SUPREME COURT.

WEDNESDAY, July 14.

Thos. W. Henderson vs. James E. Grant. Tried at Summerside; verdict for plaintiff. The court discharges rule for new trial. The attorney general for defendant, Neil McQuarrie for plaintiff, Chas. Alfred Chouillon vs. Donald Farquharson. Action for breach of contract. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald gives judgment for plaintiff for \$100. Stewart, Q. C., for plaintiff; F. L. Hazard, Q. C., for defendant.

Rebecca Wadman and another vs. Arvan E. Wadman. Action on account. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald gives judgment for plaintiff for \$107.31.

James McLeod and another vs. John Lacey. This case was tried at Summerside and was not suited. Mr. McQuarrie, plaintiff's attorney, makes application for assize judgment of non-suit. The court refused the application and discharged the rule.

James Delonjous vs. Daniel F. Macdonald. Mr. Morson is now showing cause against rule for new trial, &c. The Attorney General in support of rule.

MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.

Scott Act Enforcement For Discussion—New Watering Cart.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening, Mayor Dawson presiding and every member of the Board being in his place.

After routine business the Park Roadway Committee submitted the following report: Your Committee, as requested at last meeting of the City Council, have considered the plans and specifications prepared by Mr. John P. Nicholson, and find the estimated cost of constructing 400 feet as described in resolution passed at last meeting of Council in accordance with said plan to be \$1,345.

It was decided to grant the prayer of a number of citizens who protested against the removal of the electric light from Hillsborough Park.

A letter was read from Carvell Bros. stating that they were prepared to take a release of Powell wharf for a term of 41 years at a yearly rental of \$850, with the option at the end of that time of extending for an additional five years at the same rate. Referred to the public property committee.

On motion Mr. J. B. Macdonald presented a member of the City School Board.

On motion of Councillor Hughes it was decided to purchase a new watering cart, from DeWolfe & Co., Halifax, the cost of which is \$4,000.

Whereas, It is evident from the records of the police court that the prosecutors are not enforcing the Canada Temperance Act as they were some time ago.

Therefore Resolved, That this Council do now instruct the prosecutors to vigorously enforce the Act from this time forward.

Councillor Hooper seconded the motion. After some discussion on the matter Councillor Taylor moved that Councillor Hooper leave to withdraw his motion.

Councillor Nicholson seconded the motion. Mayor Dawson pointed out that the attendance of the Recorder at Council meetings was purely voluntary. As for Councillor Hooper's motion, he thought it might be altered and put in a more suggestive form and then the prosecutors could be ordered to attempt a most vigilant enforcement of the Act.

The resolution as it stands, without knowledge of the facts, a reflection upon the Council, and by slightly altering the form of the resolution no reflection would be cast upon any person. So far as he was personally concerned there was no party to any complaint with the prosecutors, and he believed that no such complaint existed. He thought it imprudent to pass the resolution in its present form.

Several members of the Board disclaimed all knowledge of a compact with the Scott Act prosecutors, and it was pointed out that Councillor Hooper's resolution was a reflection upon the Police Committee, of which Councillor Hooper was himself a member. But Councillor Hooper refused to withdraw his resolution, characterizing the attempt to choke off discussion as "cowardly, unjust and wrong."

On a vote being taken there appeared for Councillor Taylor's amendment, Taylor, Nicholson, Douse and McCarron; and against it, Hughes, Hooper, and Johnson. Mayor Dawson gave his casting vote against the amendment. The Board then divided on Councillor Hooper's motion, there appearing in support of it, Hooper, Hughes and Johnson, and against it, Taylor, Nicholson, Douse and McCarron. Mayor Dawson also voted against the main resolution for the reasons which he had previously stated. Meeting adjourned sine die.

THE BICYCLE ROAD RACE.

Unsworth Takes First Prize, Morris Second and Hazard Third.

A great crowd of people assembled on St. Peter's Road last evening to witness the finish of the C. W. A. road race. The race was from Houston's Hotel, Brackley Point, to a point in the vicinity of the Halifax Edward Island Hospital, and there were six starters. There was a considerable start when Mr. L. A. Hazard crossed the line first, followed by Mr. L. Unsworth a few seconds later, there was much enthusiasm. The following table shows the time of starting and finishing and the elapsed time:

Several of the contestants met with accidents, which interfered more or less with their speed. Mr. F. W. L. Moore collided with a dog after he had been under way some time, injuring the fork of his wheel. Mr. Duchemia struck a stone and was thrown from his wheel.

Mr. Allan's wheel broke when he was about four and a half miles from the city, and he was forced to retire. Mr. Malton also dropped out of the race about the same place. Before starting Mr. Hazard broke his handle bar and had to use one he borrowed at the hotel which was not of much service.

Capt. W. W. Moore was starter, and Councillor Johnson, Charles J. Patton and Geo. A. Sharp were judges at the finish.

In the evening the club were entertained at Carter's restaurant by Mr. Mark Wright, agent for the Stearns "Yellow Fern," one of which was won by Mr. Unsworth who won the race. The presentation of the prizes closed an evening's entertainment that will be long remembered by the participants.

It is stated here that the first prize valuable bicycle lantern, was given by Mr. J. P. Pabado, President of the club; the second prize, a pair of opera glasses valued at \$4, was given by Mr. Isaac Carter, vice-President of the club; a bicycle bell, a cyclometer and bicycle bell, was donated by individual members of the club.

THE HALIFAX SUMMER CARNIVAL.

The formation of a war and other objects of interest will be open every day to sightseers. The infinite variety of nature's beauty in the parks and gardens of Halifax will combine with all this to make a magnificent and memorable event which those who see it will not forget.

Excursion rates will be given on all lines of transportation to the city and arranged to display and do to make the Halifax Summer Carnival of 1896 an epoch event which those who see it will not forget.
