THERE has been a splendid run of salmon in the St. Croix this year.

A SEAT in the New York stock exchange was sold recently for \$32,000.

FIFTY SEVEN is the average age of the fourteen members of the Dominion Cabinet.

NEARLY a million bushels of wheat were shipped in one day at Baltimore for European markets.

THE mines of Great Britain have 68,974 miles of underground tunnelling, and 378,151 persons work in them.

THE English Admiralty owes the Suez Canal Company £72,000 for the transit of transports and men-of-war to date.

THE London Canadian Loan & Agency Co. declares a half-yearly dividend at the rate of ten per cent. per annum.

THE United States Government is about to authorize provision for tourist accommodation in the famous Yellowstone valley.

THE Mayor of St. John has called a citizens mass meeting in the Institute for the 13th, to take steps for making preliminary arrangements for holding the Centennial Exhibition in 1883.

CAPTAIN BROWN has taken charge of the S. S. Carroll in the place of Captain Wright. The Captain's first passage to Charlottetown was made in capital time.

A REGULAR CONVOCATION of Alexandra Royal Arch Chapter, will be held in Masonic Hall this evening at 8 o'clock, by order of the M. E. H. P.

THE schooner "John Bell," seized at Arichat, N. S., for violation of the customs laws, was sold at auction on Friday last, and was bought by Messrs. E. Lantulum & Co. of St. John.

TWO CASES brought for violation of the Scott Act were dismissed by the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon for want of sufficient evidence. Two others will be tried in a few days.

A MEETING of the British American Book and Tract Society will be held in the Y. M. C. A. Hall on Friday evening at 8 o'clock. A number of gentlemen interested in the work will address the meeting.

SUNDAY was the 62nd anniversary of the wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. B. Whipple of Cawleton. The venerable couple still enjoy excellent health and attended the services of their church on their wedding anniversary. Mr. Whipple is in his 88th year.

LAST evening a son of Mr. Peter Robertson, on Lot 34, aged two years, was very nearly cut to pieces by a reaping machine. It appears that the little fellow went in among the grain and fell asleep and was not seen until he was in among the knives.

AN estimate of the State Department places the proportion of the wheat crop destroyed or badly hurt by the wet weather in Michigan, at one-third. In round numbers, ten million bushels of wheat were practically swept away, involving a loss to the farmers of Michigan of fully \$10,000,000.

MR. S. BURNSFATHER has been invited to deliver his Musical Melange "A Rare Time in Scotland" in Moncton next week, under the auspices of the St. Andrew's Club. From Moncton, Mr. Burnsfather goes to Sackville and St. John, where we trust he will be rewarded with crowded houses, as he richly deserves.

THE statement that grain absorbs enough moisture on a sea voyage to pay the freight charges has been to some extent confirmed by experiments made at the California Agricultural College. Various kinds of grain were placed in a moist atmosphere and the increase in weight was noted. The greatest increase was during the first 24 hours.

At a meeting of the Halifax regatta committee, last evening, it was decided to hold the four-oared race on the Basin between 8 and 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning, and, if possible, the double scull afterwards. At 11 o'clock the local races will commence on the harbor. The single scull race will take place on the Basin at 9 o'clock, a. m., on Thursday, and the consolation race as soon after as possible.

BRITISH AMERICAN BOOK AND TRACT SOCIETY.—Mr. A. N. Archibald, Secretary and Superintendent of Colportage, of the above Society, will address a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall, on Friday evening next, at 8 o'clock. A number of gentlemen in the city, who are deeply interested in the most effective Union Home Mission work of this Society, will address the meeting. Colportage work admirably combines the earnest personal efforts of good men, in the homes of our people, with the distribution of the best religious publications of the world, calculated to receive the approbation of all evangelical denominations. The committee has of late greatly extended colportage operations in the other Provinces, and is very desirous of employing an additional colporteur on the Island. All who are interested in the circulation of pure religious literature, at a cheap rate, throughout the most needy sections of the Province, are invited to attend the meeting on Friday evening. A collection will be taken in aid of Colportage. It is to be hoped that friends of the cause will give tangible evidence of their interest in this Society's work, which is so well deserving of their liberal aid.

Irish National Land League.

The regular meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Irish National Land League was held on last Monday evening, John Kelly, Esq., President, in the Chair.

The Quarterly Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer of the I. N. L. League in the United States were read, in which the P. E. Island Branches occupy a respectable position, being credited with \$185 for the quarter ending July 13th; and making the handsome total from the Province, since October last, of \$585. After the transaction of other routine business, a very interesting evening was spent in readings and addresses.

Mr. Richard Walsh delivered an address in which he reviewed the work of the Land League both in Ireland and America. He spoke at considerable length on the legislation for Ireland at the hands of a selfish government, and its pernicious effects through the administration of oppressive and unscrupulous officials at Dublin Castle; and concluded by referring feelingly to the death of Fanny Parnell and the labor of love to which she devoted the best years of her life. Mr. Walsh's address was warmly applauded.

Messrs. John Murray and Jas. T. Mullin read selections, the former giving an address by Rev. Dr. Betts, of St. Louis, at a demonstration in Chicago; and the latter reproduced a speech of Archbishop Croke's, in reply to an address presented to him at Emily, wherein His Grace advised the people to "stick to the Old Country for weal or woe," and to "hold on to the original lines of the National organization."

It was agreed that, in future, the meetings be held weekly, instead of fortnightly, which has been the case for the last few months.

Summerside Notes.

The oyster season began on the first of the month, and the "St. Lawrence" took 400 barrels over to New Brunswick on Saturday. It is expected that the prices will be low this year, as the oysters are numerous.

A large number of cattle were shipped on Saturday by "St. Lawrence."

A great deal of excitement has been created in Summerside during the last week in reference to the Scott Act prosecutions, and two dealers in the "ardent" were fined \$50 each; but the case that is causing most talk is that of Inspector James Caldwell against Mr. Bainsfather. It appears that the defendant has been recommending a friend of his in Moncton (who is a wholesale liquor dealer) to a few of the people in Summerside, and large numbers of cases of liquor have come across here. For this the Scott Act men say he is to blame, and liable to be fined as a rumrunner. The case came up before the Stipendiary Magistrate on Wednesday morning, but was postponed until yesterday evening at 8 o'clock for further evidence, when the Inspector himself himself will be put upon the stand by the defendant, and it is expected some lively disclosures will take place.

Ronald McDonald and Daniel Campbell, Summerside, were each fined \$100 yesterday—second offence under the Scott Act.

A very serious accident occurred on Thursday last to Mr. Robert Glover, farmer. It appears that he was driving a bull to water when it turned upon, knocked him down and knelt upon him. Mr. Glover's arm was broken in two or three places, besides three or four of his ribs, and the wonder is that he was not killed. Dr. McKay was soon in attendance, but says his patient lies in a precarious condition. Much sympathy is felt here for Mr. Glover.

Obituary.

How often do we see the verification of the statement, "That in the midst of life we are in death," when we behold our friends pass from time to eternity, cut down by disease; but with how much greater force does it assert its truthfulness when we see them called unexpectedly away, whilst apparently enjoying the blessings of an unimpaired constitution. We seldom hear of a more unfortunate death than that of Alfred, aged 22 years, son of Mr. Thomas Steele, South West, who died at his father's residence, 1st of September, of typhoid fever, after three weeks of intense suffering, which he bore with Christian patience.
