

Sievers' Grand-Slam Homer Gives Browns Victory Over Detroit

(By The Canadian Press)
 Outfielder Roy Sievers of St. Louis Browns Sunday drove in five runs with a grand-slam homer and a single to beat Detroit Tigers 7-3 and to ruin Hal Newhouse's American League pitching debut of the season.

Newhouse, who came up with a sore shoulder during spring training, lasted only three innings and was trailing 5-0 when lifted for a pinch-hitter. He gave four hits, four walks and hit one batter.

Detroit crowd of 30,794 saw the Browns practically tuck the game away in the first inning as the hitherto-waak-hitting Sievers got his four-bagger. A single, a walk, and a hit batter had loaded the bases when Sievers slammed a 3-2 pitch into the left-field stands to make it a 4-0 game.

Mike Garcia handcuffed Chicago White Sox with four-hit pitching as Cleveland Indians won the second game of a doubleheader, 5-1. Chicago took the first game 3-2 on Mickey Hatcher's six-hit hurling and a three-run uprising in the fifth inning.

The victory for the 27-year-old Garcia was his first against one defeat.

A walk and a double by Ray Murray gave the Tribesmen one run in the first and they picked up two more in the eighth on a walk, a sacrifice, a double and a single.

In the opener, Bob Lemon allowed 11 hits but kept the Sox fairly well in hand except for the fifth when they scored all of their runs.

Five consecutive singles highlighted a seven-run fifth-inning rally that enabled Philadelphia Athletics to overcome a six-run deficit and beat New York Yankees 9-8. The victory snapped a four-game Philadelphia losing streak and a five-game Yankee winning skein.

Ed Lopat was costing along behind a 7-1 lead when the roof caved in on him in the fifth to cost him the decision.

Lopat walked Elmer Valo to start the inning. He then yielded consecutive singles to Pete Suder, Mike Guerra, Bob Shantz, Eddie Joost and Paul Lehner. After Tommy Henrich fumbled Ferris Fain's grounder, Lopat was lifted in favor of Don Johnson. Johnson got Chapman to fly to center for the first out but Bob Dillinger followed with a single to drive in the fifth and sixth runs of the inning.

Dillinger was out attempting to stretch his hit into a double but then Valo drew his second walk of the inning and Suder followed with his second single to bat in Fain with the seventh run. Guerra finally ended the rally with a pop fly.

Rookie Bob Hooper started for the A's but was wild. Shantz relieved him in the fourth.

Washington Senators cut loose with a 19-hit attack in the nightcap to divide a doubleheader with Boston Red Sox with a 10-5 victory. The Sox took the opener for lefty Mel Parnell by an 8-1 margin. Walt Droppo homered in both contests for the Red Sox as did Eddie Yost for the Senators.

After being greeted by Yost's lead-off homer, Parnell kept seven other Washington hits well scattered and was assured of his fourth month victory of the campaign in the last of the first inning, when his team-mates came up with four runs against southpaw Lloyd Hittle.

Red Sox Turn Over Pitcher To Senators

BOSTON, May 12—(AP)—Boston Red Sox today turned over Frank Quinn, \$40,000 bonus righthand pitcher, to Washington Senators for the \$10,000 waiver price.

Quinn was signed after he was graduated from Yale in 1948 and was farmed out to Birmingham of the Southern Association.

He joined the Red Sox last season and made eight relief appearances. He has pitched but two innings in regular season games this season.

Earlier this week the Red Sox swapped outfielder Tom O'Brien and infielder Merrill Combs for outfielder Clyde Vollmer in what was announced as a straight-play-off deal with the Senators.

Don Newcombe Is Back With Dodgers

NEW YORK, May 12—(AP)—Brooklyn Dodger fans had good news today—pitcher Don Newcombe is back with the club and reports his arm feels great.

Newcombe, rookie mound star of the 1949 pennant-winners, threw in batting practice for 15 minutes today at Ebbets Field, and said there was no pain in his right arm.

It was the first time he had thrown a ball since he left the club in Chicago May 4.

Manager Barney Shotton said he planned to use Newcombe in relief roles for one or two innings before giving him a starting assignment.

SINGAPORE, May 12—(AP)—Australia's Dave Sands, British Empire middleweight champion, easily outpointed Boy Brooks of the Philippines in a dull 10-round bout tonight. Sands had a big weight edge, 167 to 157 3-4.

ST. LOUIS, May 8—(AP)—Ted Wilks, star relief hurler for St. Louis Cardinals, was placed today on the club's disabled list after it was found he had developed a bone spur on his pitching elbow. He will undergo an operation Wednesday for the removal of the spur.

This means that the chunky righthander will be lost to the Cards for a minimum of 30 days.

CINCINNATI, May 8—(AP)—Cincinnati Reds today sold left-hander Frank Pamovich to New York Giants for the waiver price of \$10,000.

The 25-year-old pitcher, who hails from New York, is a bonus player and now may be optioned to the minors. With the Reds last year he had a record of none won and two lost.

PITTSBURGH, May 8—(AP)—Pittsburgh Pirates today optioned catcher Eddie Fitzgerald to Indianapolis on a 24-hour recall basis.

Bill Meyer's receiving staff thus is trimmed to two—Aldy McCullough and Earl Turner. And it reduces the Pirates' roster to a total of 27 men, two over the limit to be reached by May 17.

LONDON, May 8—(AP)—The French-owned colt, L'Amiral tonight became the second favorite for the Derby at a bookmakers' callover of odds at the Victoria Club. William Woodward's American-bred Prince Simon remained the favorite, although the odds against him lengthened from 11 to 4 to 3 to 1.



It was only last Saturday that we mentioned in this column that it was probable that local baseball teams would be getting in their first practice sessions any day now. Coming fast on the heels of that prediction, the Knights of Columbus Junior team management announced last night that they will hold their first workout tonight at Memorial Field at 5:30. The Knights are last year's City Junior champions, and will be defending that title again this year in a three-team City loop with Kinsmen and Victorias. The other two squads in the loop are also expected to get in their first practices early this week.

Coach Charley Ryan of the Abegweit Intermediate team also announced last night that he will hold the first practice for the team this week, possibly on Wednesday. Charley was appointed as coach of the team here on Friday night at a meeting of the Abbie executive at the same time that Fred McCabe was named as team manager for this season. Ryan, incidentally was the man who piloted the K of C squad mentioned above, to the City Junior title last year.

The Abbies will be Charlottetown's entry in the three-team Island Physical Fitness Baseball League with Summerside R. C. A. F. and Curran and Briggs, which is expected to get underway here early next month. The locals were runners-up for the title last year against the Western Capital C and B boys who are expected to defend their title strongly this year.

Although it will take the various team managements a few practices to get their men sorted out who will perform on the squad rosters this season it is hoped that with the practices getting underway this week, that it won't be long now before we will be able to get a general picture of what players will be making up the bulk of the baseball power on the junior and senior teams for the coming season. That is if we can prevail upon the team managements to "give with the info" this early in the season prior to the League starting dates.

"B. P. (Before Page), a relief pitcher with rare exception wasn't held in high esteem by Major League club owners and the fans," states a recent article from New York. "As a matter of fact, being classified as a relief pitcher was something of a stigma. That partly may have been attributed to the fact washed-up starters or gents in the managerial doghouse usually formed the bullpen brigade."

"But since the emergence of Joe Page, relief pitchers are regarded as social equals. They no longer are paid off in the dark. Smokey Joe of the Yanks, for instance, hauls down \$35,000, highest salary ever commanded by a Yankee pitcher, starter or reliever. Page is the acknowledged dean of the relief pitchers in major league baseball but the remaining clubs also have men tough to crack in the pinch.

"Page took part in seven of the Yanks' first 17 games. During that stretch he was worked 14 2-3 innings, allowed 10 hits, fanned 10 and walked only three. Ted Wilks, stocky righthander of St. Louis Cardinals was hailed as the National League's Joe Page last year. Wilks hasn't pitched in a championship game this year and now is on the disabled list.

"With Wilks on the sidelines, Jim Konstanty of the scrappy Philadelphia Phillies is generally saluted as the king of the National relief corps. Konstanty, a 33-year-old righthander who won nine and dropped five in rescue missions last year, was called on eight times in the Phillies' first 21 games. He worked a little more than 11 innings, allowed only nine hits, fanned nine and walked only two."

SYRACUSE, N. Y., May 12—(AP)—Syracuse Chiefs of the International League announced today that pitcher James Avrea has been obtained on option from Cincinnati Reds. The club said Avrea, a right hander, would join the team in Buffalo tonight.

Record Equalled As Hill Prince Wins At Belmont

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 14—(AP)—Hill Prince, the flying colt from Virginia, hung it on the Kentucky Derby winner, Middle-ground, Saturday in the \$25,000-added Withers Mile at Belmont Park, and proved he'll be a tough number in the Preakness next week.

A crowd of 40,068, who made Hill Prince and jockey Eddie Arcaro the favorite, gave Chris Chenevy's powerful bay colt a mighty cheer as he took command near the top of the stretch and romped home with 1-2 lengths to spare.

Hill Prince blazed under the finish line in a sparkling 1:38 4/5 which tied the record for the stake first run in 1874. The infomortal Man O'War set the record in 1920, and it was equalled in 1922 by Snob 2nd, and again by Johnstown in 1939.

The impressive note in Hill Prince's victory is that the Virginia-bred son of Prince Quillo-Hildene packed 126 pounds, compared with only 118 carried by Man O'War and the others.
