STEAMSHIP RATE BEING REDUCED

A Rate War Between Canada and Europe.

REDUCTIONS IN FARES BE- TWEEN CANADA AND EUROPE

The Canadian Companies Have Gone
Into the Fight.

(SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER)

MONTREAL, March 4.—A steamship rate war has struck Montreal.

For the past week the Trans-Atlantic Steamship Companies which ply between New York, Boston and European ports have been having a lively time of it and the cutting of rates has been general.

Now the Canadian lines, Allan and Dominion lines are following suit and are reducing their rates of fare.

The Dominion Line announces that hereafter the first class rate between Canadian ports and Liverpool will be \$50 in place of \$55 and \$60 as formerly.

Rates from Boston will be \$60 in place of the former rate of \$75.

The 2nd class rate on the Dominion Liners Boston-Liverpool service has been reduced from \$40 to \$37.50.

The second class rate between Canadian ports and Europe will remain as heretofore \$35.00.

Allan Line has reduced its minimum rate between Canada and European ports to \$50, the same as the Dominion Line has been, and has met the cut of their competitors at all points.

LETTER FROM MR. JENKINS.

SIR.—I noticed in your issue of February 22nd a very interesting paper read before the Natural History Society of P. E. Island by Mr. May. In that paper he touched on a question that has often caused me much thought, that is what has caused the mounds about the lakes in this vicinity. I was surprised that Mr. May had not noticed this at other places in his surveys, as all the lakes in this section have the same elevation around them, Kief's Lake, Lake Verd and Moss Lake, and some of the barrens where there are no lakes. But a different condition is observable at some of the other lakes, not seen at Kief's. There, as stated, the ridge is about twenty feet from the water's edge, but at Moss Lake the elevation seems to separate the high and low land, and in some places is four or five hundred yards from the water's edge. At the rear of Mr. Kelly's farm, Lake Verd, where there is no lake, only a flat blue berry barren, the same ridge is seen, but it is quite evident the whole barren was once a lake as even now there is a small sheet of water not fully grown over, containing about half an acre, and at the edge is probably 15 or 20 feet deep. In other places, lately grown over but solid enough to bear one's weight, a pole can be thrust down 15 feet, and Moss Lake at the front of my own farm is certainly fast filling in. Within my own recollection it has become much smaller, and grass can now be seen growing up out to its centre. It has an area of almost 25 acres. My idea as to now these elevations were formed was that some animal had to do with their formation, possibly the beaver. But of course this is only supposition. Yet I can hardly think with Mr. May that they were placed there by the Indian for the purpose of shooting frogs, as no doubt the lakes then as now were surrounded by forests which would be sufficient concealment. Others have told me that they were formed by the sand drifting into the bushes, and to my mind this is the best reason advanced. If Mr. May would visit Kief's Lake some windy day during a dry time in summer he would find considerable dry sand on the move, and I think investigation would show them to be of sandy formation. However, I believe there is still room for thought and research on the subject, and if Mr. May or some one interested in Natural History would make a visit to those places during the summer I should be much pleased to show them around and help to make a further investigation. I am sorry that Natural History subjects do not receive more attention from our people, but am pleased to know that more interest is being shown at present and that the formation of Natural History Societies in other parts of the Island is being thought of.

HILLSBOROUGH BRIDGE.

SIR.—I am glad to see the people on the south side of the river are making a move in this matter, and if they keep at it there will be good results. More power to them; they will have the support of every merchant in the city. I would here call their attention to a matter of far greater direct importance to them, that is the necessity of having the boilers of the steamers inspected. For years past there has been no Government inspection of the ferry steamer and I think I am safe in saying that there is not another steamer in the world that is left in this state. The boilers may be all right; but they are getting old and they may be all wrong, and some day, with a lot of passengers and teams on board, the boilers may blow up, and then where would the passengers be? The people who cross in the Rocky Point boat are in a worse box in this respect than the others, as the boat is older. It is time the people spoke on the matter and they should speak with no uncertain sound. By all means get the bridge built; but meanwhile don't take the risk of having twenty or thirty people blown to pieces some day on the Southport or Rocky Point ferry by the boilers blowing up.

ENGLAND WITHDRAWS HER OBJECTION

To France Having a Coal- ing Station.

BOTH COUNTRIES HAVE EQUAL TREATY RIGHTS.

But France Must Abstain From
Acquiring Territory.

LONDON, March 4.—It is officially announced that as the treaty of 1862 gives France equal rights with Great Britain in Oman, Great Britain has withdrawn her objections to France placing coal sheds on the shore, similar to those of Great Britain, provided France does not attempt to obtain territorial rights in Oman. This is understood to be part of a general scheme for the settlement of the various differences between France and England.

MEETING AT TIGNISH.

Large and Enthusiastic Gathering of
Liberal Conservatives.

A large and enthusiastic meeting of supporters of the Liberal Conservative Party from the first six polling divisions of the First Electoral District of Prince County was held in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, on the 2nd inst. for the purpose of organizing the party in said polling divisions. The meeting was called to order by the Convener for the District, Mr. J. Albert Brennan, who occupied the chair, and the undersigned was appointed secretary. Mr. Brennan, in a brief but eloquent speech, explained the object of the meeting and called upon the 2nd Vice-Presidents of the different polling districts to come forward and state what action had been taken to perfect the organization of the respective polling divisions. This was done to the satisfaction of the meeting, after which short but forcible speeches on the question of the day were made by William Callaghan Esq., Minnigash, Messrs Celestine Ferry, DeBlois Station, Joseph Shea, Waterford, Peter T. Bernard, DeBlois Station, James McGrath, St. Louis, James W. Shea, Waterford, Henry J. Pineo, Bloomfield, W. P. Callaghan, Minnigash, Edward Hockett, Tignish and others.

Mr. James E. Birch, M. P. being called upon addressed the meeting at considerable length entering fully into the extravagance and corruption of both Local and Dominion Governments. He urged the electors to make ready for the impending contest without delay as all indications pointed to an early and decisive battle.

After the speeches the following resolution was moved by Mr. Henry J. Pineo seconded by Mr. W. Callaghan, and unanimously adopted.

Whereas the Liberal Conservative Party under the leadership of Sir Charles Tupper Bart. is actively engaged in organizing all over Canada.

And whereas a permanent party organizer has been appointed in Montreal to see that the work is properly attended to.

Therefore, Resolved that this meeting approves of the action of Sir Charles and the Conservative Party in thus preparing for the next contest.

Further resolved, that this meeting also desires to express its approval of the steps taken by the late conference of the Liberal Conservative Party at Charlottetown by means of which a permanent and effective organization will be formed in this province.

One of the largest and enthusiastic party meetings ever held in Tignish then closed by a vote of thanks to the Convener, to which Mr. Brennan replied in his usual happy style.
