Local Consul's Approval
Does Not Pass Export Goods

"Inherent vice" was one of the more intriguing-sounding topics at Tuesday's seminar in Toronto of the Canadian Exporters' Association.

It wasn't the sort of vice however, that one might hear about either in a theological discussion or the police court—but, like any kind of vice, you can't be sure that you are protected against it. Inherent vice, to the exporters, refers to things, not people.

For instance, you ship a cargo of fruit and you insure it against loss or damage. But the ship is delayed and the fruit rots. Chances are your policy won't protect you. The loss is due to "inherent vice" in the fruit.

BAGS SPLIT
Or you ship something in bags and the bags split and the shipment has to be re-bagged on arrival. That, in a specific case, was ruled by a British court to be "inherent vice" in the bags and the insurance claim was disallowed.

In another British case kettles shipped in boxes were dented on arrival. The boxes hadn't been subjected to any exceptional cir-

cumstances and the court found that "inherent vice" in the boxes and packing was responsible, and that there was no fault with the kettles.

That's the sort of tricky problem, as outlined in discussions, the exporters must try to live with. Perhaps the makers of consular forms and has them approved by the local consul of the country to which he is shipping. Then he finds that the local consul's approval doesn't mean he has scrutinized them for conformity with his country's laws. That is sure on arrival and the exporter may find himself subject to a fine for some breach or other.

LEGAL ADVICE
As a piece of legal advice, exporters were advised that, when making an agreement with a distributor in another country, they have the agreement checked by a lawyer in that country.

If not, they may think they have appointed a distributor when actually they have appointed an agent who has power to make agreements for them and subject them to liabilities.

May Contest
Magazine Tax

OTTAWA (CP)—The federal tax on Canadian editions of foreign magazines may be challenged before the courts.

Authorities disclosed Wednesday that Reader's Digest has not made monthly tax payments or followed Canadian exporters because it puts up the price of their goods in other countries.

They were told by S. A. McNabb of the Canadian Bank of Commerce that they probably won't get relief this year—the high Canadian dollar is likely to stay high. Much financing remains to be done which will draw foreign funds in Canada.

CAN'T FIX DOLLAR
Asked if the Canadian dollar could be fixed at a controlled par with the American dollar, Mr. McNabb said this would set in process a chain of circumstances which would bring further upward force on the Canadian dollar.

Treasury bills would take on a higher rate; this would force up interest rates in Canada; this, in turn, would make United States sources more attractive for Canadian raising money; and this would start a new flow of American money.

There is no better brake on the Canadian dollar, he said, than the present "floating brake." Under this, the point must come when it would be uneconomical to borrow in Canada. Accordingly, he thought the exchange rate would ultimately "right itself," but he didn't see prospect of this for a year or so.

other regulations under the law. The next step, they said, is for the government to initiate civil action to recover payment. Such action may take place in the Exchequer Court of Canada later this year.

The whole question of whether the tax will survive would be thrown open for the courts to decide. Involved, it is understood, would be the main issue of whether the tax is a federal attempt to regulate and discriminate in the field of magazine distribution.

Finance Minister Harris, in announcing the tax in his budget of March, 1956, said it was intended as a means of arresting inroads by special editions of foreign magazines into advertising revenues and circulation available to Canadian magazines.

TAX ABOUT 14 PER CENT
The tax—announced as 20 per cent—works out at 13.9 per cent of the gross amount charged by the magazines for advertisements appearing in their Canadian editions.

It went into effect in January. Some United States magazines, which had Canadian editions, discontinued them. Time and Reader's Digest remained in the field.

Federal officials said Time has made its monthly excise tax payments, but Reader's Digest has not. Harris' Digest also had not taken up the necessary \$2 excise tax licence or put up the \$5,000 security as required by the regulations.

When the tax was announced Progressive Conservatives said it was a form of government interference in the magazine business and that it would be ineffective in protecting Canadian magazines from foreign competition.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:
North East South West
2 Pass 1 Pass
2 Pass 1 Pass

What do you now bid with each of the following four hands?

- 1. ♠KJ87 ♥AJ763 ♦10 ♣943
- 2. ♠K42 ♥AQ64 ♦J3 ♣AJ95
- 3. ♠A82 ♥AK982 ♦K86 ♣J763
- 4. ♠A ♥KQJ75 ♦974 ♣J862

1. Pass. It is clear there is no game in this hand and the only question that needs to be settled is where is the best place to play the part score.

The two diamond bid identifies a hand of minimum proportions with a rebiddable diamond suit. The suit is apt to be six cards in length. North cannot be keen about hearts since he failed to raise them immediately. He cannot have much interest in spades since he did not bid a spade over a heart.

Any further move over two diamonds, therefore, is looking for trouble. Bidding again would only be getting in deeper.

2. Three notrump. An opening bid facing an opening bid is a game. All signs point to the game being in notrump. With 15 high card points, notrump distribution and all suits stopped, no other bid should be considered.

A two notrump response at this

point would not be forcing, and we might get left at the post. A three club bid, though, is forcing, is kind of pointless. Notrump, if it is a suit play, is the indicated spot.

3. Two spades. This is a special purpose bid, manufactured to suit the occasion, to try to find out where the best place to play for game is.

There should be little doubt there is a game in the hand somewhere, but whether it is in hearts, diamonds or notrump is an open question.

If partner's next bid is hearts or diamonds, game will be undertaken in the suit of his choice. If North bids two notrump it will be raised to three because club strength is now assured.

If, by any chance, partner raises spades, which is quite unlikely, we can always retreat to diamonds.

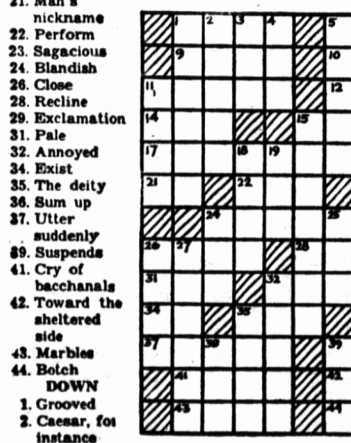
4. Three diamonds. This bid invites but does not force partner to continue. There will be no game if his hand lacks the values to justify another bid.

If North bids again, he may show behind heart support by bidding three hearts, in which case we go on to four. If he bids three no-trump we accept his choice.

If North bids four diamonds, it is all right to bid five and hope for the best, but a pass is also acceptable.
