

# Red Wings Score 5-2 Victory At Montreal To Lead Series

**MONTREAL, (CP)**—Detroit Red Wings, breaking loose early and often, rolled up a 5-2 victory over Montreal Canadiens Thursday night to take a 2-1 lead in games in the best-of-seven Stanley Cup final.

It was the Red Wings all the way in their first appearance on Montreal ice in the series, and Canadiens' two goals, by defence-men, came in the third period and were matched by the "Fleet Wings."

Five Red Wings shared in the harvest of Detroit goals, a victory that again established Detroit as favorites to take the series. The fourth game will be played here Saturday.

Alex Delvecchio and Ted Lindsay gave Detroit a 2-0 lead in the first period and Johnny Wilson made it 3-0 early in the second.

Tom Johnson gave Canadiens brief hope with an unassisted goal after seven minutes of the third period but Detroit romped in front again on goals by Metro Prystay and Gordie Howe.

Dollard St. Laurent counted Canadiens' final goal five minutes from the end and Canadiens' sudden rally the rest of the way was too little and too late.

Defenceman Doug Harvey and

centre Jean Beliveau were out of the Montreal line-up because of injuries.

Twelve penalties were called in all, including a misconduct to Howe for dallying in leaving the ice on a minor penalty call. Goalie Terry Sawchuk, who easily outshone Jacques Plante of Montreal, was given a minor in the third period for slashing in.

Maurice (Rocket) Richard was the best Montreal forward. He teamed up with Dickie Moore and Paul Meger at the start and he had worked with two other pairs.

## North Sydney Franklins Protest Wednesday Game

**OTTAWA, (CP)** North Sydney Franklins Thursday lodged a protest with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association over Wednesday night's Memorial Cup quarter-final game with Eastview St. Charles.

Referee Ken Mullins called the game with 32 seconds remaining in play when some 1,000 fans swarmed on the ice after a fight broke out.

W. B. (Baldy) George of Kempville, president of the CAHA, says the protest will be voted on by

the executive of the association. He said it will be three to 10 days before a result is known.

Meanwhile, Eastview, who beat Franklins 6-2 Wednesday night to win the best-of-five series 3-2, will meet Quebec Frontenacs here tonight in the first game of a best-of-three semi-final for the Memorial Cup.

Coach Lou Medvinski of the Franklins was not immediately available for comment. His Maritimes champions were to leave for home Thursday.

**MONTREAL, (CP)** — President Clarence Campbell of the National Hockey League said Thursday if any complaints have been made over the refereeing in the current Stanley Cup final he hasn't had them and, in any event, they would have to be dealt with by the governing of the league.

A report from Detroit Wednesday said Bruce Norris, co-owner of the Red Wings, would file a written complaint of the work of referee Red Storey, who handled the second game of the series which Detroit lost 3-1. General manager Jack Adams of the Red Wings was quoted in Detroit as complaining about the use of Storey.

Coach Dick Irvin of Montreal Canadiens had some caustic comment on the work of referee Bill Chadwick following Canadiens' 3-1 defeat at the hands of the Wings in the first game.

## Bathurst Boxer Included In Crash Victims

**BATHURST, N. B. (CP)** — A Bathurst boxer winning in the pursuit of a dream died Thursday on his first plane flight, two days after his 22nd birthday.

William Harry McLean, a hard-hitting puncher who fought in Maritime rings as Harry-McLean, was a passenger on the TCA North Star which plunged to earth after a collision with a RCAP aircraft. He was flying to Calgary for an April 13 bout with Canadian light-heavyweight champion Doug Harper. It would have been the most important fight of his short professional life. Relatives and friends here said he was confident he would trim Harper and go on to international fame in the ring.

## N. Y. Giants Sell Pitcher To Orioles

**NEW YORK, (AP)**—New York Giants sold lefthanded pitcher Lave Koslo to Baltimore Orioles Thursday for an unannounced sum.

Koslo, 34, had a 6-12 record with the Giants last season appearing in 37 games. He has been used sparingly during the exhibition games.

Koslo led the National League with a 2.50 earned run average in 1949. His best winning year with the Giants was 1947 when he had a 15-10 record. He appeared in two world series games against the Yankees in 1951, pitching a seven-hit 5-1 victory in the opener and losing the sixth and last game, 4-3.

## Athletics' Baseman Suffers Injury

**SAVANNAH, Ga. (AP)** — Don Bollweg, Philadelphia Athletics' first baseman, has suffered a minor break in the middle finger of his right hand and probably will be lost to the club for the opening game Tuesday against Boston Red Sox.

Bollweg, obtained by the Athletics in the big winter deal that sent pitcher Harry Byrd and first baseman Eddie Robinson to New York Yankees, was injured Wednesday at Brunswick, Ga., scooping up a low throw in a game against Pittsburgh Pirates.

## Babe Zaharias Winner of Trophy

**AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)** — Mrs. Babe Didrikson Zaharias was named Thursday as winner of the William D. Richardson trophy as the person who has made the outstanding contribution to golf during the last year.

The trophy is awarded annually by the Golf Writers Association of America in memory of the former New York Times golf writer. The selection was announced at a meeting at the masters tournament.

Mrs. Zaharias was operated on for cancer a year ago and has returned to the women's professional golf circuit.

## First Radio Active Egg Is Produced

**AMERSHAM, England, (AP)** — Britain's atom scientists said Wednesday they have created their first radio-active egg by feeding a hen waste material from an atom plant.

One scientist told reporters it will be used for further scientific experiments.

A spokesman for the National Radiochemical Centre said the hen was fed algae minute water organisms cultured in waste material from an atom plant.

"The first egg the hen laid after its atom meal showed no reaction, but the second contained quite a lot and the third even more radio-activity," the spokesman said.

After that, the radio-activity wore off and the hen now is back to laying normal eggs.

## Seeks To Interest Westerners In Strait Swim

**EDMONTON, (CP)**—James Pengergast of Kensington, P. E. I., is trying to interest Western Canada long-distance swimmers in a nine-mile race across Northumberland Strait separating New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The proposed race would be held this summer.

Pengergast said here Wednesday it is hoped to raise between \$2,000 and \$3,000 for prizes.

The race would start at Cape Tommentine, N. B., and end at Fort Borden, P. E. I. Contestants would have to buck a five-mile-an-hour tide rip across the strait. It's been done before. Evelyn Henry, a P. E. I. nurse, completed the swim in 1952.

Pengergast plans to visit Vancouver to interest west coast swimmers.

## Severe Reprimand To French Marshal

**PARIS, (AP)** — The North Atlantic Council handed a severe and unprecedented reprimand to France's Marshal Alphonse Juin today for his criticism of the proposed European defence community.

The action by the 14 NATO powers heightened the virtual certainty here that either France will have to ask that Juin be relieved as commander-in-chief of Allied forces in central Europe or the marshal will have to resign.

"Any military officer receiving this might be impelled to resign," a NATO spokesman commented.

Jun reiterated an earlier statement Monday he would quit the post only if assured it would go to another Frenchman, something most observers think is a certainty.

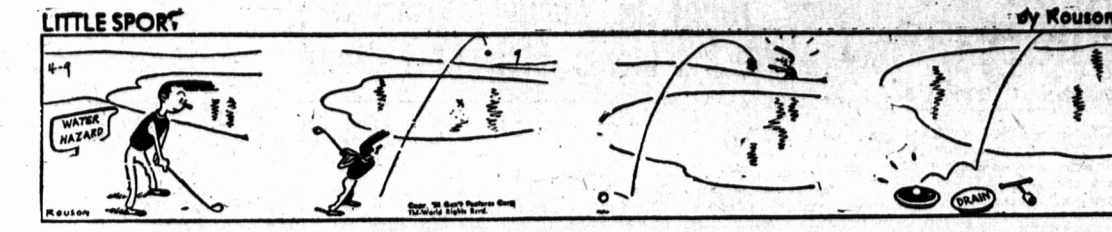

The Saints deserved their win last night; they worked hard and their passes clicked to a degree of perfection which enabled them to have the extra punch which carried them to victory. It was a most important victory for the College boys who played well in a City League of more experienced players all winter. They had previously split a pair of playoff games with the Aces with each team winning their game by one goal. To the team and their coach A. J. MacAdam goes the congratulations of the hockey fans of this City.

The Aces played on an almost even basis with the Saints until the third period but seemed to lose steam when the Red and White squad began the canto with a semi-defensive type of game which called for repeated attacks with no results.
