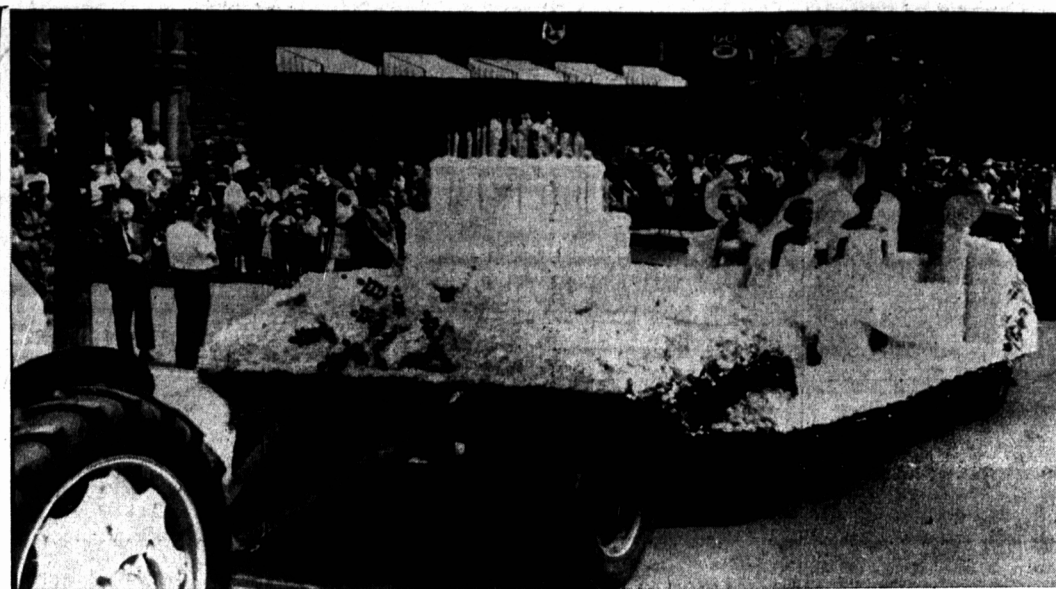
Friends of Mr. Austin Toombs are pleased to learn of his convalescence following a recent illness.

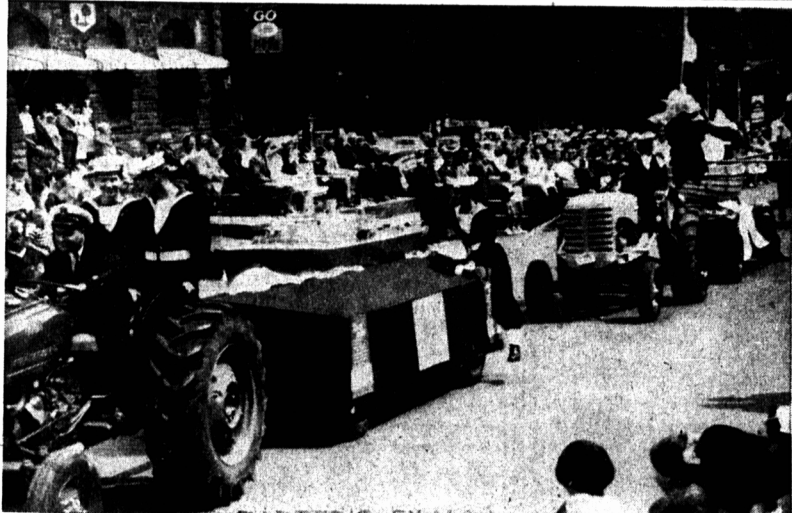

214 Cars in Accidents April - June

There were no fatal motor vehicle accidents on Prince Edward Island in the second quarter of 1955, according to a report by the Motor Vehicle Branch of the Provincial Secretary's Department.

There were, however, 32 accidents resulting in injury and 104 accidents resulting in property damage without injuries, a total of 136 accidents for the months of April, May and June. Estimated property damage, counting only those amounting to \$100 or more, was \$53,300. The number of vehicles involved was 214.

The age group 21-30 accounted for 39 per cent of all accidents, of illness from sore throat conditions which have caused confinement, and absence from duty, for comparatively long periods of time in these districts but now convalescing.

Minutes of last meeting were read, approved and signed. Reports were given by the officers

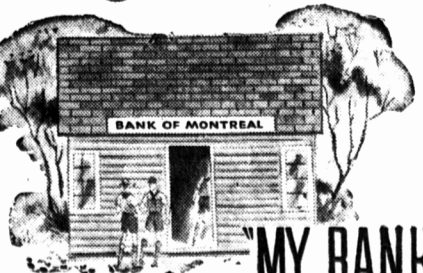


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
