THE SHIRT WAIST MAN.

Has Been Fully Recognized at Atlanta, Ga.

The shirt-waist man has been fully debarred from attendance at the United States Circuit Court at Boston. In Louisville, Ky., the parade committee of the local lodge of Elks have decided to adopt shirt waists as their parade uniform at the fall carnival. But it is in Atlanta, Ga., that the shirt waist man owes full recognition. In response to the written petition of a majority of women boarders of the fashionable Hotel Majestic, the proprietor granted permission to gentlemen to appear in the dining room in their shirt waists, a privilege of which half a hundred took advantage at dinner a few nights ago. Gov. Wm. J. Northen led the procession of shirt waists. His waist was a snow-white garment, gathered at the yoke in small tucks. The black tie wore in the narrow collar was partly hidden by his whiskers, but his silver belt buckle was wholly unobscured and flashing resplendent, rivaling the cut glass and table silver in brilliancy. The shirt waists ranged in color from white to purple. There were red, black and blue striped garments. Belts were in all the colors of the rainbow. Joined together they might have formed effective strings for a maypole dance. The wearers of the waists and belts were quite as diversified in form as was their attire in color. There were tall men, short men, lean men, fat men, men with whiskers and men with shaven faces. The combination of colors and shapes in the elegant dining-room made picturesque display. The women of the hotel were proud of their victory as they observed the neatness and comfort evinced in the shirt-waists and the smiles of satisfaction on the faces of the wearers. "We just couldn't stand in the way of their comfort in this hot weather," said one of the women. "We were all glad of an opportunity to sign such a petition."

WALDERSEE'S DEPARTURE.

Has Taken a Seven-Room House With Him.

The German Emperor has made a great fuss over the departure of Count Walderssee. If the Count should happen to get to China before the war is over he will not likely suffer much discomfort during the campaign. He has had shipped a seven room house for his own use during the campaign. He calls it his "Kriegshaus" (war house). It is built entirely of asbestos and is as hard as stone. It is bullet proof, fireproof, waterproof, insulated against electricity, proof against heat and against cold. It is sections arranged so as to be easily portable, and now lies, packed in boxes, in the hold of the transport. In this house are seven large, comfortable rooms, consisting of an audience chamber, workroom, bedroom and bathroom for the field marshal, a room for his adjutant and rooms for his servants. The "Kriegshaus" was ordered two weeks ago and has been built entirely since then. The count is ahead of Wellington, Napoleon, Roberts, Grant or any of the heroes in point of equipment. How he and his house will flourish in the campaign will be watched with interest.

MONCTON, Aug. 27.—The storm of Sunday evening was very severe in New Brunswick. At Coverdale, the barn of Mr. Early Mitton was struck by lightning and burned to the ground with all its contents. The building was struck about 6.30, and the combustible materials about the barn ignited so quickly that the barn was enveloped in flames in a few minutes. Mr. Mitton was at home, but the fire spread so quickly that it was impossible to save a single article, not even the live stock in the stable. Three horses and five cows were cremated, and the contents besides included 40 tons of hay and some farming implements. The loss is a serious one to Mr. Mitton, who is an industrious farmer. He had no insurance, and the total loss is little less than \$1500.

Should Peary not have returned from the farther north on her arrival at Etah, her return would be delayed, and should he still be absent, the Windward will winter at Etah or some other Greenland port, and so intelligence of what he has accomplished will not reach here in much less than a year.

NEWS NOTES.

As a part of the new colonial defence scheme, it is probable that the British government will keep a British warship at St. John's, Nfld., all the year round, owing to the strategic position of the city on the Atlantic coast.

Salmon have stopped running and the British Columbia pack will be the smallest on record being estimated at 125,000 cases where it should be a million cases. Seven boats were needed to carry the pack to England last year where only one will be required this season.

There is a rumor that the Yaguis, who for some months have been making about as much trouble for Mexico as the Boers have been making for Great Britain, have sued for peace, but 2,000 of the Indians hold out, and propose to continue a guerilla warfare, just like their compatriots in South Africa. The reported renewal of the slaughter of the Christians in Armenia considered in connection with the Philippine Transvaal and Chinese troubles and the Yagui insurrection lends color to the impression that barbarism all over the world is hastening its destruction with all possible speed.
