

U. S. Girl Crowned Miss Universe

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Girls, let this be a lesson—two extra inches on the hips cost Miss Brazil the Miss Universe title.
One of the judges, who naturally didn't want to be quoted, disclosed Saturday that Miss U. S. A., a perfectly formed southern girl, won because of the Latin's bulge.
In judging beauty contests, the experts look for the ideal form which is the hips and bust the same, with the waist 10 to 12 inches less.
Maria Martha Rocha, of Bahia, Brazil, measured 36 inches at the bust, 23 at the waist and 38 at the hips. Miriam Stevenson, the 21-year-old South Carolina entrant who won both Miss U. S. A. and Miss Universe measured 36 at the bust and hips and 24 at the waist.
Even with the hip measurements Miss Brazil came awfully awfully close. The judges had an unprecedented triple tie vote before finally giving the nod to the southern lass Friday night.

GORGEOUS FACE

"Miss Brazil's face was the most gorgeous in the contest," said the unnamed judge. "But we just couldn't discount those hips."
Although she won't go home with the title, the blue-eyed Latin will gather much of the material prizes. Miss Stevenson, by winning both titles, is entitled to two movie contracts of 13 weeks each and two \$4,000 convertibles.
One spokesman for the contest said "You can say it is certain that Miss Stevenson will not be allowed to keep the two cars, that one will go to Miss Rocha."
There were five finalists before the choice of Miss Stevenson was finally made. The runners-up to Miss Stevenson, in order, were Miss Rocha of Bahia, Virginia June Lee of Hong Kong, Regina Ernst of Bremen, Germany, and Ragnhild Claussou of Sweden.
Joyce Landry of Toronto, Canada's representative, did not reach the finals.

Pierce was sentenced to 90 days in jail for petty larceny.
