## JANET MACPHERSON AND PATTY ROGERS AT EUROPEAN CAMPS

**Janet MacPherson**, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Horace MacFarlane, and **Patty Rogers**, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ferno Rogers, two 16 year old girls, returned last week to their homes in Summerside from Girl Guide camps in Europe. These Gold cross winners were chosen from Prince Edward Island for Overseas by the Dominion Headquarters in Toronto upon applications and recommendations and they sailed from Montreal on the Empress of England on July 29 in company with 30 Guides and six leaders, landing in Greenock, Scotland, then going by train to Hamburg, Germany. "Would like to do it all over again," said the girls, who were greatly thrilled and excited with the whole trip, "and the only improvement that could have been made would have been to have families with us."

**Janet**, after spending three days in Edinburgh, with her group toured this beautiful city and did some shopping, as well as a bus trip through the Trossachs, which included Loch Lomond and Kinross and Glenorchy Castle. They travelled by train to Newcastle then by steamer to Oslo, Norway, spending three days sightseeing, before going by train to Stockholm, Sweden, for three days, on to Denmark, Copenhagen for three more days, and returning to Edinburgh. At this camp were 13,000 Danish Guides and 2,000 leaders, with 500 Guides representing 18 different countries, as guests. "International Night" was a special occasion when each guest country performed for the 25,000 visitors present.

During camp, they were visited by Queen Ingrid and her daughter, **Princess Benedicte**, also by **Lady Baden-Powell**, who spent three days with them. The girl guides were taken on tours of the Denmark countryside and in their camp life, all privileges to assist in the duties of the guides who were crippled and in wheel chairs, by taking them around and to the beach. The general breakfast included uncoked rolled oats; lunch-time, open faced sandwiches, hot rye bread and sliced potatoes, with dessert consisting of cornflakes and buttered apples. Dinner was of meat and potatoes, but no other vegetables. During Headquarters following ten days of eating delicious Danish pastry.

At the home in which Janet stayed, no English was spoken or understood, but by means of a phrase book, she got along fairly well, with, of course, many amusing incidents.

The group was entertained at luncheon at the Embassy, guest of the Canadian Ambassador to Denmark. "The Little Mermaid," a world famous sculpture, the Tivoli Gardens, and many castles were included in the group's tour. Guides from Canada, whose parents were Danish born, took the Canadian group to visit with their relatives, and this gave the girls the first real taste of Denmark.

Returning to England, the group spent eight days in London. **Lady Baden-Powell** entertained them at the tea hour at her home, Hampton Court Palace, which they were shown through and each girl had the opportunity of speaking personally with her hostess. On Sunday they attended service at St. Paul's Cathedral, with their three other girls, had the privilege of smoking a pipe, and Theatre and seeing the play "My Fair Lady." A bus tour through London and Edinburgh took them to Greenock, Glasgow, and thence by train to Copenhagen, Denmark, and back to London, with a stop at the home, **Empress of Canada**, in Montreal.
