Toronto Trading At Record Level During The Year
By Dick Baiden
(Canadian Press Staff Writer)
TORONTO, Dec. 30 (CP)-Toronto Stock Exchange prices which reached record highs in September, slipped during the latter part of 1951 to cut about one-third off the industrial gains. Base metals and Western oils, however, managed to retain most of their advances. The exchange's industrial index ended 1951 at 290.65, reached 350.28 Sept. 14, and ended this year near 340. Base metals climbed from a year-end figure of 163.01 to 198.55 Oct. 3, and held around 193. Western oils advanced from 80.25 to 126.31 Nov. 12, and stayed close to that figure. Golds went from 74.72 to 94.44 Feb. 17, but were down to around 84 at the year-end. Bullish buying during the year, reflecting enthusiasm for mining issues, reached a peak turnover of 7,837,000 shares Oct. 11, an all-time daily record. All divisions started the year strongly. Industrials jumped 45 points by early February, while golds added 20 points, base metals 25 and Western oils 23. The advance slowed later in the month and reversed direction in the final week. March hesitancy was replaced in April by renewed confidence. Investors noted increased expenditures for re-armaments and selected industrials drew firmer support, sending the industrial index up another 25 points. Mining issues, however, showed little change. A sudden wave of selling May 15 dropped prices for their greatest loss in six months, leaving observers bewildered; but the selling ended as suddenly as it began and industrials ended the month near their opening levels. Base metals eased, but golds and Western oils showed only slight changes. Announcement in June of armistice talks in Korea caused a brief recession, but in general investors held to the view that armament programs would be continued. Summer Doldrums Prices moved drowsily through July and most of August, but late support added 13 points to the industrial index, and carried on into the record high-ground of mid-September. Base metals and oils showed only slight gains in this period. Golds, which earlier captured interest on rumors that restrictions on gold sales in world markets would be relaxed, were relatively quiet when the restrictions were finally eased. Increased demand for strategic base metals, coupled with interest in Western oil developments, sent the daily volume to an average of 6,000,000 shares in the second week of October, with the turnover topping 7,000,000 shares in two sessions. Optimists saw their hopes of a rising industrial market fade as prices slipped in relatively slow November trading. Only Western oils held their ground. December trading failed to produce a predicted year-end rally. Western oils closed near their high for the year but industrials were down about 20 points while base metals and golds finished about five and 10 points lower. Looking ahead, most observers predicted steadily growing demand for base metal and Western oil stocks. Selected industrials, notably steels and some manufacturing companies, they thought, would also be in demand. Golds would show little change unless there were a sudden reversal of the currently rising trend for other security prices. Some professionals noted increasing buying of common stocks as opposed to preferred issues, as a hedge against inflation. Volume for the year was more than 550,000,000 shares compared with about 500,000,000 in 1950, while value of the trading was around \$1,185,000,000, compared with last year's \$885,000,000.

Stronger Trend In Potato Market Noted
There has been a much stronger trend evident in the potato market, especially in the latter part of last week, with some price advances both in this Province and elsewhere. While the overall picture is still under the influence of the holiday buying it is difficult to determine the true amount of the price advance. However, it appears that prices are from 20 cents to 30 cents per bushel stronger here, while the values in New Brunswick during the past several days have been firm at \$6.00 per barrel, or approximately \$2.18 per bushel. At the price level now prevailing for tablestock Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, said it would be difficult to obtain premium prices for most varieties of seed at the present time.

Carloadings
OTTAWA, Dec. 28 (CP)-Carloadings on Canadian railways decreased during the week ended Dec. 22 to 70,367 cars from 79,970 cars the previous week and 74,369 cars for the corresponding week a year ago, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. Increases over the similar period last year were shown in loadings of pulpwood, woodpulp and paper and gasoline. Declines were registered in loadings of livestock, coal, ore, grain and grain products, building materials and lumber.

U. S. Steel Report
CLEVELAND, Dec. 30 (AP)-Steel magazine today reports a "spreading" view that many scarce steel items will be available "in much more satisfactory volume" by mid-1952. "This of course is dependent upon avoidance of a costly steel strike and serious production losses because of scrap shortage," Steel adds. In its weekly summary of the metal-working industry, the magazine says some steel authorities predict signs of supply-demand balance in certain items will appear in the first quarter of 1952. "While first quarter tonnage is virtually sold out," Steel continues, "curtailment in civilian goods production has definitely eased demand pressure for sheets and strip." Despite the prospects for next year, however, Steel says there is little chance for early easing of government controls.

Bologna, Italy, Dec. 30 (AP)-Prof. Orsilio Colombini, 53-year-old veteran Italian Communist, has been expelled from the party for "putting himself at the service of the Fascist police since 1928". In Rome, the newspaper Il Popolo, organ of Premier Alcide Gaspari's Christian Democrat Party, speculated that an outbreak of "Titoism" in the party was the reason.
