



DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

At Rockingham Park, Salem, New Hampshire, last Saturday night, the B-3 Pace for a purse of \$1,000, was won by Major's Pride. Bill Lynbrook was second, and the Cape Breton-owned Jackie Jackson was third. The mile was in 2:10.

On the same card, the B Pace, purse \$1,100, was won by Joe Mac 2:06 3-5, driven by H. Spencer, time 2:06 3-5. The feature race of the night was the sixth event on the program, which had brought together some of the fastest horses racing at Rockingham. The race had a surprise ending; following are the starters:

Rainbow Clegg (D. Pinkney), Madam Moraka 2:07 4-5, Sandra Racecraft 2:06 2-5, Philharmonic 2:06 2-5, Precursor 2:05 4-5, Linden Hanover 2:05 1-5, Lynn Cress 2:02, Miriam B. Scott 2:06 4-5. The big surprise was that the Maritime-owned and bred Rainbow Clegg, driven by the Nova Scotia reinsman, Dave Pinkney, was the winner in 2:06 4-5.

Rainbow Clegg's record at the end of the 1958 racing season was 2:06 3-5, which he took last year as an eight-year-old. He has been owned since his racing career first began by W. E. Piers, Puzwash, N.S. Looking back over the records, we find that as a seven-year-old in 1957, he made 37 starts, was 9 times first, 9 times second and 7 times third with winnings of \$1,472. In 1958, he took the above record of 2:06 3-5 and made 43 starts, being 10 times first, 7 times second and 10 times third with winnings of \$2,620. This year, as a nine-year-old, he has been going stronger than ever and all Maritimers, we are sure, will be proud of his win over such a fast field of pacers on a cold night in such fast time.

Rainbow Clegg's sire was Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2, and his dam is Queen Aubrey 3rd, whose grand-sire, we believe, was the renowned pacer, Colonel Aubrey. We looked back to the year 1957, and saw that Rainbow Clegg was raced then by his present owner, Mr. Piers, and had taken a record of 2:13 that year.

MERGER ANNOUNCED
Jean Louis Levesque, president of Blue Bonnets Raceway, Montreal, has announced its merger with the city's other harness racing track, Richelieu Raceway. Mr. Levesque purchased Richelieu Park last month as president of Trans-Canada Fund Corporation. He has announced that racing at Blue Bonnets will continue this season as long as weather permits. The meeting was to have ended on November 15, but an extension was granted by the provincial government.

The track and the Harness Horsemen's Association have reached an agreement whereby the usual percentage from the pari-mutuels will go toward purses, the horsemen waiving their minimum guarantee.

The above-mentioned Mr. Levesque is a graduate of St. Dunstan's University in Charlottetown, a member of the class of the early 1930's, and he has come a long way in the business world since leaving the P.E.I. institution.

On the night of October 31, the curtain was lowered on harness racing at Buffalo Raceway's meet at Hamburg, New York. More than 6,000 people were in attendance and they saw the Canadian-owned Captain Wright, driven by Harold McKinley, that went away in No. 7 position, shooting to the front in the home stretch and winning in 2:12 4-5.

Captain Wright has won more than \$17,000 this year and is owned by the Armstrong Brothers, Brampton, Ontario, who have a number of horses racing on United States tracks and are the owners of Countess Adios, a two-year-old that took a record of 1:59 2-5 this year. They purchased Captain Wright for \$10,000 several years ago.

Last year Captain Wright made 25 starts, was 10 times first, 6 times second and 3 times third with winnings of \$21,822. His caretaker is the very popular Archie Llewellyn, of Montague, P.E.I. We all miss Archie's presence at the Charlottetown track, but we are also glad that he has a good position with one of the best stables racing out of the province of Ontario.

PRESENT AWARDS
Five major awards of harness racing will be given tonight at the 11th annual dinner of the United States Harness Writers' Association, at a New York hotel grand ballroom. During the year, Bye Bye Byrd was driven to a world record of 1:57 4-5 for a mile over the Roosevelt Raceway half-mile track.

Bye Bye Byrd, a pacer, received 39 of a possible 75 first place votes of the Harness Writers, and 236 points. Adios Butler, winner of the triple crown of racing, was second with 182 pts. The French trotter, Jamin, that won the International and the American Trotting Championships at Roosevelt, was third with 89 points.

The Proximity Achievement Award for outstanding contributions to the sport will be given to the Hayes Fair Acres Stable, DuQuoin, Illinois. Don and Gene Hayes sponsored the Hambletonian classic at DuQuoin. Billy Haughton, of Brookville, N.Y., is the leading dash-heat winner with 176 victories, and will receive the National Heat Winning Trophy for the sixth consecutive year.

The Paul Dourange Trophy, for the leading "average" driver for the season goes to Wayne (Curly) Smart, of Delaware, Ohio. The Lou Levitt Memorial Award, given each year to an organization for outstanding work in hu-

manitarianism, will be accepted by Frederick Lewis, on behalf of the New York Herald-Tribune Fresh Air Fund for underprivileged children.

The following appeared in a recent edition of a New York paper: "Salem, New Hampshire—The autumn harness racing meet at Rockingham Park is on the homestretch and will conclude Saturday night, November 28. The current whirl has been highlighted by big pari-mutuel handles, increased attendance, and fine racing.

"The new 'Pic-Six' method of wagering on the last six events on each program has also made a big hit, and other New England tracks are certain to try it next year. A Nova Scotia steed named Jackie Jackson is the wingingst equine here. In 40 starts, the four-year-old has been in the money 36 times. That's very consistent.

"Alfred (Bucky) Day and George (Buddy) Reed continue to duel for driving honors, the outcome to be determined at the last program. Both reinsmen are former champions at this track." Jackie Jackson has been driven in all his races at Rockingham by John A. Young, who was born in Pictou County, Nova Scotia, on the 26th of November, 1912, and has been coming to the front quite rapidly the last three years, while racing over New England tracks.

The news about Jackie Jackson will be well received in Cape Breton where it is owned by MacDonald and Logue of Sydney. We understand that he came to Sydney in a carload of horses, and we cannot find, in the yearbooks, where he had ever raced on any tracks before this year. However, he made good in Sydney with 19 wins, and he also won twice at Charlottetown in 2:10 and 2:09 3-5 during Old Home Week. His best record at Sydney was 2:09 1-5, and he had ten miles there in 2:10 or better.

Cape Breton fans will also be pleased to learn that Rannie MacDonald drove Miss Van Bars to a victory in a \$500 Pace at Montreal's Blue Bonnets track the other night. Rannie's stable, has, as usual, been making a good showing this year.

Harness racing enthusiasm has struck the Annapolis Valley region so hard that at a recent meeting it was decided to build an up-to-date raceway, with a grandstand, stables and other facilities, near Kentville. It is expected that the track, stands and other appointments will cost upwards of \$100,000.

JOE O'BRIEN
In the latest issue of "The Trotter and Pacer" magazine, is the following: "Sunbelle and Joe O'Brien — last fall, at Ypker Raceway, Raider Frost, from the California Stable of James Camp, upset Bye Bye Byrd in the rich William H. Cane Pace, defeating at the same time, his famous stable mate, Shadow Wave.

"The following night, Joe O'Brien, trainer of this sparkling pair of colts, told this publication he had another three-year-old that was just as good as Shadow Wave and Raider Frost. This one was a filly named 'Sunbelle'. Since we are aware of Joe O'Brien's characteristics of being conservative in regard to his racing stock, we were not unduly surprised when Sunbelle started coming into her own this summer. However, it seems very shocking to think that this mare has been the ONLY standardbred in the history of the sport to win two 2:00 miles on a half-mile track in one day. Followers of the sport know this phenomena occurred at Delaware, Ohio, in September with both miles in 2:00, flat. Later she won at Lexington's mile track in 1:58 and 1:59, and since then she set up a world's record at Hollywood Park, California."

Home-bred Sunbelle is not through her racing career, and no doubt she will be out in 1960, for Joe O'Brien, breaking more world's records.

P.E.I. Aces Notch Victory; Defeat Sandy's Royals 7-4

A vastly improved looking band of Aces defeated Sandy's Royals of Charlottetown at Civic Stadium in Summerside last night before a crowd of 890 fans. The final score was 7-4. The Aces won the game and the Royals in second place with one win and one loss each. There were 10 minor and 2 major penalties in the game, but the boys stuck to hockey for the most part.

ACES STRIKE
The teams split two goals in the first period, the home forces getting their after 20 seconds of play. Benny Grady's long, looping shot from the blue line beating ward, Wally Shepherd evened the score at the eleven minute mark, being the trigger man on a pretty pattern play with Buck Whitlock and Bob Bowness. The play was fairly even in this period despite the fact that the visitors were outshot - 17-5. Many of the Aces drives were from far out.

After seven minutes of play in the second period, the Aces suddenly caught fire, scoring three goals in 2 minutes and 51 seconds. Leroy Clow neatly deked the Royal goalie out of position for the first one; Benny Grady scored the second on a breakaway when Vance Harris put him in the clear while the Royals were pressing, and Paul Schurman pulled off Whitlock's one-ek-a-boo play, rounding the net, and poking the disk inside the post. This made the score 4-1.

ROYALS ROAD BACK
The Royals came back to score two quick goals of their own. Willie Dunn rifled a partly screened shot past Mann at 11:25, and Eustace Reeves combined neat stick-handling and a booming shot to make it 4-3 at 13:30. The Royals were again outshot 11-7 and the Aces seemed to have a wider margin in the play in this frame.

Brother Garth followed suit to make it a little over two minutes left to play.
