy and extortion. In running what the prosecution called a \$500,000-a-year fire department shakedown ring.

A jury decided that Moran, a close friend of former Mayor William O'Dwyer, was the key figure in shaking down the fuel oil installers.

The jury found him guilty in one count of conspiracy and 23 of extortion. This means he could spend the rest of his life behind bars.

The 50-year-old Moran, a political appointee of O'Dwyer, could get a sentence of 7 1/2 to 15 years on each extortion count.

On the conspiracy conviction, he could be sentenced up to three years.

He was remanded to prison after the verdict. Sentencing was set for March 4.

Moran already is appealing a five-year Federal prison term for lying to the Kefauver Senate Crime Committee about his relations with a Brooklyn numbers racketeer.
