Indecent Assault Case Brings Suspended Term

SUMMERSIDE — William Charles Matthews, Cape Traverse, was given a suspended sentence of one year on a charge of indecent assault in County Court yesterday before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald.

The accused was represented by Allison Gillis, who asked for the suspended sentence in view of the fact that no violence had occurred and that reports by two psychiatrists had recommended psychiatric treatment.

Magistrate MacDonald passed the suspended sentence on condition that \$2,000 bond be posted; that the accused would be of good behavior during that period; that medical treatment of the accused would commence within one week and quarterly reports be made to the court; and that the sentence be reviewed in one year.

John Bennett MacDonald, Travellers Rest, accused of impaired driving and of assaulting a police officer, pleaded not guilty to both charges. The case was adjourned for trial Nov. 2.

The court suspended the sentence for two years on condition that a recognizance be entered into for the sum of \$500 with the father of the appellant as a surety. The accused must keep the peace and be of good behaviour for two years; remain in lawful employment; report monthly to the provincial probation officer and appear for sentencing if called upon to do so.
