The Government Well Sustained!

THE NATIONAL POLICY ENDORSED.

CARTWRIGHT AMONG THE SLAIN!

SIR JOHN TWICE ELECTED!

MONTREAL, 21. So far as heard from one hundred and six Liberal-Conservatives have been elected; and forty-seven Opposition. The returns at ten o'clock last night show forty-one Conservatives for Ontario, and twenty-four Liberals.

Quebec returns show forty-six Conservatives and eleven Liberals.

South Grenville and South Lanark have been redeemed for the Government.

Sir John is elected for Carleton and Lennox. Large majorities in both Counties. Blake is elected by a small majority. Cartwright is defeated by Dr. Orton.

So far as heard from, every member of the Government is elected.

The majorities in Toronto, Montreal, London, Hamilton and Ottawa are large. Bergin's majority over Bethune is about one hundred.

Ex-Governor McDonald, (Liberal) is defeated.

In Glengarry, Mills is elected by 14 majority.

McKenzie is elected.

All the Liberal majorities are small. Quebec Centre is redeemed for the Government.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 19.

In a fight between "Cowboys" and Indians, on the border of Indian Territory, four of the former were killed.

DES MOINES, Iowa, June 19.

Forty-one deaths have thus far occurred at Grinnell, and twenty-three at outside points—all from the cyclone.

NEW YORK, June 19.

Michael Davitt spoke in the Academy of Music, to night, being tendered a hearty reception. He replied to the charges that he had abandoned the Irish nationality and had set up "a new departure" in opposition to the policy of Parnell. He denied that the nationalization of the land of Ireland is any more a recognition of England's right to rule Ireland than is involved in the payment of taxes or in calling upon its government to advance the necessary funds for the carrying out of the scheme of peasant proprietary. While he yielded to no Irishman alone in allegiance to the principle of Ireland's right to govern itself, he would infinitely prefer to deal directly with the English Government than with its exasperating and unscrupulous mercenaries, the Irish landlords. Better have the land of our country administered by even an executive English authority than have it made the instrument of social slavery and degradation, of tyranny and exaction, by merciless and polluted hands of Irish landlords. He claimed that the criticism of his recent Liverpool speech by Parnell was unfair and not warranted by the speech itself.

IOWA CITY, Iowa, June 19.

Ten to twelve persons are reported to have lost their lives at Irish Ridge, by the cyclone.

LONDON, June 19.

In the Commons, this afternoon, Sir Charles Dilke stated that Germany, Austria and Russia have accepted the proposal for a conference. Italy previously declared that she would follow the course of the other powers. Very full instructions, he said, were sent to Admiral Seymour on Friday, which are sufficient to preserve the British interest in Alexandria in case of renewed disturbance.

The Commons, in committee, resumed the debate on the Repression Bill. The ninth clause, providing for the arrest of strangers, found under suspicious circumstances, was adopted—194 to 31.

Clause ten, directing the seizure of newspapers containing matter inciting to the commission of treason, or any act of violence or intimidation, was adopted by a vote of 99 to 26.

ALEXANDRIA, June 19.

It is rumored that the prefect of police, who was suspected of being one of the prime authors of the riots of the 11th inst., died suddenly. Arabi Pasha has started for Alexandria.

CHIBAUANA, N. M., June 19.

Seven Apache prisoners, captured in recent fights with the Jesus and Maria bands, were taken out in a field yesterday and shot.

KANSAS CITY, June 19.

A most destructive wind and rain storm visited this city between one and two o'clock Sunday morning. The wind blew sixty miles per hour. The rainfall was heavy and the lightning terrific. Yesterday morning the city presented a frightful spectacle. Not a single square in town escaped the storm. The streets in every quarter were strewn with signs and awnings limbs of trees, roofs and debris of all kinds. Scarcely an exposed building in the city remained whole, chimneys being blown down, roofs taken off and in many cases houses, being ruined. Among the more serious losses are the iron bridge between the city and Armourdale, three spans of which were carried away. Street railroad stables, court house and Coots' opera house lost their roofs. All the hotels were more or less damaged and business houses and dwellings in every part of the city suffered. The total loss will amount to \$200,000. Information from the surrounding country shows the storm was pretty general, and that great damage was done to the crops and nearly all kinds of property.

NASHVILLE, June 19.

Henry Huddleston, colored, was lynched at Winchester on Sunday night for raping a widow named Vaughan.

NEW YORK, June 19.

Davitt spent a great portion of the afternoon and evening at the Astor House in consultation with Dr. Wallace and other prominent members of the Land League.

CAIRO, June 19.

A heavy wind and rain storm swept over this city at 3 p. m., Sunday, doing considerable damage to roofs and trees. At Beach Ridge a man and his wife were killed and a woman had her arm broken by a house falling in on them. Wheat is badly damaged at the metropolis. The storm blew the chair boat loose, sank the steamer Jennie Walker, blew steamer Paris Crown's chimneys down, sank a barge with coal, and blew the roofs off of mills and other buildings.

NEW YORK, June 19.

Six thousand immigrants arrived at Castle Garden yesterday, including six hundred refugee Jews. All steamship companies now pay head money.

LONDON, June 19.

The Times' Alexandria despatch states that the banks are mostly prepared to resist the siege. The Ottoman Bank has been converted into an armory. The entrance to the bank are blocked by piles of silk and the clerks are well supplied with provisions. They also have ropes ready to haul up refugees from the street.

ISMAILIA, June 19.

Alarm is felt here because of the vicinity of large numbers of Bedouin Arabs who lately approached close to town and have been hovering along the unguarded banks of the canal.

BERLIN, June 19.

The Bundestag consented to the motion made by Saxony to extend the state of siege at Leipzig another year.

Herr Meiling, one of the principal navigators in the German navy, has been arrested at Kiel on the charge of having accepted a bribe of 150,000 roubles to deliver to the Russian Government copies of plans of all works of defence on the German coast.

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 19.

The brig Aretus, from Windsor, N. S., ran ashore on Long Beach, in the lower harbor, on Saturday night, while bound out. She lies well up on the beach on a sandy bottom. An effort will be made at high water to haul her off. It is asserted that both captain and crew were intoxicated, which caused the accident. It is also asserted that the second mate was attacked and beaten by the crew because he refused to join them in the spree.

A terrible accident occurred on Sunday, May 28, at a bull fight at Arles, in the south of France. The bulls were principally Spanish, and very savage. A spectator named Louis Bary, aged 60, having accidentally tumbled within the barricades was immediately pursued by one of the bulls. The poor old man could not run very fast, and in a few seconds the bull had tossed him high into the air, and letting him fall to the ground with a dull thud, the furious animal gored him with his horns. An indescribable scene of excitement ensued. The bull was secured, and the man carried in a shouting state to the hospital. Immediately after this the Commissary and the Sub Prefect ordered the spectacle to be stopped; but this measure provoked such outburst of protestation from the spectators that after an hour of free fighting and tumult within the arena, during which the cashier's office was unsuccessfully stormed, the Commissary and Sub Prefect were actually compelled to order the continuation of the performance.
