The annual meeting of the P.E.I. Rifle Association, was held last evening, in the offices of the Workmen's Compensation Board, with the President, Brig. W. W. Reid, D.S.O., presiding. The meeting opened with the reading of the minutes of the last annual meeting, read by Major A. F. Gormley. The President's report was then heard as follows:

Another year has passed into the records and it is time to take stock of our activities and plan for next year. This year as in the past, our opening shoots were planned as qualifying shoots for the Inter Maritime team, and things looked good for another banner year. However, bad weather, lack of co-operation from officials in charge of the range, and the intervention of prevent holding the preparatory shoots. In 1955 we sent a fine group to the DCRA at Comaught Ranges and the group shot well and took a good share of the prize money and deserve our commendation for taking the time off to attend and for their good showing. At this time we have to devote a few words to a careless few. Last year, I complimented one and all on the way weapons were returned, promptly and in good condition, when inspected we received an excellent report. This year, the inspecting officer reports several rifles in bad condition such as cleanliness goes with four rifles not being turned in for the inspection. He wasn't particularly pleased, and while I realize possibly Gr. H. Q. are not keeping them clean after receipt, possibly some of us have been careless. Let us avoid black marks such as these, after all some of us appreciate the privileges we have and do not wish to lose them. Robinson 3-1 Underdog For Fight With Olson

CHICAGO (AP) — During his prolonged training for his title defence against Sugar Ray Robinson Friday night, middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson frequently watched the lions being fed at Lincoln Park zoo.

"It kinda fascinated me," explained Olson, whose hotel training quarters were not far from the park.
"It may have been that the lion-feeding fascination stemmed from memories of his two defeats, when he was more or less a tender youth," by Robinson.
"Or maybe he might have recalled being fed last summer to another ring 'lion,' light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, who stopped him in three rounds."

ODDS FAVOR BOBO
The odds-makers say it will be Robinson being fed to Olson at the Chicago Stadium Friday night in the nationally televised 15-round title match beginning at 10 p. m. EST.

The 35-year-old Robinson is a 3-1 underdog in his attempt to recapture the 160-pound crown for an unprecedented second time. His chances, everybody seems to agree depend on the amount of rubber in his legs if he can't put across an early kayo punch.

Ben Hogan Seeks \$40,000 Damages

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Golfer Ben Hogan is asking for \$40,000 damages from a New York publishing company for allegedly using pictures of him in a book on golfing without his permission.
Lawyer Francis W. Sullivan filed the suit here Tuesday on Hogan's behalf. A. S. Barnes and Co., Inc., of New York was named as the defendant.

Boxing Commission Slaps Fine On Yvon Durelle

LONDON (CP) — Stewards of the British Boxing Board of Control Wednesday imposed a £150 fine on Canadian lightweight champion Yvon Durelle of Baie Ste. Anne, N. B., as a sequel to a bout in Nottingham Nov. 28 against Artie Towne of New York.
Durelle was disqualified in the seventh round of a scheduled 10-rounder and the verdict went to Towne. In an earlier fight at London's Albert Hall last spring, Durelle was disqualified in the third

round against Britain's Ron Barton.
Both verdicts created some controversy.

Onslow Fane, chairman of the board, announced the penalty after a 25-minute hearing at which Harry Sheppard of Montreal, manager of the Canadian boxer, sought to defend Durelle's performance.
Later, Sheppard said he is considering an appeal against the verdict. In an interview, he said Towne was twice warned by the referee in the Nottingham fight, but Durelle was disqualified at the first offence.
Durelle was disqualified one second before the end of the seventh round against Towne for a rabbit punch. In the bout with Barton May 24, the fight was stopped due to the third round of foul grounds that Durelle struck Barton in the groin.
