Freighter Is Damaged En Route To Souris

The freighter S. S. Hello arrived at Souris yesterday to load a cargo of 1,000 cords of peeled pulp wood for Italy. However, loading operations will be delayed while repairs are made to the ship's water tanks damaged in heavy water off Nova Scotia this week. The ship, of Norwegian registry, sailed from Halifax a week ago but was delayed by storms. The Charlottetown firm of Bruce Stewart & Co. is making the repairs. The cargo is being put aboard by Arthur Peters of Souris. Loading will not be possible, because of muddy conditions at the new wharf where the ship is docked, until freezing weather arrives. However, it is expected a cold wave will have arrived before repairs are completed.

The court ordered them destroyed. The outlawed titles are "I, The Jury", "My Gun Is Quick," and "Vengeance Is Mine."
