Ch'town Legion Branch Has 1,692 Members

Alfred Peters, members' committee chairman, reported to the regular meeting of the Charlottetown branch Royal Canadian Legion Thursday that the local membership now stands at 1,692, the highest on record.

Following his report Mr. Peters presented 53 new applications which received unanimous approval, and it was announced that they will be enrolled as soon as the arrangements can be completed for an initial on ceremony.

Stanley Bryanton, chairman of the finance committee reported that the branch was in a sound financial condition.

First vice-president J.J. Conolly, chairman of the pension and welfare committee, stated that several cases of welfare were receiving the attention of the committee, and he hoped to give a more detailed report at the next meeting concerning three cases which are being investigated.

The report of the sick and visiting committee was submitted by Ira Brown who stated that the hospitals and institutions had been visited and treats given to sick veterans. Mr. Brown also reported as chairman of the special names committee and stated that donations for the furnishing of the new Legion Home were being received and that many members are yet to be canvassed. He was however well pleased with the results to date.

Other chairman submitting reports were second vice-president, George Reynolds; immediate past president, E.J. Brown, and Charles Ryan, who outlined the activities of the sports committee in so far as

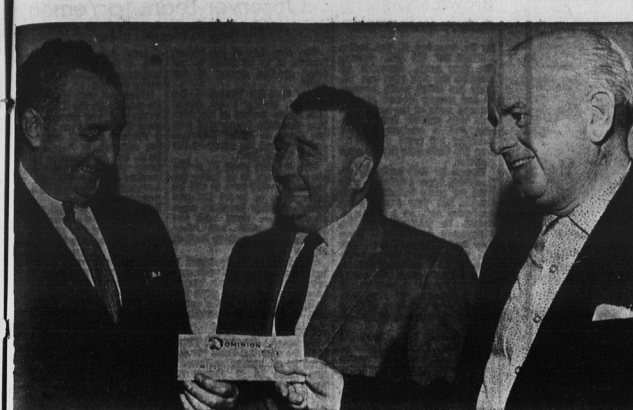

DOMINION STORES PRESENTS CHEQUE

Another large donation to the joint hospital campaign in Charlottetown took place yesterday when officials of Dominion Stores Ltd., presented a cheque for \$1,000. Queens County magistrate's court yesterday afternoon, for sentencing on nine separate charges, Frederick Harold Waite, New Wiltshire, sentenced to six months in Queens County Jail on each count by Magistrate James B. Johnson, Q.C.

Waite, who was not represented by counsel, at an earlier session pleaded guilty to four charges of uttering forged documents, two of forged, one of break, entry, theft, and four of theft. All sentences are to run concurrently.

On the forgery counts, the accused was ordered to enter into a recognizance in the amount of \$1,000, to keep the peace for a period of two years, commencing from the date of completion of his jail term.

Part of the terms of the recognizance is that during the first year he must report to a member of the John Howard Society once a month and during the second year once every two months. At yesterday's hearing this was represented by Wendall MacNeil.

Appearing for judgment on a charge of break, entry and theft at the Southport Esso service station, Walter Sneland Berz, gas, Charlottetown, was found guilty as charged and remanded until June 5 for sentencing, with bail to stand.

Arrested on a similar charge, Edward Francis Burns, Charlottetown, was remanded until June 7 for hearing. Counsel in both of these cases is John J. Himes, while the crown is represented by Alan K. Scales.

Charged under the Exchequer Act with having unlawful possession of a still suitable for the manufacture of spirits, Owen Francis MacGregor, Herizalpe, had his case adjourned for hearing until June 6 at 7:30 p.m.

In this case the prosecution is being conducted by Ian MacLeod, and counsel for the defence is Lester O'Donnell.

CASE ADJUDICATED

Following information by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur MacGillivray, that investigation of the case was not completed, William Gordon Emery, B.E.A. v. M.L.N. charged with driving without due care and attention, was given an adjournment until June 7, when a date will be fixed for hearing. Counsel for the defence is Kenneth Macdonald.

Four persons pleaded guilty to the possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences, and each was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days.

For being intoxicated in a public place another accused was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Lester W. Davis, Cornwall, was fined \$20 and costs for exceeding the speed limit in a 40 m.p.h. zone.

Fred Deane, Charlottetown, charged with over speeding the car of a truck was fined \$10 and costs.

John E. Singleton, Rosherby, charged with operating a vehicle in a public place, was fined \$10 and costs.

Ralph Shea, Parkdale, was fined \$10 and costs for driving on the highway without having an operator's licence for this year.
