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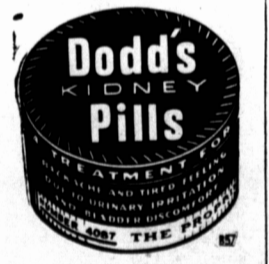

Find Deer En Route To Europe

HALIFAX (CP) — Fishermen George Lewis and Daniel Lutz couldn't believe their eyes. Ten miles off Halifax they saw two deer—or thought they did. They were right: it was a fawn and a three-year-old buck—swimming straight for England. They got them both into the boat and headed for Halifax.

The SPC freed the deer Tuesday in a wooded area near here. They think they were frightened into the ocean, probably by dogs.

Says Shipping Requires Help

VICTORIA (CP) — A profitable deep sea merchant marine under a Canadian flag is impossible without government assistance, Harry I. Mathers of Halifax said Tuesday.

Mr. Mathers, president of I. H. Mathers and Son, is attending the 28th annual convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce here.

Mr. Mathers' company operates 23 deep sea ships, all under the British flag "due to the operating costs" under Canadian law and to currency exchange.

"There has to be government assistance for our Canadian merchant marine," Mr. Mathers said. "In the case of an emergency today Canada would have very few ships to call into service."

The cost of shipbuilding and the rate of depreciation were the main costs in deep sea shipping and were not taken into consideration as fully as they should be by the Canadian tax structure.

Mr. Mathers said the Canadian merchant fleet has decreased by about 50 per cent in the late few years until now there are only about 50 to 60 deep sea ships operated by Canadian companies.

Says No Doubt Monster In Lake

ST. ELEUTHEURE, Que. (CP) —Biologist Vadim Vladikov has reported to the Quebec department of game and fisheries the existence—"without any doubt"—of a living marine monster in Lake Pohenegamook.

The "thing"—observed between July and September—is variously called by inhabitants of this Kamouraska County village "the animal of the lek," "the monster," "the crocodile" and "the sea-cow."

Dr. Vladikov, director of the fisheries department laboratory, said in a statement that he has questioned about 10 persons who claim to have observed a large living thing in the lake.

Although versions vary, the biologist writes, there is general accord that the "animal" is between 12 and 18 feet long. Its back is said to resemble an overturned canoe with a saw-toothed fin down the centre. The color is described as brown or black.

Dr. Vladikov says the head has never been seen. St. Eleuthere is about 100 miles east of Quebec City. The name of the lake is an Indian word said by local residents to mean "the mocker."

The lake is seven miles long, one mile wide and, in some areas, said to be 300 feet deep.

Ship Not Liable For Cargo Loss

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian government Merchant Marine Limited Tuesday was freed of damage liability in connection with cargo losses when fire destroyed the motor-vessel Maurienne in Halifax harbor, Feb. 6, 1942.

Maxine Footwear Company Limited of Montreal sued the crown company for \$2,801 damages for the loss of three wood crates of sundries and one drum of shoe leather aboard the ship when it was destroyed.

The shipment was sent its way from Montreal to Kingston, Jamaica, at the time.

The shipment was on its way dismissed the appeal of Maxine Footwear from a judgment of the Exchequer Court that the carr was not responsible for the cargo loss.

Evidence was that the fire was the result of employees of Parly Brothers Limited using acetylene torches to thaw out snapper pipes aboard the ship.

The decision affects other actions for damages totalling \$200,000 by other shippers who suffered losses. The Maurienne, a French-owned ship built in Denmark in 1938, was requisitioned by the Canadian government early in the Second World War.
