the possession of the atom bomb and later of the hydrogen bomb" tried to make Russia's possession of the H-bomb a "cause for alarm." They used this alarm "with the aim of intensifying the armaments drive."

No Cause for Alarm

"The Soviet government considered it necessary to declare that there is not and was not any foundation for alarm," Pravda said.

"In accordance with the unchanging policy of the Soviet Union directed to the strengthening of peace and the security of peoples, the Soviet government repeatedly offered to the governments of other countries the carrying out of a considerable reduction of armaments and the prohibition of atomic and other kinds of weapons of mass destruction, establishing within the framework of the United Nations organization strict international control of this prohibition.

The Soviet government solemnly stands on this position at the present time."

Defence Contracts

OTTAWA, (CP)—Defence contracts placed with Canadian firms during the last half of July totalled \$14,232,862. The Defence Production Department announced Wednesday.

Pierre Thibault of Pierreville, Que., was awarded a contract for fire trucks and pumps amounting to \$674,774. Another, for \$771,146, went to the British Yukon Navigation Company, of Whitehorse, for fuel oil.

Contracts classified for security reasons were not listed.

Island A Mecca This Year For Steady Tourist Influx

One of the biggest tourist years in the history of the Province appears to be indicated by the vast numbers of visitors who are or have been here this year.

In former seasons tourists were rarely seen before the early summer, but 1953 is apparently well on its way to setting several new records and not the least will be the early date from which they started arriving. Since the first of the year there has been a steady stream of people at both the Travel Bureau and the Confederation Chamber.

Thousands have visited the historic Chamber this month alone and Commissioner Robert Craig, the genial guide, has told the story of the room to so many people he has long since lost track of the number. Since August 1 nearly two thousand people have signed the guest book in the Chamber, and it is estimated that approximately only one of every five who visit the room takes time to put their name in the register.

From Many Parts

There is no limit to the places of their origin, their occupations nor their reasons for coming here. One young couple on their honeymoon admitted they arrived by sheer accident. They took a wrong road to New Brunswick, saw the M.V. Abegweit and decided to take a sail to see where it went. Once they got here the honeymoon locale was instantly decided as they fell in love with the countless beautiful bits of scenery they saw as they drove along.

From London and Madrid, Edinburgh and Paris they have come here this season. Australia and New Zealand are represented as well as Germany, the Scandinavian countries and many other European and Eurasian centres.

But the great bulk of the visitors, especially those who literally flood the Travel Bureau with inquiries, are from the United States. Among them are clergymen of all denominations, newspaper editors, doctors, lawyers and probably Indian chiefs. There are, too, stenographers, housewives, female evangelists and female reporters. They come from Massachusetts, Maine, California, New Jersey, Connecticut and New York. They also come from Wisconsin, Indiana, Rhode Island and South Dakota, from South Carolina, Virginia and Ohio; Washington, D.C., Missouri and Pennsylvania, Texas, Illinois, Georgia, New Hampshire, Maryland, North Carolina, Iowa, Minnesota, Kentucky, Florida and Washington.

There are also many others from practically every part of the country south of the border. Their home towns range from Corning to Staten Island, New York, from the Dakotas to Texas and from Maine to California. Some of the town names which have an odd ring to Island ears include Hopewell Cape, N. B., Chippawa, Ontario, Quincy, Mass., and Marengo, Ohio.

All Provinces Represented

Besides the visitors from other countries of the world Islanders have entertained this year people from every single one of the other nine Canadian Provinces and from the Yukon Territory.

They have been here from Tignish to Chulivick, from Cornwall, P.E.I., to Cornwall, Ontario, and Corner Brook, Newfoundland; from London, England, to London, Ont. They have spoken the brogue of Ireland, the soft voice of the deep South of the United States and the harsher tones of the New Englanders; the Cockney accents of Bow Bells and the guttural sounds of the West Indies. From all places and of all nationalities they come.

Reject Russia's Suggestions For Korean Conference

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (CP)—Canada and the United States Wednesday joined in rejecting a Russian proposal on the make-up of the vital Korean political conference and heard from Russia's Andrei Vishinsky some harsh words about American diplomacy and "cliques" which he said do not want peace.

Vishinsky let loose some scathing phrases in the UN's political committee following a 45-minute speech by Canada's Health Minister Martin calling for Canadian participation in the Korean peace settlement, along with India and Russia herself.

Martin rejected the Russian proposal on the ground it would exclude Canada from the peace table and would stifle the voice of South Korea.

of blazing forest still 10 miles away from the village.

Reluctance of officials to say anything beyond that the fire was deliberately set was partially explained by one source who said that talk would interfere with the main job of getting the big fire under control.

Advance Almost Halted

That hasn't been accomplished yet but the fire's relentless advance has been almost brought to a halt.

Concentrated at the most advanced wedge of the blaze, aimed directly at Ste. Therese and Canton Labour, were some 200 men working with bulldozers, axes and picks to build a huge fire-break.

Late Wednesday, the advancing flames still had not reached the firebreak and volunteers spent their time enlarging it.

Biggest factor that made progress against the flames possible was a shift in the wind from the northwest to the southeast bringing a promise of rain and a boost in the morale of fire-fighters.

Rain Breaks Drought

Then, Wednesday, cloudy skies yielded the long-awaited rain that broke a month-long drought.

Theo Caron, chief forester of the Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Company, who has been directing fire-fighting operations, said: "I don't know whether it's the rain makers or God—but it's raining."

A rain maker from the United States has been attempting to bring about a rainfall for the last few days by "seeding" clouds.

J. H. Merrill, woods manager of Anglo, whose 3,000-square-mile timber limits are bearing the brunt of the damage, said the situation has "improved vastly."

"But we can't forget we are sitting on a power keg," he said.

Experienced woodsmen say three days of rain are needed to quell the blaze. Even then it will require continuous watching around its 165-square-mile periphery until the first snows.

LEGHORN, Italy. (Reuters)—Workmen digging in the foundations of an old building at Castiglione Wednesday night uncovered a hanging skeleton in what was once a 14th century torture chamber. The skeleton was chained to the wall at wrists and ankles.

take over the country. In Rome, the Shah said he planned to fly back as soon as news of the coup was confirmed.

Zahedi broadcast an eight-point program to the people of Iran.

"Dear compatriots," he said, "in the name of the Almighty I address you. By the order of His Majesty, Mohammed Shah Reza Pahlavi, I have been appointed your premier. Past governments have made many promises but have accomplished very little.

"The nation must know that I am the lawful premier on the Shah's orders.

Outlines Program

"The principal points of my program are:

1. The rule of law.
2. Raising the standards of living.
3. Free health service for all.
4. Mechanization of agriculture.
5. Road construction.
6. Insurance of public security.
7. Protection of individual and social freedom.
8. Promotion of co-operative societies.

"Long live Mohammed Shah Reza Pahlavi."

As furious battles raged in the streets of Tehran, the radio became the only means of communication. Cable and telephone service overseas was cut off.

This correspondent was granted the use of Tehran radio facilities, and by the government to broadcast direct dispatches to the Associated Press' monitoring facilities in London.

All Appears Calm

By evening, however, all appeared calm here. Zahedi decreed an indefinite shut-down of all shops except those of grocers, butchers and bakers. The city was firmly in control of his army and police.

The first news of the coup to reach the outside world was contained in confused broadcasts by members of the new regime.

There were arguments among them, clearly audible to listeners, as to who should read a communique announcing the triumph of the Shah's forces.

"It's not important who reads it. The important thing is that it gets read," said a masculine voice, and then a man who introduced himself as Col. Pahlavon came on.

"The government of Mossadeh has been defeated," he declared.

"I am one of the soldiers and one of the devotees of this country. A number of traitors like Fatemi (the foreign minister) want to sell out the country to the foreigners."

Iranian royalists have decried the demagogic government through which Hossein Fatemi was ruling.

"The nation's officers, army and the police have taken the situation in their hands. Premier Zahedi will remain his post. There is no place for anxiety. Keep calm."

Elated By Election Win

TORONTO, (CP)—Margaret Aitken, elected to the House of Commons for York Humber as a Progressive Conservative, says it was "quite a week of suspense" waiting for word of Tuesday's official count in the riding.

The 44-year-old Toronto newspaper columnist said Wednesday: "I must admit I put in quite a week of suspense... although we were confident that our figures were right we had to wait until we got the official count."

In her column "Between You and Me" in the Telegram, Miss Aitken commented on her victory: "Hey ma, I did it!"

The official count gave Miss Aitken 11,175 votes as against 11,097 for Liberal Ken Thompson. She was the fourth woman elected in the Aug. 10 general election.

There was no indication that Mr. Thompson would request a recount.
