## Veteran Champ Griffith Cops Decision For Title

NEW YORK (AP)—Middleweight champion Emile Griffith charged into slick-boxing Joey Archer and bullied his heavier opponent for a majority decision Wednesday night in a 15-round title fight at Madison Square Garden.

Despite the torrid temperatures of another steaming 102-degree day in New York, a crowd of 13,776 paid \$102,242 to see the scrap in the air-conditioned Garden.

Archer, a fighting New York Irishman, came rolling down the stretch to the chants of "let's go Joey" from his fans in the gallery.

Judge Al Bertl had it 8-7 for Griffith and Judge Artie Aidala saw it 9-1 for Griffith. Referee Johnny Lo Bianco scored it 7-7. The Associated Press card was 9-5-1 for the champ.

There were no knockdowns. Archer appeared to have been shaken up in the sixth round just after he started the round with a smashing attack. A flurry of three hooks snapped back Griffith's head in the 13th round.

Archer came out of a clinch in the eighth with a gash on the forehead over his right eye. Referee Lo Bianco called the New York commission doctor into the ring after the round to examine the cut.

There were lumps on Emile's face in the late stages of the battle as Archer tried desperately to pull it out.

The best round was the sixth. Archer smashed two hooks and a right to Griffith's head. The champ bounced right back with a quick flurry of blows, ending with a right that spun Archer around.

"Joey fought a beautiful fight," Griffith said. "He deserves another chance."

His manager, Gil Clancy, agreed.

"It was the toughest fight Griffith ever had," he said. "A rematch would be the best match in the country."

Archer, gunning for the title shot since he first started fighting in 1956, went into the ring a 13-10 favorite over Griffith, who won the crown on a disputed, but unanimous decision over Dick Tiger, April 25.

It was the 14th title fight, all but two in the welter division, for the champ from the Virgin Islands.

Although Archer weighed 159½ and Griffith 152, Emile appeared to be the stronger and heavier man. The champ now has a 51-7 record, while Archer is 46-3, with his record of never having been knocked down intact.

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## Second Half Of Ball Season Swings Into Action Today

With Baltimore threatening to make a shambles of the American League pennant race and San Francisco hard pressed by Pittsburgh for the lead in the National League, the second half of the baseball season gets under way today with a full slate of night games.

The All-Stars of both leagues were only too happy to escape Washington, in eighth place, will confront Minnesota with Phil Ortega while Jim Grant goes for the fifth-place Twins, who are 19 games back of the Orioles.

In the National League, San Francisco, which has been losing ground to Pittsburgh, is at Philadelphia. Giants' manager Herman Franks is irked because Dodger manager Walter Alton used his two ace pitchers, Juan Marichal and Gaylord Perry, in the all-star game.

Franks says he doesn't know who he can pitch against the Phillies, who are going with Larry Jackson. It'll be either Ray Sadecki or Ron Herbel, Franks said.

Alston, though, is coming right back with Sandy Koufax, who went three innings Tuesday in St. Louis. Sandy will go for win No. 16 against the Mets. New York will counter with Bob Shaw.

The Pirates, only one game out and even with the Giants in the lost column, host Chicago, mired deep in the cellar, 26 games off the pace and nine behind the nine-place Mets.

Surprising Houston, in fifth place, eight games off the lead, is at Atlanta, which is in seventh place. Mike Cuellar will will throw for the Astros and Tony Cloninger for the Braves.

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Edmonton (CP)—The meet chairman of the British Empire Games trials has decided to admit about 15 athletes who were late submitting entries.

Ernie Westerhove Wednesday reversed an earlier decision not to admit the athletes to the trials, to be held in Edmonton Friday and Saturday.

The refusal drew criticism from Ken Twigg, a member of the central Ontario selection committee for the trials. Twigg said he would rent facilities in Edmonton himself for a special meet after the trials, which also double as the Canadian championships.

Westerhove, who said he is solely responsible for both decisions, originally decided to let the tardy athletes after the trials' technical committee recommended the action.

Explaining his reversal, he said he felt it was "in the best interests of track and field."

He was emphatic, however, that the only late entries allowed would be those already on hand. No post entries will be accepted.

Included in the late entries was Michael Charlard, a Quebec athlete who earlier this season recorded a 100m dash of more than 24 feet.

The rules laid down by the track and field committee of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada state that entries must be cut off six clear days before the trials. They add, however, that the matter of late entries and post entries is up to the discretion of the meet manager.
