Steel Output In U.S. Hits High Level

CLEVELAND (AP)—Production in U.S. steel mills, now at its highest level since May, 1963 will be strong this month and a continued rise into December is likely, Steel Magazine forecast Friday.

High output will be needed to fill the demands for current consumption and to build inventories to safe, said the National Metal Workers' Guild.

The steel mills are expected to pour slightly more than last month's output of 2,615,000 tons.

Resumption of operations at many General Motors Corp. plants last week came in time to avoid any serious disruption of steel-making operations, the publication said.

While the steel-makers are encouraged by the prompt release of some held-up tonnage, Steel said, the shipping outlook is complicated by late problems at the local level—General Motors and Ford Motor Co. plants. Some of General Motors car assembly plants have remained closed because of failures in steel-making operations. Ford faces a Nov. 6 strike deadline set by the United Automobile Workers if issues more than 20 key plants are not settled.

SCARE BUYING NOTED
"Interest in forward buying of steel is expected to pick up from here on," said Steel. The fact, there has been some scare buying recently—some midwestern mill estimates for November of its incoming orders are of that nature.

Hedging stems from anticipated price increases and a possible steel strike next year, Steel said.

All the metal-working industries in Friday reported that the auto strike, Steel said, and there's general agreement that business will be brisk for at least several months.

Steel's price composite on the N.Y. 20 grades heavy melting steelmaking scrap climbed last week to \$38.83 a gross ton, up \$2.15 cents and the first advance in six weeks.

Nikita Quits Last Position With Party

MOSCOW (Reuters) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev was Friday reported to have stepped down from his last Soviet Communist party post, as British and not American, although possessing characteristics of all three.

INFORMED SOURCES SAID Khrushchev had submitted his resignation as a member of the Communist Party's Central Committee, the group which removed him as party leader about two weeks ago.

He also resigned as a member of the Supreme Soviet, Russia's parliament, the sources said.

The reports could not be officially confirmed, but Western observers said they came from sources which are usually reliable.

The two posts were the only official functions left to Khrushchev when he was removed from power as premier and party first secretary.

The sources said he set letters of resignation to both bodies, apparently in the last few days.

Khrushchev's withdrawal from the central committee and the Supreme Soviet means a total withdrawal from public life, observers said.

The reports came as Communist sources disclosed a list of charges against the ex-premier in a 20-point indictment said to have been circulated by the Kremlin, accusing him of one-man rule, nepotism and bungling of major issues of foreign policy.

Western observers said the charges amounted to the most slashing indictment levelled against any Russian leader since Khrushchev himself deposed Stalin in 1956.

Pre-Election Caution Hits Price Levels On N.Y. Mart

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market took a small loss last week as Wall Street showed pre-election caution.

If not for a sharp loss on Wednesday, stocks probably would have established a moderate gain on average. On that day however, the stock market was struck by a series of adverse items regarding steel.

The most important item was President Johnson's reported concern about the possibility of a price rise for steel. In addition, U.S. steel reported a drop in earnings from the second quarter to the third quarter.

To make things worse, Wheeling Steel omitted its dividend on common stock and deferred its payment on the cumulative preferred.

For the week, U.S. Steel was down 3 at 58 1/2.

The market recovered slightly on Thursday and Friday, but there was no enthusiasm for

stocks in general, although some of the lower-priced and specially - listed issues attracted trading fancy.

For the week, the Dow Jones Industrial Average declined 154 to 673.90.

AP STOCKS FALL
The Associated Press average of 30 stocks fell 1.6 to 580.2.

The week's volume was 2,154,676 shares compared with 22,585,705 the previous week.

Of 1,530 issues traded this week, 739 declined and 639 advanced.

The week began with the good news that the 31-day General Motors strike was officially ended, but a large number of local disputes remained unsettled and continued to hamper production. Throughout the week, General Motors made slow progress towards settling these plant disputes.

Meanwhile, General Motors stock took a net loss of 2 at 99 1/2.

Finance, Real Estate Seen Among Best Business Deals

OTTAWA (CP) — The most profitable business field in Canada appears to be finance, insurance and real estate.

Professionals in this field are expected to receive the highest salaries in 1962 personal income tax figures published by the Department of Revenue last week ago.

The department now has issued corporation tax statistics for 1962, showing balance sheets for about 113,000 corporations grouped into 11 industrial divisions.

Finance, insurance and real estate division led all others with before-tax profits of \$1.8 billion and 1.34 per cent of total assets.

Within the division were profit-to-revenue percentages of 21 per cent for investment and holding companies, 18 for trust and mortgage companies, 12.6 for stock and bond companies, 20 per cent for loan and "other finance" companies.

Operating profits were about six per cent of revenue for all manufacturers, 1.7 per cent in the wholesale division, 2.8 for retailers, 1.37 for all construction industries, 3.7 for service industries and one per cent for agricultural corporations.

Existence Of French Canada Described Miracle By Lesage

ATHENS (CP)—Quebec Premier Jean Lesage said here Friday the existence of French-Canada in the English-speaking world is a miracle.

During a three-week European tour, he was addressing the Panios School of Political Science after receiving an honorary degree.

Lesage said he would have been assimilated by the 200,000 persons surrounding us who do not speak our language and who often misunderstand us," he said.

"Nevertheless, we still have our language and faith... Our people have made laps out of serious philosophers who have pronounced the laws of history."

The premier spoke in French after thanking the university authorities in Greek for the honorary degree. Text of his speech was released to the press in relation of delivery.

He said French-speaking Canadians are not French, not British and not Americans, although possessing characteristics of all three.

BYZANTINE EFFECTED
Premier Lesage said he believes French-speaking Canada has effected a synthesis of influences from Britain, France and the United States.

"This has resulted in particular characteristics which today Canadian belongs to a people having its own identity and characteristics which clearly distinguish it from all other peoples of the world."

Premier Lesage called on Premier George Papandreu Friday and was the third guest of Foreign Minister Stavros Costopoulos.

The ambassador for education, Louis Akritas, and Canadian Ambassador Antonio Barrette attended the ceremony at the Panios school.

Introducing Lesage, Professor Jomts Georgakis said he is "a distinguished political leader and a friendly and allied country."

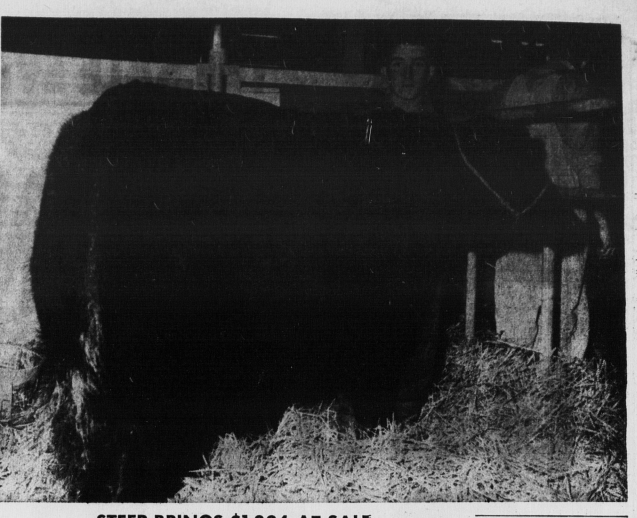
The dean of the Panios school, Professor George Papadimitriou, afterwards read the resolution of the council of professors.

Northern Nigeria Key To African Continent

KANDUNA (AP)—The way of life is slowly changing in northern Nigeria, where African and Arab worlds meet.

Though little known outside Africa, this region on the southern fringe of the Sahara Desert is one of the important keys to the continent.

The northern region is only one of four in Nigeria, but 29,000,000 people live here, more than in any other African country.

The 280,000-square-mile region is bigger than Alberta (255,285 square miles) it came under British colonial rule much later and with less conflict than the coastal areas.

Northern Nigerians are chiefly herdsmen and farmers. Historically, their life is more akin to desert dwelling than the complex village societies in tropical coastal areas.

Craftsmen still dip cotton cloth into blue dye pits in the walled city of Kano, as they have for centuries. But modern textile mills are being built and Kano is better known to the outside world as the main international airport on West Africa's north-south route.

Television has been introduced.

Women can't vote in other parts of Nigeria, but not in the north. Four wives per Moslem household are common.

English literacy is probably less than 10 per cent in the region and literacy in Arabic is only a little higher. U.S. Peace Corps and British volunteer teachers are active here.

For all the changes taking place in the region, some observers think northern Nigeria has not come to terms with modern civilization.

"They are improving education and trying to industrialize because these simply are the things to do," said a British businessman.
