KOENIGSWINTER, West Germany (Reuters)—Marshal of the Air Force Sir John Slessor, one of Britain's wartime air chiefs, Sunday charged Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin with "a leading responsibility for the coldest-blooded black-hearted bit of treachery" of the Second World War.

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Davy Crockett Craze Sweeps Great Britain In Full Force

LONDON (Reuters)—The Davy Crockett craze, which swept the United States and to a lesser degree, Canada a year ago, now has caught on in Britain.

That's putting it mildly. In a store in Glasgow recently the manager had to call out the police when hundreds of youngsters stampeded at a personal appearance of the fearless frontiersman.

Fess Parker, the actor who plays the old-time Tennessee rifleman on the screen and television in the United States, paused midway through a three-week tour of Britain and described his reception as fantastic.

Transferred From NATO By France

TEL AVIV (AP)—Twelve Mystere fighters have been received from France and will be put on public parade today in connection with Israel's celebration of its independence, a high Israeli military source said Sunday.

The informant said the planes, which he indicated would some day equalize for a time the delivery of Soviet MIG 15 fighters to Egypt by the Communist bloc, would fly over Haifa today for the Israeli public to see for the first time.

The display will be just the day before United Nations Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold arrives for conferences with Israeli officials on his Middle East peace mission.

Hammarskjold, at his headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon, worked with his staff until a day today following an automobile tour of the tense Gaza strip border and southern Israel. He crossed the bordering demarcation line en route from Cairo to Beirut.

TENSION RELIEVED In the week he has been in the Middle East, Hammarskjold has succeeded in relieving the tension somewhat. Shootings across the Israeli-Egyptian border have almost stopped. Both sides have agreed unconditionally to refrain from violence except in self-defence, but Hammarskjold's aides have declined to say whether both sides have actually given orders to their troops to make the agreement effective.

The wall of air raid sirens throughout Israel Sunday morning ushered in National Remembrance Day in honor of those killed in the war with the Arab states eight years ago.

President Zvi Ben-Zur, in connection with the observance of Independence Day today, issued a message urging Israeli youth to prepare for "defence against any attack by the enemy who threatens to destroy us."

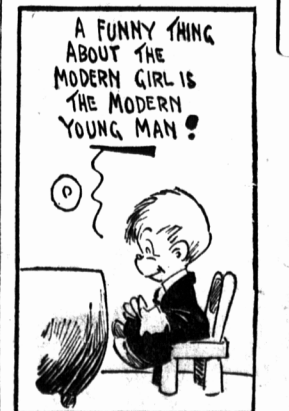
