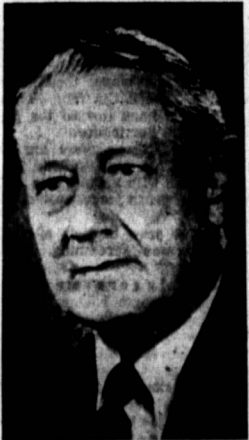

More than 150 members and guests attended the Rotary dinner honouring the Premiers of the Atlantic Provinces, the District Governor of Rotary and members of Apec, held at noon yesterday at the Charlottetown Hotel. Set down at Sydney N.S. due to fog, Premier Smallwood of Newfoundland who was scheduled to be guest speaker failed to appear and in his stead the breach was capably filled by Brigadier M. Wardell, editor of the Atlantic Provinces Advocate, Fredericton, N.B. In the brief time in which APEC has been functioning, we have seen their activities move up from a remote corner on page two of a few newspapers, to the front page of the leading dailies fed with the latest important news by the wires of Canadian Press. Brigadier Wardell said as he stressed the importance of the organization in the economic life of the Atlantic Provinces. Described as the spearhead of an attack to attempt to put an

Panel Discussion Held On Agricultural Problems

A charge that farmers are their own worst enemies and just about compete themselves off the market, and a challenge to do with hog, cattle, marketing what has been done with hog marketing were two of the highlights of the discussion in Apec's agricultural committee meeting here yesterday afternoon. It was Charles Yeo, former President of the Prince Edward Island Federation of Agriculture, who made the charge against his fellow farmers. Nova Scotia's deputy minister of agriculture, who threw out the challenge re cattle marketing. Mr. Yeo charged that the farmers are cutting their own throats. They are wrecking their own economy, he added. "We need among our farmers a feeling somewhat akin to what they have in labor groups," said the Island Chairman of Apec for agriculture as he called upon everyone else in the Maritimes to do everything possible to help the farmer. The farmer is a great spender. If he has money in his pocket he will spend it and it is good for the economy as a whole, Mr. Yeo observed. LENGTHY DISCUSSION Dr. Walsh's comparison between cattle marketing and hog marketing came after a lengthy discussion of the differential on cattle prices between Maritime and Toronto and Montreal markets. It had been stated previously that cattle prices generally run about three cents lower per lb in the Maritime areas and that consumers pay about three cents a pound more when they buy. Dr. Walsh recalled that thirty years ago the dressed weight price for hogs here was the same as the live weight price in Montreal. There is a shrinkage or some twenty-five percent in killing so we were actually getting about seventy-five percent of the Montreal market price, he observed with selling by grade, centralized selling and, in some cases, action by marketing boards the price of hogs in the Maritimes is about one-quarter of a cent higher than it is in Montreal and the quality is the best in Canada, he stated. There is a matter of 55 percent grade A hogs in Prince Edward Island, fifty in the Maritimes as a whole comparing with about twenty-eight percent as a Canadian average. Dr. Walsh told the meeting. UNREALISTIC J.L. Dewar suggested that a comparison between Maritime and Montreal markets was unrealistic because we are in a surplus area here and they are in a deficiency area in Montreal. He suggested that the price at Winnipeg, a comparable surplus area, plus the freight to here would be a fairer goal to aim at. The panel on agricultural markets was chaired by Dr. Frank MacKinnon vice-president of Apec for this Province. It included John Shaffer of the M.V. Graves company, George Wright of Island Fosted Foods, Lloyd Green of Halifax, Charles Yeo, Art Park, economist from the

Discusses Beef Possibilities In The Maritime Provinces

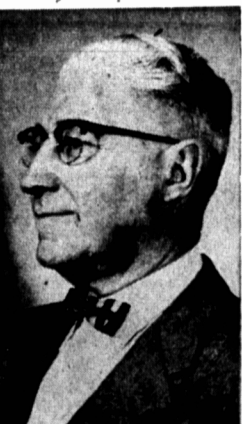
That the farm cash income in Prince Edward Island during 1955, although greater than in 1953 and 1954 was six million less than in 1952. This was shown in a report on "Beef and beef possibilities" submitted by Mr. A.G. Parks at the annual meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council meeting in Charlottetown yesterday. Major items which contributed to this difference were potatoes and hogs. At the same time, however, certain items increased in overall returns notably cattle, poultry, eggs and dairy products. Indeed, the first two accounts for over 30 per cent of total Farm Cash Income in this Province, the report stated and almost this amount in the Maritime Provinces. RISING INTEREST It is indicated that since 1950 there has been a general rising interest in and development of beef cattle throughout the Maritime Provinces. This is shown by the steadily increasing number of farms reporting cattle kept for beef purposes. This report also shows the actual distribution of such cattle to be one mainly of a large number of small farms with its seemingly consequent low income units and unit high cost. This, then, suggest a major factor affecting beef production in the Atlantic Region, the report states. Under average conditions, it continues, three to four acres are required to provide pasture for each beef animal. This, therefore, leads to the conclusion that, in order to expand the beef industry in the Atlantic Region, it is necessary to increase the size of farms or to farm more intensively and establish community pastures. This may also prove to be the answer to the light shipping weights so prevalent in the Maritimes, and tend to the marketing of animals at heavier weights thereby indirectly expanding the industry. LOWER GRADE QUALITY The report shows that steers, heifers and cows in the Maritime Provinces grade lower than

do cattle in Canada as a whole. It also shows that a larger proportion of Maritime beef is of a quality suitable only for manufacturing. This factor, therefore, reflects lower prices and lower income to beef producers in the Maritimes. However, the report continues, whether the additional application of productive factors to attain the two top grades under regional conditions would result in comparably increased returns must await a more thorough analysis. It is generally believed in the Atlantic region that Maritime producers are receiving lower prices for their products than they would receive on the Montreal market. This is partly explained by the fact that the Maritimes are deficient areas for meat, and the difference in price is roughly equal to the transportation costs from Montreal to Moncton. Higher overhead costs due to small scale operations, higher collection expenses and a monopony-type market relationship between buyer and producer, contribute to this differentiation in price in certain measure. CONCLUSIONS These, then, are some of the problems facing the beef industry in the Atlantic Region, and the report draws certain conclusions which it is intended may assist the beef industry in the Maritimes. A program to increase the weight of beef animals placed on the market should have the effect of expanding regional production, increasing quality and raising individual farm income. Expansion of beef production on a scale sufficient to meet the income requirements of individual beef producers can only be brought about by the establishment of community pastures, larger farms and more intensive farming. A program of diversified farming will not only provide a second line of production for income which is necessary on the Island, but also smooth out fluctuations in commodity price.
