**COULD LOSE PRESTIGE**  
 If the current talks fail the trade alliance would lose much prestige and its development might suffer lasting damage. The council agreed Thursday to sit until Saturday and then adjourn until Monday.

The main conflict is between France and West Germany. The former wants to gain entry to the German market for its burdensome agricultural surplus while the latter wants to protect its farmers from cheap foreign imports.

Pisani told the morning session that France is strongly opposed to a protectionist policy in agricultural matters.

The French delegation thus took its position at variance with the wishes of French farmers, who would like a system of minimum prices enabling the government to suspend imports when prices fall below that level.

At the afternoon session the ministers discussed dairy products, which the Dutch have asked to be included in any detailed agreement on a common agricultural policy.

## Katanga, Congo Union Is 'Must' Says Moise

**ELISABETHVILLE** (Reuters) Katanga President Moise Tshombe said Thursday the province must be reunited with the rest of the Congo but still remain free enough to fight the threat of communism and rule by leftist Antoine Gizenga.

Tshombe was addressing his provincial assembly, called in session to consider ratification of an agreement ending mineral-rich Katanga's 18-month-old secession from the rest of this former Belgian colony.

Tshombe has insisted that the assembly must approve his pact with central government Premier Cyrille Adoula before it can become effective.
