## Contract Bridge

One of the ideas which have gained popularity rests on a highly questionable foundation. This idea is that a "change of suits" by the opening bidder implies extra values. The fallacy of this idea is brought to light by such a typical case as the following:

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

♠ K 8 4 2	♥ Q 10 5	♦ J 8	♣ 7
♠ A 6 5 4	♥ J 7	♦ K 10 6	♣ 3 2

This was the bidding in a rubber game where all four players were highly experienced:

South West North East

1 ♠ Pass 1 NT Pass

2 ♣ Pass Pass Pass

South, in rebidding his spades over North's one notrump, was simply practicing the same bidding technique which is used by thousands of other half-informed players. South felt that a rebid of spades was the "conservative" course, whereas a bid of two hearts would have been too aggressive. Aside from his notion that a change of suits implied extra values, South argued later that his spade suit had been much better than his heart suit.

South was wrong. Of course his spades were superior to his hearts, but that was only a small part of the question. South had already announced a spade suit, so what could be the harm of giving North the choice of two suits instead of telling him that South was interested only in a spade contract?

Good partnership bidding demands that these "chances for choices" be provided, one partner to the other. Consider the dilemma North was put in by South's actual procedure. North could not

afford a two-over-one takeout of one spade, but his hand was worth some response; and so his one notrump was the logical action. Yet, because of South's bidding ideas, the partners were quite unable to locate the fitting 4-4 heart suit and were forced to play a contract considerably less attractive. In short, the two-spade rebid stopped North dead in his tracks. He did not like to pass, but he could not afford another bid, and even if he had persisted to two notrump, South scarcely would have shown his heart suit at the three-level!

South went down two at his spade contract, whereas he almost certainly would have made two hearts.
