Continued from page 1 chairman of the negotiating committee for 15 International Unions: A. R. Mosher, chief spokesman for the two Canadian Unions involved and some other Union officers. At 4 P. M., the Prime Minister and his colleagues will meet with Donald Gordon, chairman and president of the C. N. R.; W. A. Mather, president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and other rail officials.

A brief announcement from Mr. St. Laurent's office at 3:15 P. M. said only that the disputes had been invited here and had accepted. It said nothing about what the Prime Minister might do.

Chartered Accountants Minus A Guest Speaker

The railway strike had its first untoward effect yesterday upon the convention of the Dominion Association of Chartered Accountants at the strikebound C. N. R. Charlottetown Hotel.

Yesterday morning one of the principal guest speakers at the convention failed to deliver his address. Dr. J. R. Petrie, Professor of Political Science and Economics at the University of New Brunswick, who was to speak on taxation problems of small businesses, was held up by the rail strike somewhere on the mainland.

Other speakers were, however, more fortunate in reaching the Island. George A. Keeping, C.A., of Montreal, H. J. Egan, C.A., of Halifax, and H. S. Moffet, C.A., of Regina, all delivered their addresses on schedule.

Under discussion by the three speakers was the subject of income tax. Mr. Keeping spoke on the new provision made by Parliament at its last session which will allow companies with less than 75 shareholders to pay a special tax on past profits which have not been distributed and in this way free the shareholders of any liability to pay personal income tax on the same profits.

Mr. Egan discussed recent changes in the Income Tax Act relating to the deduction of interest payments and the question of allowances for bad debts.

The large audience joined in a lively discussion following the address, and it was apparent that the accountants see many difficulties in the new laws, some of which, it was suggested, may call for amending legislation.

Following the meeting a group photograph was taken of the delegates in the hotel grounds. Coruscious at the side was a sign erected by the striking hotel employees: "On Strike For A 40 Hour Week With The Same Take-Home Pay". A sentiment which the hard-working accountants seemed to think a good idea for themselves also.

Ferry Service Part Of Trans-Canada Highway States Premier Jones

A strong additional argument in favour of immediate action on the part of the Federal Department of Transport in taking control of the Borden-Tormentine ferry service was made by Premier J. Walter Jones in addressing the Dominion Chartered Accountants Association at their convention luncheon in the Queen Hotel yesterday.

The Premier pointed out that under the Trans-Canada Highway agreement, signed on April 24 last, it is specified that the highway in this Province must follow the shortest practical route between the ferry terminals at Borden and Wood Islands. This implied Dominion Government recognition of the fact that the car ferry services linking this Province with the mainland are part of the Trans-Canada highway system.

The manner in which this Province is dependent on the Dominion Government for transportation to the mainland was strongly emphasized in the Premier's address. He also advised the visiting accountants that they might run into a gasoline shortage when they returned to the mainland.

The luncheon was sponsored by the P. E. I. Institute of Chartered Accountants, and during the meeting which followed Col. P. F. Seymour, chairman of the Dominion Examining Board, awarded the gold medal to Mr. F. L. Ngwood London, Ontario, who had attained the highest marks in last year's final examinations for C. A. degree.

Members of the convention and their wives were guests at a cocktail party aboard the two naval frigates in port last evening, following which a moonlight cruise aboard the "Fairview" was thoroughly enjoyed.
