Chief Flora MacLeod Arriving Over Weekend

Dame Flora MacLeod, world chieftain of Clan MacLeod will arrive in Charlottetown Sunday evening for a two-day visit to the Prince Edward Island capital. She will come here from Cape Breton where she commenced her Canada-wide trip last week. The 77-year old Scottish chieftain, the first woman ever to hold such a position, will be guest of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island at a buffet supper and Ceilidh in the Charlottetown Hotel Tuesday night. A Scottish branch of the Clan which spells the name "Machlejd" and at receptions in her honour throughout the world The Chief has issued the call for "Skye Week", which is held annually in May, when Dame Flora will preside as gracious hostess at Dunvegan Castle, the home of the MacLeods for over 700 years. More than 600 people called on her there on "MacLeod Day" in "Skye Week" last year. Visitors to Dunvegan walk through the old banquet hall with its nine-foot-thick walls and look down into the bottleneck dungeon. They will see the famous drinking horn from the bull which gave MacLeods their crest and their motto, "Hold Fast." They will be amazed to find in this ancient stone castle with its fierce tales of the past, not only central heating and other modern comforts, but an atmosphere as gracious and friendly as its creator. For Dame Flora MacLeod is the hostess, and she answers the door to greet all callers. "It is wonderful," she says, "to welcome MacLeods at the castle, especially those from overseas who have been separated from their origin by many generations. They feel a deep sense of belonging when they meet here for the first time."

Dame Flora will motor from Baddeck, C. B. on Sunday accompanied by Donald M. MacLeod, honorary secretary of the Clan MacLeod Society of Nova Scotia. She will be taken through to Charlottetown by Mr. MacLeod to the home of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. MacLeod, 2 Park Terrace, where she will be a guest during her stay in Charlottetown.

Dame Flora MacLeod of MacLeod, 28th Chief of the Scottish MacLeods, and the first woman ever to head her Clan arrived in Canada from her Dunvegan Castle home in Scotland on October 3rd to begin a coast-to-coast tour for the purpose of uniting members of her clan family.

Spry, pink cheeked and blue eyed "Chief Flora" posed a striking contrast to her forbears. Highland chiefs who could wield a claymore established the Clan's name, but it has never been more alive than it is now under the leadership of gentle, seventy-seven year old Dame Flora.

Since the later part of last year Dame Flora's mission to find other MacLeods has taken her to the Philippines, Western Australia, New Zealand, Hawaii, the United States and now, Canada. During a month and a half in this country she will fly from the east to the west coast as the guest of Trans Canada Airlines visiting major cities enroute, meeting her clansmen to bind together still more strongly the ties between the homeland and the far-flung parts of the Empire.

"All who bear the MacLeod name," she explains, "are members of a family which originated

No. 10 Downing Street, London, the official residence of the Prime Minister, who was then Disraeli. Her grandfather, Sir Stafford Northcote, created the Earl of Iddesleigh in the Disraeli government, was Chancellor of the Exchequer. Before Dame Flora's birth, her family lived next door at No. 11 in rather cramped quarters, but as Disraeli was a widower, with much more space than he needed, he graciously agreed to exchange houses with the Northcotes. Flora grew up to marry Herbert Walter, a foreign correspondent for the London Times, in 1901. And as there were no male heirs in the MacLeod family, she changed her name back to MacLeod a few years after her husband's death in 1933 in order to succeed her father Sir Reginald, as Chief of the Clan.

TRANS - CANADA HIGHWAY

The Town Planning Act Regulations has been amended to include all the land on both sides of the Trans-Canada Highway within 300 feet of the centre line of said Highway; extending from the town limits of Town of Borden to York or North River, and from the eastern boundary of the Southport Area to the Wood Islands pier.

Regulations are now effective controlling

- (1) Purchase and sale of building lots. (2) Location of buildings on lots (3) Changing location of any building or structure (4) Move or relocate any building or structure. (5) Construction of septic tanks.

Persons intending to erect or structurally alter any dwelling or other building or structure in this area are reminded that it is necessary to first obtain a permit from this Department.

For further information consult the Director of Town Planning before buying a lot or erecting a building on your present holding.

Persons violating the provisions of this Act are liable to a fine from \$50.00 to \$200.00.
