TUESDAY TOURS OFFER MANY CHANCES TO GLIMPSE ROYAL PARTY

The aged, the ill and the invalided will have special opportunities to glimpse Her Majesty the Queen and Prince Philip during a "slow drive" tour which will take them Tuesday from (1) the royal yacht, past (2) the Charlottetown Hospital, (3) P.E.I. Hospital and (4) Provincial Sanatorium and Rehabilitation Centre, before they proceed to (5) the Confederation Centre for the dedication program there. Starting at 2:28 p.m. the tour will proceed by Queen, Water, Haviland, Rochford and Kent Streets, Pond Road, Brighton Road, McGill Avenue, Ambrose Street, Brighton

Road, and Euston, Queen and Grafton streets. At 5 p.m. they return to the Britannia via Grafton and Queen Streets. At 8:14 p.m. they are to go back to the Confederation Centre Theatre by way of Queen and Grafton streets, and will reverse the route in returning to the yacht at 10:50 p.m.

Elizabeth spent happy childhood

Elizabeth Alexandra Mary Windsor, christened with the names of three queens—her mother, grandmother and great-grandmother—passed her early years in an intimate family atmosphere free from any hint of future royal responsibilities.

"Seldom can a royal child have enjoyed so simple and normal an early upbringing," commented a British newspaper. Born April 21, 1926, at 17 Bruton Street in London's Mayfair district, home of her maternal grandparents, the Earl and Countess of Strathmore, the golden-haired, blue-eyed first grand-daughter of King George V and Queen Mary grew up in a household where doors were never slammed in anger.

"I've got a baby sister," Elizabeth, exclaimed joyfully. "I'm going to call her Bubi!"

Asked why she chose the name, she replied: "I've got a baby sister."
