CONTRACT BRIDGE

Bridge hand diagram showing cards for South and North. South: ♠ 10 8, ♥ 7 3, ♦ J 6 3 2, ♣ K Q 5. North: ♠ K 9 6 2, ♥ 8 7, ♦ Q 9 8 6, ♣ 7 6 4.

The bidding: South West North East 1NT Pass 3♦ Pass

Opening lead—seven of spades. Despite the singleton, North should be willing to play three notrump. The opening bidder must be assumed to have a spade stopper.

The declarer is frequently confronted with the situation where allowing a particular defender to gain the lead creates a serious threat to his chances. In such cases, he is duty-bound to take all possible measures to keep that defender from getting the lead. An example of this technique was furnished by South in today's hand.

East played the king of spades on the opening lead, and South correctly decided to win it. Starting with seven top tricks he planned to develop the additional two he needed in such a way that East could not gain the lead in the process. Thus, he dismissed the thought of playing the king and another diamond and finessing against the queen, because these

plays would subject him to a ruinous spade return from East.

Instead, South played a heart to the king, and led the jack of diamonds. When East played a low diamond, South did likewise. Had he finessed lost, nine tricks would have blossomed at the same instant. Declarer was now one step closer to home—he had eight sure winners.

The diamond suit was temporarily abandoned because South did not know whether the suit would break 3-2 or 4-1. If the suit broke 3-2, ten tricks were sure, but in that case, he could just as well be taken later. He needed protection against the possibility that East had four diamonds.

Accordingly, a low club was led from dummy, South finessing the eight. Although it lost to the king, trick number nine magically was assured. Any return by West in any suit was bound to make the contract.

A four suit endplay is rare in bridge. The winning position achieved grew out of South's plan to protect his tenuous spade holding. The two finesses he took were designed to lose, if they did, to West.

South's willingness to lose tricks to West had no charitable basis. It was simply a matter of self-preservation.

105th Veteran Dies After Long Illness

Mr. James R. White Seabrook, New Hampshire, died on Friday, June 29th, in the Canadian Veteran's Hospital, Lancaster, New Brunswick, after a long illness. He was born at Georgetown, P. E. I. and was a Canadian army veteran of World War I, having served in the 105th regiment overseas.

He was a resident of Seabrook for thirty years, and was a shoemaker by trade.

Surviving are his wife, Leonora, at Seabrook, two sons, James R., junior, Napa California, William, Seabrook, and a daughter, Mrs. Eleanor Stinson, Springfield, Vermont, also three brothers, William, Borden, P. E. I., Russell and George of Georgetown and a sister Helen, Mrs. John Turner, Charlottetown, and eight grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday July 2nd at the Seabrook Advent Church, the pastor Reverend Charles Smith officiating.

Interment was in the Smithtown Methodist Cemetery.

Mink Rancher Awarded Judgement Against Packers

TORONTO (CP)—The Supreme Court of Ontario Thursday ordered Canada Packers Ltd. to pay mink rancher Alvin S. Farmer of nearly Gormley 30,051 for 324 mink which died last year after eating whale meat sold by the company.

Chief Justice J. C. McRuer found that botulinus toxin must have been in the whale-meat Mr. Farmer bought in February 1955.

Mr. Farmer testified he mixed the meat with other mink feed March 16 and left it with his son to feed to the animals.

The next morning, he said, all but one of the mink were dead. Witnesses for the plaintiff testified that meat was in bad condition when it arrived in St. John's, Nfld., and a veterinarian said tests he conducted led to the be-

lief the toxin was in the meat when it was sold.

Witnesses for Canada Packers said the meat was approved for sale when it arrived in Halifax. Counsel Russell Payton suggested the toxin entered the meat while it was in Mr. Farmer's storehouse.

POPE TOO BUSY

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Pope is delaying his departure for his summer residence in the Alban Hills due to the pressure of work in the Vatican. Urged by his doctors late last May to go to Castel Gandolfo as soon as possible, the pontiff now may not make his accustomed move until late this month, Vatican sources said Saturday.
